Frostburg Goes to Hollywood


Check out the premiere of the new CBS sitcom "Yes, Dear" in the Loft Monday, Oct. 2, at 8:30 p.m. "Yes, Dear" specials at the coffee bar will begin at 8 p.m.

In case you hadn't heard, the show has both on- and off-screen ties to FSU. One of the main characters, Jimmy, portrayed by comedian Mike O'Malley, will be an FSU graduate.

"Yes, Dear" is about a pair of "odd couple" brothers-in-law and their different approaches to life and family. Jimmy, who is described as a "loud, but lovable guy," moves to Southern California with his family to be closer to his generous in-laws, Greg and Kim, played by Anthony Clark and Jean Louisa Kelly.

He was co-creator of the ABC series "Built to Last" in 1997 starring comedian Royale Watkins.

Meningitis, Flu Shots to Be Offered Oct. 5

FSU and VACCESSHealth will again offer the meningitis vaccine to members of the FSU campus community. Flu shots will also be offered.

The cost will be \$75 for the meningitis vaccine and \$15 for the flu shot. The shots will be offered in the Lane Center Multi-Use room from 1 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 5.

A new Maryland law states that students living on campus must either have the meningitis vaccine or have signed a waiver saying they decided against it. That law doesn't cover students living in off-campus housing who are still at risk.

More than half of the outbreaks from 1992 to 1996 occurred in schools, colleges, universities and similar settings. Studies have suggested that college students are more susceptible because they live and work close to one another in dormitories and classrooms. Behavior and social aspects of college life also appear to be risk factors, with smoking, exposure to second-hand smoke, excessive alcohol consumption and bar patronage all increasing the chance that you will contract meningitis from an infected individual.

Symptoms often mimic flu, including fever, severe headache, stiff neck, rash, nausea, vomiting and lethargy. The infection can lead to permanent disabilities or even death. The infection is spread by direct contact, for example from sharing a glass or cigarette or by kissing, or through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes.

As a member of the International Association of Counselors and Therapists, Doc Robin is certified in clinical hypnotherapy, stress relaxation, medical massage and chemical dependency counseling. She is also known for her work with disabled and terminally ill patients.

Three to Receive Alumni Achievement Awards

The FSU Alumni Association will honor three alumni with its most prestigious award during this fall's "All-American Homecoming" celebration. The recipients of the FSU Alumni Achievement Award include *Noel T. Kunkle*, Williamsport, Md.; *William Graves*, LaPlata, Md.; and *Eric Udler*, Rockville, Md.

Criteria for this award include outstanding professional career growth; community involvement; demonstrated interested in FSU; special achievements, awards, honors and distinctions; and educational background which includes honors and involvement in special activities. Since receiving his B.S. in music education from Frostburg State in 1966, Kunkle has maintained strong ties to FSU throughout his active career as choral and band director for several Washington County schools. His ties to the university extend to his personal life - he met his wife at FSU, and his two daughters are also Frostburg alumnae. From 1987 to 1991 he was a member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors and, last year, of the Bobcat Club Executive Committee.

While directing music in the Washington County schools, Kunkle also earned an M.A. from FSU in counseling and guidance in 1974, served as jazz director of the American Music Abroad Summer Tour of Europe from 1988-1997 and coordinated concert and marching activities for Washington County.

During the 1999-2000 academic year, Kunkle served as director of bands at FSU. Of the experience, he says, "You cannot imagine the excitement, the anticipation and the pride I had to be able to come back home and give something back to a school that had given me so much."

William Graves credits FSU for giving him what he most values - family, friends and career. His wife is also an FSU graduate; several friends are FSU graduates.

After graduating in 1965 with a B.S. in history, Graves taught social studies for five years at Robert Goddard Junior High School. In 1971, he earned an M.S. in Counseling & Guidance from FSU. Since then, he has served as a guidance counselor in several Prince George's County high schools; he is currently at High Point High School.

Throughout the course of his career, Graves has remained involved with FSU. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the FSU Alumni Association and currently serves as the chair of the Career Connections Committee. In addition, he has helped plan all of his class reunions and has served as a keynote speaker at FSU's Student Leadership Recognition Dinner. As a part of the University's Centennial Campaign, Graves successfully spearheaded an effort to raise funds for the Richard Sloop Leadership Program.

Eric Udler, class of 1990, represents a new breed of business professional - the entrepreneur, focused on providing excellent customer service and enthusiastic about the potential of emerging technologies. Less than 10 years after graduation, he felt ready to launch FSI, a company specializing in helping associations and tradeshow producers increase revenue. The self-funded company now employs eight, recently acquired another trade show company and maintains a Web site, www.generaterevenue.com.

Udler credits his alma mater for his current success. He cites Drs. Brooks Honeycutt and Judy Pula for helping him learn skills essential to survival in business.

Udler maintains ties with Sigma Tau Gamma, which, he says, "provided me with an opportunity to develop my leadership skills."

The awards will be presented to the winners at the 2000 Career Day Luncheon on Friday, Oct. 6, in the Lane Center Multi-Use Room.
