Moscow Symphony Offers Holiday Classics

The world-famous, all-Russian, 40-member Moscow Symphony Orchestra will usher in the spirit of the holiday season with an unforgettable evening of festive music at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 14, at the Allegany High School Auditorium.

The holiday pops concert, part of the Cultural Events Series at FSU, will include favorites from such composers as Tchaikovsky and Strauss, with a mixture of holiday, Broadway and movie compositions; plus a special singalong portion featuring the vocal talents of an Allegany County High School All Star Choir presenting Craig Courtney's "Musicological

Journey Through the Twelve Days of Christmas" and a Christmas carol medley of traditional holiday songs.

Established in 1989 as the first privately supported orchestra in Russia, the Moscow Symphony Orchestra has become an integral part of Moscow cultural life.

The orchestra has conducted successful concert tours of the United States, Europe, Japan and South Korea, and in 2001 took part in the Festival of Russian Art in Cannes, France.

Winston was born in 1949, grew up mainly in Montana and spent his later formative years in Mississippi and Florida. During this time, his favorite music was instrumental rock and instrumental R&B, including Floyd Cramer, the Ventures, Booker T & the MG's, Jimmy Smith and many more. Inspired by R&B, jazz, blues and rock (especially the Doors), he began playing organ in 1967. In 1971 he switched to the acoustic piano after hearing recordings from the 1920s and the 1930s by the legendary stride pianists Thomas "Fats" Waller and the late Teddy Wilson.

In addition to working on stride piano, he also at this time came up with his own style of melodic instrumental music on solo piano — folk piano. In 1972, he recorded his first solo piano album, "Ballads and Blues 1972," for the late guitarist John Fahey's Takoma label.

His latest solo piano release is "Gulf Coast Blues & Impressions — A Hurricane Relief Benefit," released in September. This album has six compositions by Winston, and pieces by three great New Orleans pianists, Henry Butler, James Booker and Dr. John, as well as George's arrangement of the traditional "When the Saints Go Marching In."

Since 1980 Winston has released nine more solo piano albums.

The piano music Winston is currently working on is about two-thirds New Orleans R&B oriented, and about one-third melodic music played in his folk piano style.

He is also presently concentrating on live performances and is studying the playing of the great New Orleans pianists. Additionally, he is working on interpreting pieces on solo piano by his favorite composers.

Most of the time he is touring, playing solo piano concerts (the "Summer Show" or the "Winter Show"), solo guitar concerts, solo harmonica concerts and solo piano dances.

A variety of activities will be held throughout the FSU Campus the week of Nov. 29 through Dec. 5, in light of World AIDS Day on Dec. 1.

'Living and Loving in a World with AIDS'

FSU will present speaker Elaine Pasqua during the program "Living and Loving in a World with AIDS" at 7 p.m. on Dec. 4 in the Lane University Center room 201. This event is free and open to the public.

Pasqua captivates audiences with persuasive role-playing exercises and hands-on activities demonstrating the realities of HIV infection, allowing students to feel directly involved and emotionally engaged. With the increase of binge drinking on college campuses, Pasqua emphasizes that most HIV infections occur while someone is under the influence. She stresses that individuals need to remain sober so they can be clear-minded to make healthy choices. Other high-risk behaviors such as sharing of needles, unprotected sex and sex with multiple partners are covered. A passionate and engaging storyteller, Pasqua shares the struggles of losing two parents to AIDS.

Pasqua also speaks about the issues of self-respect, protection and prevention, as well as the dishonesty that can lead people to believe they are safe from HIV.



FSU Foundation Inc. Holds Annual Meeting

The annual fall meeting of the FSU Foundation, Inc., was held 0ct. 26 in the Lewis J. Ort Library at FSU.

FSUF President Larry McKenzie presided. New members elected to the board of directors were Mary Clapsaddle, Class of '83, and Ralph Jordan, Class of '68. Clapsaddle is the assistant state superintendent for business services, Maryland State Department of Education, and Jordan is the president and chief executive officer of Trident Heath

The annual audit as conducted by Hohing & Lewis, LLC, Certified Public Accountants, reported revenues for the year exceeding \$3.2 million against a total expense of \$1.6 million. Total assets at the end of the year were declared at \$11,567,938, up nearly \$1.7 million from 2005. Management reported \$1.1 million given in direct support of programs and projects of the university with \$350,000 given in the form of student aid and grants.

Cash charitable contributions totaled \$1.2 million with an additional \$455,008 as receivable pledges. Deferred and planned gifts continue to increase with an estimated value of \$2.1 million. Gifts-in-kind, investments and sponsored programs including summer camps and other revenue-producing programs are included in the revenue totals.

The market value of the endowed assets grew by 18 percent to \$10,636,821 and was managed by the University System of Maryland Foundation. The USMF reported a total investment return of 13.9 percent for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006. The three-year annualized return was reported as 13.8 percent, five years at 6.6 percent and 10 years at 10.4 percent.

Dr. Jonathan Gibralter, FSU president, reported on university programs and the importance of private support for higher education. Dr. Gibralter, who began in August, commented on his initial meetings with students, faculty and staff. He stressed the importance of increasing enrollment numbers, entrance exams scores and positive student behavior. He noted the importance of continued support for financial aid programs as students and families have a growing burden for meeting the financial obligations. He said his goal is to increase fund-raising by \$1 million to \$2 million annually. The president talked about the need for long-range planning, including campus projects and programs such as residential buildings and upgrades. He has met with various alumni and said he is impressed with their dedication and loyalty to the University.

Committee reports were given by board members Trudy Whitace regarding adoption of a fraud policy; Lynn Fike on real estate issues; Larry McKenzie on FSUF's 15-year growth patterns; and Leonard Schwab on board nominations. There was also a report by Dr. Joe Hoffman, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, regarding a new FSU alumni recognition program.

The board is comprised of 35 members representing alumni and friends of FSU. The FSU Foundation provides opportunities for charitable giving in support of



Construction to Affect **Campus Traffic**

The City of Frostburg will be doing a streetscape project on Broadway. The majority of the work will be done in the spring and summer of 2007 but a small portion of the job between Park Avenue and College Avenue will begin on Dec 4.

During the month of December, students at Beall Elementary will be dropped off and picked up on the University Drive side of the school. Buses will make a left turn from College Avenue into the elementary school parking lot, pick up or drop off students, exit the parking lot onto University Drive and leave the general area by traveling south on University Drive. Police officers will direct traffic in the area during the pick-up and drop-off periods.

City of Frostburg and University Police will be on hand to help handle traffic, but it would be best to avoid this area if at all possible.
