Jazz Great Herbie Hancock to Perform

Local Jazz Musician Lucius 'Pete' Harper to be Honored at Hancock Performance

American pianist Herbie Hancock and his Quartet will wow audiences as FSU's **Cultural Events** Series and the Kauffman Music **Guest Artist** Series present the **Grammy Award**winning musician on Sunday, Nov. 9 at 3 p.m. in the **Performing Arts** Center Pealer Recital Hall.

Hancock is revered as an innovator in the world of jazz. Continually

pushing the boundaries, he retains his trademark style whether playing hip-hop, Gershwin ballads or traditional tunes.

As a child prodigy, Hancock first made waves at the age of 11, soloing in the first movement of a Mozart piano concerto with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra before dedicating himself to the rhythms of jazz. Invited to New York City by jazz legend Donald Byrd, he released his debut album, "Takin' Off," at the age of 22, and was a key player in the celebrated Miles Davis Quintet. "Herbie was the step after Bud Powell and Thelonius Monk, and I haven't heard anybody yet who has come after him," says Davis. The winner of eight Grammys, he has

achieved a remarkable balance of commercial and artistic success, and few artists in the entire music industry have attained more respect or cast more influence.

Joining Hancock on stage is Gary

Thomas on saxophone and flute; Terri Lyne Carrington on drums; and Scott Colley on bass.

Frostburg native and jazz pioneer Lucius "Pete" Harper will be honored at this performance for his contributions to the advancement of iazz to the local rural community. Since he first picked up a ukulele at age 12 and sang "Ain't She Sweet?" the gifted, self-

trained Harper has shared his music with the people around him. He performed in New York, Washington, D.C., and Pittsburgh, before opening his after-hours music club in Frostburg in the 1950s, thus paving the way for jazz music in the Frostburg area community. Harper's Chicken Shack was the first black-owned business in the area and soon developed a national reputation among jazz musicians. Legends such as Count Basie and Maynard Ferguson stopped at the chicken shack for lengthy jam sessions during their crosscountry tours. Harper, who will turn 88 in November, continues to bring his love of jazz and music to the community.

237 and a reading at 7:30 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall.

Hailed as an American phenomenon, Collins manages to combine high critical acclaim with broad popular appeal. With subjects ranging from shoveling snow with the Buddha to jazz and the three blind mice, his last three collections of poems have broken sales records for poetry. The enthusiastic response to his readings comes from people of all backgrounds and age groups. The typical Collins poem opens on a clear and hospitable note but soon takes an unexpected turn. Collins sees his poetry as "a form of travel writing" and considers humor a "door into the serious.'

Collins has published seven collections of poetry, including "Questions About Angels," "The Art of Drowning," "Picnic, Lightning," "Sailing Alone Around the Room: New & Selected Poems" and, most recently, "Nine Horses." About his work, The New York Times says, "Luring his readers into the poem with humor, Mr. Collins leads them unwittingly into deeper, more serious places, a kind of journey from the familiar to quirky to unexpected territory, sometimes tender, often profound."

Speaker to Discuss 'Brown vs. Board of Ed'

In commemoration of the upcoming 50th anniversary of the Supreme Court case outlawing the "separate but equal" standard decided May 17, 1954, FSU will host Dr. Lenneal J. Henderson's presentation on "Brown vs. Board of Education - Context and Legacy" on Tuesday, Nov. 11, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall.

Henderson will discuss the landmark case and its trail of cases leading up to today's controversies in educational equality. He will consider the effects of shifting demographics, the changing socioeconomic and educational context and content of school segregation, the shift from rights to resources, the quality of education with regard to issues of multiculturalism and diversity and a number of other related issues.

