The FSU Children's Literature Centre will present a talk by children's book illustrator John Manders on Thursday, Oct. 14, at 7 p.m. at City Place, 14 S. Water St. in Frostburg. The event, part of the Children's Literature Centre's Fall Author Series, is free and open to the

Manders, who began his career as a graphic designer, switched to illustration several years ago. Over the past seven years he has illustrated more than two dozen children's books. One of Manders' favorite subjects is Sherman, his African gray parrot, who can converse in several languages, compose music and imitate the sound of a garbage truck backing up. Manders says his illustrations reflect his "sort of

cartoony and wise-guy" personality. Manders was educated at the Art Institute of Pittsburgh and later took courses at the School of Visual Arts and the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York, where he studied children's illustration, animation and life drawing. Manders' work is featured in over 30 children's books and dozens of children's magazines. His work has been exhibited at the Art Institute of Pittsburgh gallery, the Pittsburgh Children's Museum, and he was honored in the 25-year retrospective of Cricket magazine covers that was held at the

Art Institute of Chicago in 1999. That year he was also a participant at the Children's Book Fair in Bologna, Italy.

Among the children's books that Manders has illustrated are "Minnie's Diner" by Dayle Ann Dodds, "Prancing Dancing Lily" by Marsha Diane Arnold. "Humphrey, Albert and the Flying Machine" by Kathryn Lasky, "Z Is for Zombie" by Merrily Kutner and "Dirt Boy" by Erik Jon Slangerup. Manders also illustrated the traditional Mexican rhyme, "Senor Don Gato."

Athletic Training Ed Earns Accreditation

FSU's Bachelor of Science Program in Athletic Training has received national accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP), a distinction that will allow the graduates of FSU's program to sit for the Board of Certification (BOC) Examination.

FSU's is one of only three accredited programs in athletic training in Maryland.

 ${\it CAAHEP}\ is\ the\ largest\ specialized$ accreditor in the health sciences field. In collaboration with its Committees on Accreditation, CAAHEP reviews and

accredits more than 2,000 educational programs in 21 health science occupations across the United States and Canada. The accreditation standards are established by CAAHEP and The American Academy of Family Physicians, The American Academy of Pediatrics, The American Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine and The National Athletic Trainers' Association Inc.

FSU's Athletic Training Education Program (ATEP) began in the late 1970s as an internship program that was part of the Health and Physical Education degree. That program grew to the point that FSU established an Exercise and Sport Science program in 2000, with Athletic Training as one of three concentrations.

FSU's previous program, which was based on an extensive internship, had allowed students to sit for the exam, but that rule has just been changed by the Board of Certification, which now requires exam candidates to graduate from an accredited program. The BOC is the only accredited certification program for athletic trainers in the United States.

FSU saw the change coming and decided to apply for accreditation, a multi-year process.

When James Racchini was hired as ATEP director in 2001, he applied for candidacy for accreditation and began the process of establishing the Athletic Training program as a stand-alone major, instead of a concentration within Exercise Science. The University System of Maryland Board of Regents in 2002 approved the Bachelor of Science in Athletic Training, along with additional entrance requirements and two new courses.

The candidacy phase lasted two years, followed by a self-study for accreditation through CAAHEP and a team visit from the Joint Review Committee on Education Programs in Athletic Training, which performs the accreditation study for CAAHEP.

The ATEP at FSU has grown from one sponsoring Certified Athletic Trainer in its infancy to being served by two fulltime Certified Athletic Trainer faculty, two full-time staff Certified Athletic Trainers and two graduate assistants.

Ride to End Family Violence Needs Helpers

The Allegany County Family Violence Council is initiating what they hope is an annual event, a motorcycle poker run. This fun activity's purpose is to raise much-needed funds, since the FVC has suffered recent funding cuts. The mission of the Allegany County Family Violence Council is to significantly reduce the incidents of family and interpersonal violence by creating a coordinated community response, which protects victims, holds offenders accountable and offers treatment and education as a means of prevention.

The Ride to End Family Violence Poker Run is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 2 (rain date, Oct. 9) with registration from 9 to 10 a.m. at the CBIZ parking lot, corner of Baltimore and Mechanic streets in Downtown Cumberland, where the ride will begin at 10 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. Preregistration is not required. Along with Jim and James, Pixie Hamilton and Steven Schriver from Richmond, Va., were also featured from the USGS. Last summer, NASA asked if they could film the group as they tested 32 different wells in the Piedmont physiographic region in newly urbanized areas of the D.C. metro area. They're working on a study about how urbanization affects ground water quality over time.

Through a cooperative agreement with FSU, the USGS now has a field office located at FSU in Tawes Hall Room 128. Students at FSU who have had the opportunity to work with the

USGS in the past had to travel to other offices for field experience but now they do not need to travel with a field office here on our campus.

Fulbright Scholarships

The Fulbright Program is the United State's premier scholarship program. It enables students to gain international competence in an increasingly interdependent world. Each year the Fulbright Program offers scholarships to pursue research in specific countries and fields. The U.S. Dept. of State, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs sponsors the Fulbright Program.

The Fulbright Scholarships are awarded as follows:

- Fulbright Full Grants: This grant is offered to students who are conducting research in a Fulbright approved country on an approved topic.
- Fulbright Travel Grants: This grant is offered to students who are conducting research in Germany, Hungary, Italy or Korea that is Fulbright-approved.
- Foreign and Private Grants: This grant is offered to students who are conducting research in a Fulbright approved country on an approved topic. The host country's government, universities or private donors offer the grant.

Recipients must be a U.S. citizen and have received a bachelor's degree from a U.S. institution. All FSU students must apply by early fall.

Safety Message

Ladder Safety

Position the ladder properly. Face the ladder when starting to climb. Keep both hands on the side rails while climbing: one hand on the side rail while working. Carry tools or other materials on a tool belt, pull them up by a tag line; or have a co-worker hand (never throw) them to you; place articles in a bucket and pull it up. If climbing more than a few feet, have someone hold the ladder safely for you. Climb slowly. If the ladder begins to move, climb down immediately and reposition ladder. Do not over-reach. Keep your upper body inside the side rails. Do not "walk" or "pogo stick" or "dance" a ladder to move it to a new location. Never allow more than on person on a ladder at one time. Never sit on a ladder rung, the top of ladder or on the paint shelf. Do not hang or leave tools or other materials on rungs or on top of the ladder. Never climb any higher than the second step from the top on a step ladder; or the fourth rung from the top of a straight (extension) ladder.

On extension and straight ladders, the base of the ladder should be one foot away from the wall for every four feet of the distance to the point where the ladder touches the wall (4-1 rule). The base of a ladder that touches 12 feet up should be positioned three feet from the wall.
