FSU Dance Company to Perform Fall Concert

The FSU Dance Company, under the artistic direction of Dr. Barry Fischer, will present its 2003 Fall Dance Concert Sunday through Tuesday, Nov. 16 to 18, in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre. Sunday's performance will be at 2 p.m., and Monday's and Tuesday's shows will be at 8 p.m.

The program's first act will consist of four works created by dance majors Amanda Swick and Cathie Llewellyn, members of Fischer's "Composition II" class this semester.

All of the works will include live piano accompaniment – on FSU's nine-foot Steinway – performed by guest artist and FSU Performing Arts faculty member Ellen Putnam. Putnam chose the four pieces, by Debussy, Ravel, Beethoven and Zezconfrey, and collaborated with the two students in creating the dance compositions.

The second act will open with two pieces by former FSU Dance Company member and Frostburg native Amy Derezinski. The first will be a group work built on pirate and sailor motifs. The second will be the premiere of a duet, "Coming Home," based on her introspection of her life following her father's suicide when she was one year old. She will be joined in the duet by her stepfather, Joe Williams.

The closing piece of the second act will be the premiere of Fischer's group work, "Friends of the Heart," to the music of "Ashokan Farewell," a tune familiar to viewers of Ken Burns' "Civil War" series.

University Theatre Presents 'Glory of Living'

FSU Theatre will present Rebecca Gilman's "The Glory of Living," a Pulitzer Prize runner-up, on Nov. 14, 15, 20, 21 and 22 at 8 p.m. and Nov. 15 at 2 p.m. The play will be performed in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre.

"The Glory of Living" focuses on 15year-old Lisa, who tries to escape a miserable life with her prostitute mother by running away with, and eventually marrying, Clint, an ex-con. Through systematic abuse, Clint coerces Lisa into helping him commit crimes of varying magnitude, including procuring "disposable" young girls. In Lisa, playwright Gilman has created a riveting portrait of a young woman whose most striking quality is not her capacity for evil but the depth of her emptiness.

Gilman's several award-winning plays ("Spinning into Butter," "Boy Gets Girl" and "Blue Serge") are daring and controversial treatments of contemporary social issues like racism, class discrimination and stalking.

Speaker to Discuss 'Brown vs. Board of Ed'

In commemoration of the upcoming 50th anniversary of the Supreme Court

case outlawing the "separate but equal" standard decided May 17, 1954, FSU will host Dr. Lenneal J. Henderson's presentation on "Brown vs. Board of Education - Context and Legacy" on Tuesday, Nov. 11, at 7 p.m. in the

Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall.

Henderson will discuss the landmark case and its trail of cases leading up to today's controversies in educational equality. He will consider the effects of shifting demographics, the changing socioeconomic and educational context and content of school segregation, the shift from rights to resources, the quality of education with regard to issues of multiculturalism and diversity and a number of other related issues.

Henderson is distinguished professor of government and public administration and senior fellow at the William Donald Schaefer Center for Public Policy and a senior fellow in the Hoffberger Center for Professional Ethics at the University of Baltimore. He has been a consultant for more than 30 years in a variety of areas including education policy, housing, energy management and environmental policy.

IFS Presents 'Times of Harvey Milk'

FSU Center Stage's International Film Series will present the movie "Times of Harvey Milk" on Tuesday, Nov. 18, in the Lane University Center Atkinson Room 201 at 7 p.m.

Repression is a personal problem that is also a public issue. Harvey Milk, the San Francisco city supervisor who was assassinated along with Mayor George Moscone in 1978, lived and worked in the hot and dangerous zone where the personal and the public intersect.

Consciously gay at age 14, Milk spent his adolescence and young adulthood in the usual social and institutional closets – a Long Island Jewish middle-class family, college, the Navy, a Wall Street job. Then, like the countless other homosexuals of his generation, he began a long escape from repression into the counterculture of the 1960s.

