George's Creek Coal & Culture, Iron & Ethnicity

The FSU Geography Club will present a lecture by Adam Lewis entitled "Coal and Culture, Iron and Ethnicity in George's Creek" on Thursday, Nov. 17, at 7 p.m. in Compton Science Center, room 226.

Lewis's lecture will focus on how the owners of the George's Creek Coal and Iron Company (GCC&IC) from 1837 to 1840 used ethnicity to polarize, manipulate and exploit their workforce. The story of the GCC&IC is significant because company journals openly acknowledge the use of ethnicity to exploit the workers. This set the stage for later unity and success of the George's Creek miners. Those miners went on to establish the Maryland State Normal School No.2, which eventually became FSU.

Lewis is a graduate student in FSU's Masters of Arts in Teaching program, with focuses in history and geography.

Tax Relief for 2005 Gifts

The Katrina Emergency Tax Relief Act of 2005 as approved by the U.S. Congress following Hurricane Katrina provides incentives to individuals and corporations to make cash gifts in support of the FSU Foundation Inc. and other non-profit organizations.

Katrina Emergency Tax Relief Act permits gifts of cash made between Aug. 28 and Dec. 31, 2005, to be deducted up to 100 percent of the taxpayer's 2005 federal annual gross income (AGI). This removes the 50 percent limitation for all qualified gifts. Limits that can reduce the value of itemized deductions by 3 percent for some higher income taxpayers have been waived. In addition, the 10 percent deduction limit applicable to corporations has been suspended.

If you are over 59 1/2, you may consider "cashing out" tax-deferred retirement accounts (IRAs). Another option is to give U.S. savings bonds. The amount of the gift will be offset by your deduction that can be fully used this year.

Another choice may be to sell stocks owned for one year or more - that have decreased in value. The long-term capital loss is deductible on your federal return, and the amount of the sale proceeds that are donated would be deductible up to 100 percent of your AGI this year.

Consider this an opportunity to lower or eliminate your federal income tax and support FSU with a year-end charitable gift. As always, consult your financial advisor for complete details.
