University Theatre Leads Off Season with 'Damn Yankees'

University Theatre will lead off its 2004-2005 season of main stage and student productions with "Damn Yankees," coming to bat on Oct. 8, 9, 14, 15 and 16 at 8 p.m. and Oct. 9 and 16 at 2 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre.

Based on the novel "The Year the Yankees Lost the Pennant" by Douglass Wallop, "Damn Yankees" is about the Washington Senators' number one fan, Joe, who strikes a deal with the devil and is transformed into a superstar rookie baseball player. The new Joe has a chance to lead the Washington Senators to victory over those damn New York Yankees. All the while, the devil intends to throw Joe a screwball at the bottom of the ninth. Will Joe's yearning for his wife Meg upset the devil's plans? Will Lola's charms be too much for Joe's integrity? Will Joe keep his soul and beat those damn Yankees?

Naomi Wallace's "The Trestle at Pope Lick Creek" will be presented on Nov. 12, 13, 18, 19 and 20 at 8 p.m. and Nov. 13 at 2 p.m. in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. The play is one of several award-winning works by Kentucky poet/playwright Naomi Wallace. Set in 1936 at the height of the Great Depression, "Trestle" presents two teenagers who plan a game of "chicken" with an oncoming train, high on a trestle above a bone-dry creek bed. At first, the scheme adds excitement to life in this small factory town during an era of stifled ambitions. However, this youthful flirtation with death awakens

other dangerous passions. A touchingly poetic play, "Trestle" is a powerful depiction of how economic depression contaminates individual lives. On seeing an early production, a critic with the Louisville Courier-Journal said, "After the play ended ... there was a moment in the darkness when I thought: 'This must be how it felt when people saw 'A Streetcar Named Desire' for the very first time." The play is recommended for mature audiences.

'Metamorphoses" will be presented March 4, 5, 10, 11 and 12 at 8 p.m. and March 5 at 2 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre. One of the most unusual and highly acclaimed contemporary plays, Mary Zimmerman's "Metamorphoses" is an evocative, beautiful retelling of selected myths from the Roman poet Ovid. The stories of King Midas, Orpheus and Eurydice, Cupid and Psyche and Phaeton, among others, are included. Set in and around a large, shimmering pool of symbolic water, the play probes enduring questions about life, love, death and the inevitability of transformation and change. Time Out NY says, "Befitting its name, Metamorphoses is by turns romantic, witty, sexy and sublime.

The main stage season will wind up with, Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest" on April 15, 16, 21, 22 and 23 at 8 p.m. and April 16 at 2 p.m. in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. Wilde's 19th century "trivial comedy for serious people" is arguably one of the greatest English satires to grace the

stage. The amusement begins when bachelors Jack Worthing and Algernon Moncrieff both go by "Earnest" — a name that "seems to inspire absolute confidence" — in order to win the love of the women they adore. Gwendelon accepts her proposal from Jack, and Cecily from Algernon, but the women become heatedly confused when they meet and believe they are engaged to the same man. This witty comedy erupts when the formidable Lady Bracknell becomes involved, and, with the help of Miss Prism and a handbag, everyone is forced to discover the importance of being "earnest."

Tickets are \$10 for the general public and \$5 for students. Season discount tickets are also available. By purchasing three tickets for \$30, you will receive a free ticket to "Damn Yankees." Brent Scarpo to Present Anti-Hate Message

Brent Scarpo, renowned speaker on anti-hate issues and solutions, will give two presentations on the FSU campus.

Scarpo's award-winning documentary, "Journey to a Hate Free Millennium," will be presented on Tuesday, Sept. 7, at 7 p.m. in Manicur Assembly Hall. The film seeks solutions to ending hate and the crimes that have become frequent events in our daily lives. The documentary centers around true stories taken directly from the shocking national headlines, including the student shootings at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colo.; the dragging death of James Byrd Jr., an African-American man in Texas; and the beating death of Matthew Shepard, a gay college student in Wyoming. This film explores the subject of hate by searching out the origins of how it is "taught and learned," the scope of its danger, beginning with childhood taunting and going as far as murder. Viewers are invited to create their own vision of a world free of hate, where senseless acts of violence are a thing of the past.

On Wednesday, Sept. 8, Scarpo will present the talk "Why Do You Hate Me?" at 7 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center. Over the past five years, Scarpo has addressed over 125,000 people in each U.S. state and 10 foreign countries. He takes his collective experiences and shares with his audience not only the issues of hate and diversity but also self-hate and self-esteem. "Why Do You Hate Me?" is an interactive program that explores solutions for individuals to become more vibrant, successful and creative people.

PlayRights Presents 'One Night' Program

PlayRights will bring its educational theater back to FSU Thursday, Sept. 9, with "One Night," to help students and the community explore the issue of dating violence. The performances will be at 3:30 and 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Pealer Recital Hall. It is free and open to the public.

"One Night" is an original theatre program featuring four actors in a powerful story about rape among friends. One night, they get together to celebrate the end of classes, drinking beer, joking around and having fun. What happens behind closed doors later that night throws each character into an unexpectedly intense situation that will change their friendships forever. At critical points in the plot, the actors will stop the action and remain in character while audience members ask them questions to find out more about what really happened, as well as to

uncover each character's motives, feelings, opinions and plans.

Pulitzer Prize Winner to Read at Main St. Books

Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Stephen Dunn will be doing a reading from his new book of poems, *The Insistence of Beauty*, on Wednesday, Sept. 8, at 7:30 p.m. at Main Street Books in Frostburg. Dunn will also be available to sign copies of the book, which will be published by W. W. Norton on Sept. 7.

Dunn is the author of twelve collections of poetry, including *Different Hours*, for which he won the 2001 Pulitzer Prize for poetry, *Loosestrife*, a National Book Critics Circle Award finalist, and *Local Time*, winner of The National Poetry Series. He is the recipient of numerous awards for his writing, including the Academy Award in Literature from The American Academy of Arts and Letters, fellowships from the Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundations and three National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowships.

Dunn will be serving this year as guest editor of "Nightsun," the FSU-published literary annual of contemporary poetry, fiction and interviews. He is distinguished professor of Creative Writing at Richard Stockton College of New Jersey.

Visiting Writer to Offer Poetry Reading

FSU's new Center for Creative Writing welcomes its first visiting writer for the fall semester, Gregory Djanikian, who will give a reading on Thursday, Sept. 23, 7:30 in Lane University Center room 140-141.

The author of four collections of poems and director of the creative writing program at the University of Pennsylvania, Djanikian was born in Alexandria, Egypt, of Armenian parentage. He emigrated to the United States when he was 8 years old. His insightful work investigates intimacies and distances, quarrels and gifts, romance and illness. What is it like, Djanikian

asks, to imagine vengeance against the neighborhood thug? To realize "by the time we were finished/ we didn't know/

how far we had gone/ or where we had lost/ our own voices"?

Djanikian's probing and eventempered poems navigate between largeness of feeling and compression of style. It is his "sense of precision about distances," Alec Marsh of *The Boston* Book Review writes, "his awareness of engaging nostalgia, his willingness to step beyond cleverness, which makes his new book so valuable."

How Heat Affects You

Under moderate conditions, the body automatically adjusts itself to keep its temperature within a safe limit. Sweating is the body's most efficient means for getting rid of heat, but the more humid the air, the harder it is for sweat to evaporate and the harder it is for the body to cool off. Under hot and humid conditions inside and out, work becomes harder because much of our blood is going to the surface of the body, and less is available to the active muscles. Loss of salt from sweating can result in fatigue.