Long hair, protest politics, pot and loose lifestyle were easy exits. The hair and the flight were homosexual politics. He made the personal issue of gay legitimacy the basis of his supervisory seat. He joined his strong base in the Castro district with allies across the ethnic and supportive way, he demanded that gays come out and announce their sexual identity for the safety of the entire community.

Dan White crawled into City Hall through a basement window, shot and killed the Mayor, and did the same to Harvey Milk. Robert Epstien and Richard Schmiechen have made a beautiful and powerful documentary around these events. Friends and political associates of Harvey Milk cry on camera, and it's hard to believe that their tears are not mirrored in the eyes of many in the audience.

The "Times of Harvey Milk" joins the short list of films and literary documents about their daily experience and political struggle of gay people in the modern age.

Reggie has been a featured performer at the Baltimore Blues Festival for several years, a favorite on the Mid Atlantic club circuit and has toured France and Italy.



FSU to Participate in Jazz Touring Network

The FSU Cultural Events Series is now included in the prestigious Mid Atlantic Jazz Touring Network, a program of the Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation.

The Network is designed to increase the number of venues presenting jazz in the region, extend touring routes for jazz artists into underserved areas and enable presenters to create infrastructures in their communities that will support and sustain jazz programming. Each year, the Foundation selects six to eight presenters to participate in a comprehensive, three-year training

Bill Mandicott, CES advisory board chair and assistant vice president of Student and Educational Services, was selected to participate in this year's program. He will attend two sessions per year over a three-year period on topics that will assist FSU in advancing jazz programming in the local community. Session topics will include audience development, jazz programming, corporate sponsorship, promotion and partnerships with schools and community groups. Faculty for the sessions will be jazz artists, presenters, educators and representatives of the media, all working in the jazz industry.

The addition of recurrent jazz programming to the CES calendar has been an emergent goal throughout the past several seasons. The Mid-Atlantic Jazz Touring grant will help CES in reaching its goals with the opportunity for consistent jazz performance in conjunction with the ongoing efforts of

local arts councils, the Cumberland Jazz Society, Tri-State Big Bands, the Potomac State Jazz Band, the FSU Jazz Ensemble and the Kauffman Guest Artist Jazz Series, as well as ongoing jazz programming on WFWM-FM, FSU's listener-supported radio station. Insight and information gained as part of the touring program will be shared with these and other regional presenters.

The mechanical engineering program at FSU has received national recognition:

In the design area, one of the projects undertaken by *Matthew Brew*,

Cliff Elliott, David Higgs, Chris Petrocelli, Derek Ruby and Dr. Chandrasekhar Thamire on mobility devices for the physically disabled has been published as a peer-reviewed article and is currently in the patent application phase. The project has been selected as one of the top five projects in the Student Competition at the International Mechanical Engineering Congress of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, among several entries received. Later this year, the team will be competing against teams including those from Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University, Harvard University/Boston VA Medical Center, Cornell University, and State University of New York. Two other projects related to assistive devices of the bed-ridden and the physically disabled developed by the students in the program and Dr. Thamire have previously received national recognition and published.

In the heat transfer area, results from a study related to the laser treatment of the eye and associated studies of convection by *John Fogle*, a senior in the program, and Dr. Thamire will be presented at the Division of Fluid Dynamics of the American Physical Society later this month.

In the biomedical engineering area, a remote-controlled surgical device to control urinary incontinence has been developed by **Bonnie Carr**, **Jason Paugh** and **Jason Vaughan**, all seniors in the program, and Dr. Thamire, which will be published and presented soon in a biomedical engineering forum.

In the biofluid mechanics area, results from a research study related to the urinary flow mechanics by Carr and Dr. Thamire will be presented at Annual Conference of the American Urological Association and published. Carr has been nominated by the University of Maryland, College Park, to be the Commencement Speaker at University of Maryland's Graduation Ceremony and also as the Commencement Speaker at the Engineering Graduation Ceremony of the A.J. Clark School of Engineering at the University of Maryland.
