

Safety Message

Prevent Holiday Fires

Tree Safety:

Special fire safety precautions need to be taken when keeping a live tree in the house. A burning tree can rapidly fill a room with fire and deadly gases. Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches, and the needle should not break if the tree is fresh. The trunk should be sticky. If many needles fall off when a tree trunk is bounced on the ground, the tree is a fire hazard.

Holiday Lights:

Maintain your holiday lights. Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken or cracked sockets and excessive kinking or wear. Use only lighting listed by an approved testing laboratory. Do not link more than three strings to an extension cord. The wires should not be warm to the touch.

Candle Care:

Avoid using lit candles. If you do use them, make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be easily knocked down. Never leave the house with candles burning. Never put lit candles on a real tree. Do not go near a real tree with any type of open flame. Finally, have working smoke alarms installed on every level of your home, test them monthly and keep them clean and equipped with fresh batteries at all times. Know when and how to call for help. And practice your home escape plan.