Henderson is distinguished professor of government and public administration and senior fellow at the William Donald Schaefer Center for Public Policy and a senior fellow in the Hoffberger Center for Professional Ethics at the University of Baltimore. He is a member of the Maryland Humanities Council and a member of its speakers bureau. He serves on numerous boards of directors and has been a consultant to federal, state and local government, the corporate sector and the non-profit sector for more than 30 years in a variety of areas including education policy, housing, energy management and environmental policy. Henderson has lectured or consulted in many countries including India, Chile, Egypt, the Czech Republic, Israel, Japan, Russia, South Africa, Namibia, Kenya and Ethiopia. He has also served as the director of ethnic studies at the University of San Francisco and has published in the areas of urban policy, public policy, African American politics and public administration. He received his A.B., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of California, Berkeley.

Baggott received her M.F.A. from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1991. The recipient of fellowships from the Delaware Division of Arts, Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, Ragdale Foundation and Bread Loaf Writers' Conference, she has placed poems and short stories in dozens of literary journals including "Poetry," "The Southern Review," "Chelsea," "Cream City Review," "Quarterly West," as well as the acclaimed anthology "Best American Poetry 2000." University Theatre Presents 'Glory of Living'

FSU Theatre will present Rebecca Gilman's "The Glory of Living," a Pulitzer Prize runner-up, on Nov. 14, 15, 20, 21 and 22 at 8 p.m. and Nov. 15 at 2 p.m. The play will be performed in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre in the FSU Performing Arts Center.

"The Glory of Living" focuses on 15-year-old Lisa, who tries to escape a miserable life with her prostitute mother by running away with, and eventually marrying, Clint, an ex-con. Through systematic abuse, Clint coerces Lisa into helping him commit crimes of varying magnitude, including procuring "disposable" young girls. In Lisa, playwright Gilman has created a riveting portrait of a young woman whose most striking quality is not her capacity for evil but the depth of her emptiness.

According to Michael Billington of The Guardian, "Plays don't come much tougher, or more compassionate, than ... "The Glory of Living."

Gilman has become one of the most prolific and celebrated playwrights in America today. Her several awardwinning plays ("Spinning into Butter," "Boy Gets Girl" and "Blue Serge") are daring and controversial treatments of contemporary social issues like racism, class discrimination and stalking. Whatever the subject, Gilman's work is always distinctive, especially through impressively detailed characterizations that force the audience to look beneath the larger problem.

FSU Hagerstown Center Enrollments Increase

Enrollments at the FSU Hagerstown Center have reached the third highest in the Center's history. The 422 students enrolled this semester are within five of the Center's peak enrollments reached in fall 1995.

These numbers show that the Hagerstown and Frederick Centers combined represent some 10 percent of Frostburg's total enrollment.

"We are more than pleased with this indicator of success," said Dr. James Shaw, Director of the Center," especially during a period of high employment,

when enrollments usually decrease.' Shaw attributes the Center's success to a combination of society's growing demand for continuous upgrading of professional skills, coupled with Frostburg's responsiveness to the marketplace.

"Programs such as our Liberal Studies, or self-designed major, and our Master of Arts in Teaching, designed to certify adults to teach in the public schools, have combined to appeal to entirely new kinds of students," he pointed out.

In addition, one of Frostburg's traditional offerings, the MBA, showed a 9 percent increase over a year ago. Graduate students in business and education now account for some 66 percent of the Center's enrollment.

In a precursor to the arrival of the new University System of Maryland Hagerstown Education Center, the Frostburg Center also enrolls an additional 15 students in a Bachelor of Nursing Program offered by the University of Maryland.

The Hagerstown Center itself offers bachelor's degree programs in Accounting, Business, Administration, Law and Society (Justice Studies), Liberal Studies and Sociology, as well as graduate programs in Business (MBA) and Education (MAT and M.Ed.).

