FSU Cultural Events Series has added a performance of the Vienna Choir Boys' "Christmas in Vienna" on Monday, Dec. 5, 7:30 p.m. at Fort Hill High School,

Cumberland. The performance scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall of the FSU Performing Arts Center has limited seating available. Both performances are presented in conjunction with Best Western – The Braddock and NBC 25.

The Vienna Choir Boys performed in Frostburg in 2003 to a sold-out house and return to the area to present their holiday concert. People magazine's special 2005 holiday edition includes the Vienna Choir Boys' "Christmas in Vienna" concert in Branson, Mo., as a "Don't Miss Opportunity."

Emperor Maximilian I founded the Vienna Choir Boys more than 500 years ago to provide music for imperial court functions. When the Habsburg Empire fell apart in 1918, no funding was available to maintain the choir. Rather than dissolve the group, director Josef Schnitt decided to rename it as the Wiener Sängerknaben, exchange the imperial uniforms for sailor suits and take the choir on tour. Within a year, the Wiener Sängerknaben was performing in Berlin, Prague, and Zurich, and

the choir's itinerary expanded rapidly.

Today, there are around 100 choristers between the ages of 10 and 14, divided into four touring choirs. "Austria's

singing ambassadors" give around 300 concerts and performances each year in front of almost half a million people, visiting virtually all of Europe, Asia, Australia and the Americas. Their "Christmas in Vienna" concert plays to sold-out audiences across America and is a high demand performance.

'An Evening of Irish Traditional Music' Set

FSU and the Allegany Arts Council will host "An Evening of Irish Traditional Music" at 8 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 10, at the Frostburg Community Center, 27 Water Street.

Performers include FSU exchange student Brid Dunne, of County Limerick, on fiddle; Frostburg resident Jeff Thomas on anglo concertina; and Tipperary man Pat Egan on guitar and vocals.

Dunne descends from a long line of talented musicians, including her father Mickey, widely regarded as one of Ireland's finest pipers. She is an awardwinning musician, who has built a solid reputation as a traditional Irish musician by hosting numerous Limerick music sessions and appearing on Irish radio and television.

In January, concertina player Thomas relocated to Frostburg from Asheville, N.C., where he was known as a leading figure in Asheville's Irish music scene. He began playing more than 15 years ago and has grown into a powerful player, creating a strong following among Irish music aficionados in the Southeast.

Baltimore resident Egan grew up singing and playing in Country Tipperary. A current member of "Chulrua," he developed his own powerfully emotive style of guitar accompaniment and vocal delivery. Egan served his apprenticeship with the Dublin groups "Old Bawn" and "De Min." He also made extensive tours of the Unites States and has also performed in Sweden, Norway, Holland, Germany and Scotland.

The concert will present some of Ireland's finest traditional music and songs. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for students and free for 12 and under.

Prior to the evening event, from 2 to 4 p.m., each musician will offer instrument workshops on Irish music. Egan will present a workshop on guitar style and playing in standard tuning. Dunne's fiddle workshop will concentrate on the distinctive melodic style of Irish traditional music. Thomas' concertina instruction will emphasize the rich ornamentation that can be achieved on

the anglo concertina. Each of the twohour workshops requires a \$25 registration fee.

V-DAY is a worldwide campaign to stop violence against women and girls. It was formed in 1998 by Eve Ensler - the playwright, performer, and author of "The Vagina Monologues."

This year the V-DAY organization at FSU is coming together to raise money to donate to the Family Crisis Resource Center and the Dove Center.
