Lecture Set on Hawaii's Mystery and Volcanoes

Dr. Don B. Weser, professor of chemistry at FSU, will present a lecture on "Hawaii, Land of Mystery, Enchantment and Volcanoes," Thursday, Sept. 26, at 7:30 p.m. in the PE Center Leake Room.

Hawaii is a land of great mystery, intrigue and astounding diversity of cultures and peoples. Its history is rooted in legends and stories that have been passed from one generation to another, and much of that interest and superstition still resides there. Weser's presentation will focus on Hawaii's fascination both underwater and far above sea level, from its sea life to its volcanoes, which leads to a realm vastly different from that encountered in the continental United States.

Weser was given the opportunity to explore many facets of the islands through the Chautauqua program, sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Nai-Ni Chen Company to Perform Chinese Festival

Parents' Weekend festivities will feature a performance of the Chinese Festival with the Nai-Ni Chen Dance Company on Saturday, Oct. 5, at 8:30 p.m. in the Cordts Center Main Arena.

Blending tradition with innovation, the Nai-Ni Chen Dance Company fuses the power and elegance of Chinese art forms with the dynamic and liberated world of contemporary dance. Choreographer Nai-Ni Chen uses a unique dance vocabulary inspired by Chinese and Zen calligraphy, ceremonies, folk rituals and nature to create a new model for Asian dance in the United States.

Many of her works use themes from ancient Chinese poetic drama to reflect and explore contemporary issues. Her dances explore the common ground between tradition and innovation, freedom and discipline, spirit and form.

Now a world-renowned performer, master teacher and choreographer, Chen immigrated to the United States from Taiwan in 1982 with dreams of creating a new style of dance to represent her

distinctive vision. She entered New York
University as a professional dancer after having toured with a
Chinese Performing Arts troupe that brought her native land's culture and dance to 26 countries.

Since its formation in 1988, the Nai-Ni Chen Dance Company has received fellowships, awards and commissions from the National Endowment for the Arts, Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation, Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation and

the Jih-Sun Foundation, among others, for its creative new works and contributions to the preservation of tradition. In addition to its active performance schedule, the Company offers education outreach to schools throughout the country.

Cyclophonica Cycles its Way from Brazil to FSU

In its first demonstration in the United States, "Cyclophonica" is coming to FSU. Cyclophonica is musicians on bicycles, some bearing homemade instruments – and in many cases, the bikes make music, too – pedaling around the FSU campus and the city of Frostburg performing a variety of music in a variety of styles. The music can include everything from a siren to a cell phone, to a bird call to individual organ pipes, removed from their organs.

The creator of Cyclophonica is Dr. Leonardo Fuks, a professor of Music and Acoustics at the Federal University in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He is an active researcher in the physics of musical instruments with particular interest in developing new technologies for improving instruments, as well as new instruments with novel sounds. He's also an

accomplished performer on the oboe.

The Brazilian tour of the "bicycle orchestra" received considerable attention, including on international television news. This will be Dr. Fuks' first performance in the United States.

Dr. Fuks' visit to Frostburg will include two performances from the bicycle orchestra on Friday afternoon on campus and Saturday morning in town, a workshop on creating or adapting instruments for bicycle orchestra on Friday afternoon, and a scientific lecture, "Product Acoustics – Designing the Sound Qualities of a Manufactured World" on Thursday afternoon.

More details will be forthcoming. All events are free and open to the public.

The lecture will propose the creation of a new, multi-faceted discipline, Product Acoustics, to deal with the problems and possibilities that objects, devices and systems create when functioning or interacting with other objects. For example, acousticians may try to suppress undesirable "by-product sounds," but sounds may also provide useful information about the operation of the system. A multidisciplinary approach - involving psychoacoustics (the study of how the human brain processes sound), musical acoustics, vibration, material science and industrial design — would be required.

Checklist for High-tech Etiquette Leaving Messages on Answering Machines and Voice Mail:

- State whom you are calling, your first and last name, your company and title, the reason for your call, and your phone number (with area code and extension).
- Be brief when stating your message, and indicate specific callback times.
 - Speak slowly.
- Deliver bad news personally (when possible).
- Follow up on important messages to make sure they were received.

Recording Messages on Answering Machines and Voice Mail:

- Limit menus and options.
- Give callers an easy way to reach a live person.
 - Test your message.
- Update greetings frequently, and change your message when going on vacation.

Faxing Messages:

- Fax nonpersonal messages only.
- Use a cover sheet stating the date, number of pages, recipient's name, sender's name, and a phone number to call if there is a transmission error.
 - Sign your fax.
- Call before faxing urgent messages or before faxing long documents.
- Check your fax machine regularly to make sure it has adequate paper and cartridges.

Sending Electronic Mail:

- Respect other people's electronic space by sending messages only when necessary.
 - Make your subject line informative.
 - Avoid overusing the label "urgent."
 - Use short paragraphs.
- Refrain from using all capital letters (shouting).
- Quote a previous e-mail when responding to questions or requests.
 - Proofread every message.
- Be careful about using the "reply all" button.
 - Check your e-mail often.
 - Clean out your e-mailbox regularly.

Financial Aid for Overseas Study

Most financial aid will transfer overseas, and students on the Pell Grant may qualify for the Gilman scholarship, which will cover up to \$5,000 for overseas study.

FSU is affiliated with the School for International Training. This enables FSU students to study through SIT in over 50 locations while remaining registered at FSU. All financial aid will transfer. Financial Aid for Studying Overseas