WFWM License Renewed by FCC

WFWM, the University's public radio station, has been notified that the **Federal Communications Commission** has approved the station's application for license renewal. The FCC determined

that, during the past six years, WFWM "had served the public interest, convenience and necessity" and that the station "had no violations of the **Communications Act** or the Commission's Rules." As a result



of those findings, the FCC has renewed the license of WFWM radio until Oct. 1, 2011. WFWM operates as a public service of Frostburg State University on an assigned frequency of 91.0 MHz, Frostburg, and on translator station W242AD (96.3 MHz), Oakland. An affiliate station of National Public Radio (NPR) the station broadcasts 24 hours a day under the auspices of the FSU Office of University Advancement.

Computer Based Testing (CBT) Opens

The ETS Computer Based Testing Center (CBT) successfully opened in Pullen Hall 105-A on Oct. 13. Student response has been positive to the new Center. The service allows examinees to complete ETS computerized exams on campus. In the first three weeks, 26 examinees completed 31 computerized exams. These exams include PRAXIS, GRE, GMAT, and TOEFL.

'Physics & Metaphysics' Offered in Spring '04

FSU will offer "Physics and Metaphysics," an award-winning, team-taught course exploring the links between ancient Asian metaphysics and modern physics, during the spring 2004 semester.

Taught by English professor Dr. Paul La Chance and physics professor Dr. George Plitnik, the course won a worldwide \$10,000 Science and Religion Course Competition from the Templeton Foundation in 2000. They further incorporated more of the latest research in this new field of the science-religion interface into the course following their attendance at conferences on "God and Time" at Oxford University and "Science and Spirituality" at Harvard University and after receiving an additional developmental grant.

The interdisciplinary course, Physical Science (PHSC) 444, examines concepts of reality proposed by Newton, Einstein, Heisenberg and other physicists, and by Lao-Tzu, Buddha, Hui Neng and other ancient philosophers. It has no math or lab component, and it only requires students who can read and think well. It will be offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 2 p.m. in the Compton Science Center.

Points of Pride



University Police has won the Governor's Crime Prevention Award for the 14th straight year. Frostburg's campus police earned the award for category A, which covers overall crime prevention efforts.

"Crime prevention is always near the top of our agenda, and that explains our repeated success. We don't have a single crime prevention officer, nor do we limit our efforts to a crime prevention week or month. It's everyone's responsibility, all the time," says Campus Police Chief Brian Shanley.

To win the award for category A, the

Police Department has implemented personal, residential and commercial security programs, as well as provided crime prevention training and public information/media activities, officer recognition for crime prevention and support for the national McGruff campaign.

The personal security program involves presentations that raise awareness about personal protection, rape and sexual assault, youth crime prevention and drug abuse prevention. Elderly crime prevention is usually a required program, but since the campus population is predominantly ages 17 to 21, FSU's police department substitutes a "Coming to America" program for international students. This substitute program helps familiarize foreign students with American laws, currency and campus security procedures.

The residential security program involves nine students who work with campus police as "night assistants" and presentations to students about security issues such as theft and locking doors.

The commercial security program involves presentations to university employees about loading dock security, asset protection, construction site security, emergency alarms and personal safety in the workplace. The university also improved the "blue light" emergency telephones located throughout the FSU campus so that they are more visible during both day and night. This program also includes a quarterly security survey for all of the campus buildings.

The university's 16 police officers took part in the crime prevention campaign. "Several participated in classroom or other educational outreach efforts, while others emphasized technical aspects of crime prevention. All gave of their creativity and caring," Shanley said.


International Education Week, Nov. 17-21

The fourth annual celebration of International Education Week, which was established in 2000 as part of the implementation of President Clinton's initiative calling for an international education policy for the U.S., will take place across the nation the week of Nov. 17-21. Students can choose

from short experiences (one to two months) to longer experiences (four to 12 months), or even look into a more serious commitment (one to three years). Destinations are available throughout the world.

Financial Aid for Studying Overseas

FSU students are able to transfer all federal financial aid overseas to help pay for study abroad programs, along

with most state and institutional aid for most FSU sponsored programs. The CIE also awards study abroad scholarships of \$500 and \$1,000 to qualifying students. Many other state and national scholarships are also available to help cover overseas costs.
