## Winter Dance Concert '06 Highlights Talents of Students

# Pianist George Winston to Play at Windsor Hall

The renowned pianist George Winston will make a special appearance in a benefit concert at Windsor Hall at Town Centre in Cumberland, Md., on Monday, Dec. 11. The concert starts at 7:30 p.m.; doors open at 6:30 p.m.

Ticket prices are \$25 for general admission; \$40 for reserved seating; and \$50 for Meet & Greet reserved seating. The Meet & Greet seating will include a post-concert meeting with the artist and reserved seating. Tickets may be purchased at Kauffman Music or by calling the CES box office at x3137 or 1-866-TIXX.CES (1-866-849-9237) or reserved online at http://ces.frostburg.edu . Visa, MasterCard and Discover are accepted.

The concert is presented in partnership with FSU CES Jazz Club sponsored by Kauffman Music. It will benefit Windsor Hall programs. Winston has also requested that all attending bring a non-perishable food item to be donated to the Western Maryland Food Bank.

Winston was born in 1949, grew up mainly in Montana and spent his later formative years in Mississippi and Florida. During this time, his favorite music was instrumental rock and instrumental R&B, including Floyd Cramer, the Ventures, Booker T & the MG's, Jimmy Smith and many more. Inspired by R&B, jazz, blues and rock (especially the Doors), he began playing organ in 1967. In 1971 he switched to the acoustic piano after hearing record-

ings from the 1920s and the 1930s by the legendary stride pianists Thomas "Fats" Waller and the late Teddy Wilson. In addition to working on stride piano, he also at this time came up with his own style of melodic instrumental music on solo piano, called folk piano. In 1972, he recorded his first solo piano album, "Ballads and Blues 1972," for the late guitarist John Fahey's Takoma label.

His latest solo piano release is "Gulf Coast Blues & Impressions — A Hurricane Relief Benefit," released in September. This album has six compositions by Winston, and pieces by three great New Orleans pianists, Henry Butler, James Booker and Dr. John, as well as George's arrangement of the traditional "When the Saints Go Marching In."

Since 1980 Winston has released nine

more solo piano albums.

The piano music Winston is currently working on is about two-thirds New Orleans R&B oriented, and about one-third melodic music played in his folk piano style.

He is also presently concentrating on live performances and is studying the playing of the great New Orleans pianists. Additionally, he is working on interpreting pieces on solo piano by his favorite composers.

Most of the time he is touring, playing solo piano concerts (the "Summer Show" or the "Winter Show"), solo guitar concerts, solo harmonica concerts and solo piano dances.

## Moscow Symphony Offers Holiday Classics

The world-famous, all-Russian, 40-member Moscow Symphony Orchestra will usher in the spirit of the holiday season with an unforgettable evening of holiday music at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 14, at the Allegany High School Auditorium.

The holiday pops concert, part of the Cultural Events Series at Frostburg State University, will include favorites from such composers as Tchaikovsky and Strauss, with a mixture of holiday, Broadway, and movie compositions; plus a special sing-along portion featuring the vocal talents of an Allegany County High School All Star Choir presenting Craig Courtney's "Musicological Journey Through the Twelve Days of Christmas" and a Christmas carol medley of traditional holiday songs.

Established in 1989 as the first privately supported orchestra in Russia, the Moscow Symphony Orchestra has become an integral part of Moscow cultural life.

The orchestra has conducted successful concert tours of the United States, Europe, Japan and South Korea, and in 2001 took part in the Festival of Russian Art in Cannes, France.

## **Events Occurring to Mark World AIDS Day**

A variety of activities will be held throughout the FSU Campus the week of Nov. 29 through Dec. 5, in light of World AIDS Day on Dec. 1.

#### Free HIV Testing Available

In recognition of World AIDS Day on Dec. 1, Brady Health Center will offer limited appointment slots for HIV testing between Nov. 28 and Dec. 5 at no cost (the \$10.00 user fee will be waived). This offer is for HIV antibody testing only and does not include testing for other sexually transmitted infections.

People who are at risk for HIV and should consider annual testing include individuals who have injected drugs and shared equipment; had unprotected intercourse with someone who is or might be infected with HIV (e.g. partner who injected drugs, has been diagnosed or treated for a sexually transmitted infection or hepatitis, has had multiple or anonymous sex partners, or has exchanged sex for drugs or money); had unprotected vaginal or anal intercourse with more than one sex partner; or have been diagnosed or treated for a sexually transmitted infection

The CDC now recommends routine, voluntary HIV screening as a routine part of health care for all patients aged 13–64 years.

#### 'Living and Loving in a World with AIDS'

FSU will present speaker Elaine Pasqua during the program "Living and Loving in a World with AIDS" at 7 p.m. on Dec. 4 in the Lane University Center room 201. This event is free and open to the public.

Pasqua captivates audiences with persuasive role-playing exercises and hands-on activities demonstrating the realities of HIV infection, allowing students to feel directly involved and emotionally engaged. With the increase of binge drinking on college campuses, Pasqua emphasizes that most HIV infections occur while someone is under the influence. She stresses that individuals need to remain sober so they can be clear-minded to make healthy choices. Other high-risk behaviors such as sharing of needles, unprotected sex and sex with multiple partners are covered. A passionate and engaging storyteller, Pasqua shares the struggles of losing two parents to AIDS.

Pasqua also speaks about the issues of self-respect, protection and prevention, as well as the dishonesty that can lead people to believe they are safe from HIV.

FSU's 2006-2007 International Film Series continues at 7 p.m. on Dec. 1, in the Lane University Center, Atkinson room 201 with "The Dying Gaul." This film is free and open to the public.

"The Dying Gaul" is about a griefstricken screenwriter, Robert, who unknowingly enters a three-way relationship with a woman and her film executive husband. #### **David Sanford Graduate Scholarship**

#### F. Perry Smith Jr. Graduate Scholarship

The F. Perry Smith Jr. Graduate Scholarship is offered to a student who must have completed high school education or the equivalency in either Allegany or Garrett counties in Maryland and be enrolled at FSU with an overall GPA of 3.0 or better. The recipient must demonstrate financial need (complete and submit the FAFSA form). Applications are available at the Office of Graduate Services, 141 Pullen Hall or by calling x7053. Deadline is March 1, 2007; five awards of between \$500 and \$1500 are given annually.

#### Graduate Assistantships/Int'l Fellowships

Applications for graduate assistantship positions and international fellowships for the academic year beginning with the spring 2007 semester are available.
