University Theatre will kick off its 2006-2007 season with the hit musical "Urinetown" at 7:30 p.m. Oct. 6, 7, 12, 13, 14 and at 2 p.m. Oct. 7 and 14 in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre.

Inspired by the works of Bertolt
Brecht and Kurt Weill, "Urinetown" is a
boy-meets-girl romance that takes place
during the revolutionary time in the
near future, when private toilets are
banned and water is worth its weight in
gold. With music and lyrics by Mark
Holloman and book and lyrics by Greg
Kotis, "Urinetown" is a witty, irreverent,
unique play that both satirizes and
honors the rich traditions of musical
theatre, touching on everything from
"West Side Story" to "Les Misberables."

Joseph Langham's "Out to Lunch" will be performed at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 10, 11, 16, 17 and 18, with a matinee performance on Nov. 11 at 2 p.m., in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. In this rowdy and risky, entertaining play, Numba Won and Numba Two (two clueless geeks) begin a meaningless, daylong "campout" at a diner where an eclectic, absurd and often irrelevant array of characters labor to make their diner experience fulfilling.

"Eurydice" by Sarah Ruhl will run at 7:30 p.m. March 2, 3, 8, 9, and 10, with a 2 p.m. matinee performance on March 3, in the Drama Theatre. The tragic story of Eurydice and Orpheus is a cornerstone of mythology and has been retold in nearly every art form. Avoiding the usual romanticism and melodrama, "Eurydice" is an impressionistic interpretation of a timeless, haunting story. Focusing more on



"Unrinetown," about a time when water is precious and private toilets are banned, leads off University Theatre's season.

Eurydice's relationship with her father than Orpheus, it unfolds in an Underworld setting that bears more resemblance to "Alice in Wonderland" than to the mythical Hades. "Eurydice" is a play about words and language, forgetfulness and memory and re-discovering one's voice.

The Main Stage series will close with an all African-American production of John Steinbeck's classic, "Of Mice and Men," with 7:30 p.m. performances in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre on April 13, 14, 19, 20, and 21 and an afternoon performance at 2 p.m. on April 14. "Of Mice and Men" is the moving story of George and his simpleminded friend Lennie, two lonely and alienated Depression-era drifters who dream of buying a ranch together. Shortly after they begin working on a

Salinas Valley Ranch, their hopes take a turn for the worse. The two men discover the harsh flip side of the American Dream, and their friendship is tragically tested beyond normal limits.

The Student Directed production series "Season Too!" will run performances of "Earth and Sky" by Douglas Post on Oct. 27 and 28. Academy award winner Alan Ball's "Five Women Wearing the Same Dress" will be presented on Feb. 23 and 24. Both productions will begin at 7:30 in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. All tickets are \$5.00.

In a change from previous years, all evening performances will begin at 7:30 p.m. Matinee performances will continue to run at 2 p.m.

Tickets are \$10 for the general public and \$5 for students. Season Discount Flex Cards are also available. For \$30 you receive four main stage tickets—a \$10 savings. You can spread tickets throughout the Main Stage season, or use all four tickets at one show.

# 'Science, Religion & Intelligent Design'

# **Philosophical Forum to Discuss Vegetative States**

The Philosophical Forum will sponsor a lecture followed by discussion from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 19, in the Atkinson Room, Lane University Center 201.

The lecture, titled "Persistent Vegetative State, Prospective Thinking, and Advance Directives," will be presented by Thomas A. Mappes, professor of philosophy. Dr. Mappes has taught at FSU since 1973 and is the co-editor of *Biomedical Ethics*, sixth edition (McGraw-Hill, 2006).

How would you want to be treated if you existed in a state permanently devoid of consciousness? Persistent vegetative state (PVS)-much discussed in conjunction with the high-profile case of Terry Schiavo—can be understood as "a clinical condition of complete unawareness of the self and the environment, accompanied by sleepwake cycles...." These words are drawn from a landmark document, the 1994 Multi-Society Task Force Report on the medical aspects of PVS. Dr. Mappes's presentation will begin with a discussion of PVS, focusing on concerns related to both diagnosis and prognosis, and paying special attention to the Task Force Report. His analysis will bring into clear view both diagnostic and prognostic uncertainties related to PVS. He will then explore the impact of these uncertainties on prospective thinking regarding the possibility of PVS and also consider the closely related question of how prospective thinkers might craft advance directives in order to deal most effectively with this possibility.

# Former High-Ranking CIA Analyst to Speak

Ray McGovern, a former high-ranking CIA analyst who served under seven U.S. presidents and presented morning intelligence briefings at the White House for many years, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 20, in the Alice R. Manicur Hall of Lane University Center.

McGovern's duties at CIA included chairing National Intelligence Estimates and preparing the President' Daily Brief (PDB). Considered the most authoritative genres of intelligence reporting, these briefs have been the focus of press reporting on "weapons of mass destruction" in Iraq and on what the president was told before 9/11. In January 2003, McGovern along with some other alumni in the intelligence community founded Veteran Intelligence Professional for Sanity (VIPS). In addition to co-authoring some of VIPS' issuances, McGovern has published some 20 op-eds over the past year on intelligence-related issues.

## Appalachian Festival Highlights Region

FSU will celebrate the Appalachian culture found in Western Maryland and the surrounding mountain region with a daylong outdoor festival on Saturday, Sept. 23, starting at 10 a.m.

FSU's Appalachian Festival, what is hoped to be one of many, will transform the University's upper quad into a celebration of the wide-ranging influences of Appalachian culture, showcasing the region's finest artistic and musical traditions, along with a wide variety of living history presentations, talks on local flora and fauna and plenty of food. All daytime activities, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., are free and open to the public.

To kick off the festival, on Friday, Sept. 22, the historic Frostburg Palace Theatre on Main Street will present two feature-length documentaries focusing on Appalachian life, "Stranger With A Camera" and "Sludge." The director of "Sludge," Robert Salyer, will speak as part of a discussion following the films.

Saturday will be filled with music of Appalachia ranging from traditional folk and bluegrass to bagpipes to an African American gospel choir, all performed by regional artists on the FSU outdoor stage. Goat milking demonstrations, archaeological exhibitions and living history activities can also be found on festival grounds. An Appalachian Wagon Train will visit the festival from noon to 1 p.m.

The festival's activities will be divided into a series of thematic tents. The Appalachian Explorations tent will offer presentations in the history of the region and the scientific underpinnings of what makes the area special, including wildlife, farming and the study of native plants and their uses. The Folkways tent will offer introductions to such Appalachian arts as shape note singing, basket making and beekeeping. In the Children's Hands-On tent, kids can try out crafts like weaving, cornhusk dolls, quilt puzzles and much more. The Arts and Crafts tent will provide a broad range of demonstrations and sales of Appalachian handiwork and locally Amish-made crafts, from furniture to needlework to braided rugs.

The day's events will be capped off with "From Ireland to Appalachia," a concert featuring Liz Carroll, John Doyle, Dirk Powell and Bruce Molsky performing the best in traditional acoustic music in the Pealer Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center. Separately, all are geniuses of their instruments—exciting performers and composers who take the traditions of Irish, Appalachian and rural American music into daring, inventive directions. Carroll

and Doyle represent the best of traditional Irish music, while Molsky and Powell demonstrate some of the finest American folk music.

## Exhibition Features Four Very Different Artists

An exhibition at FSU's Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery is taking a closer look at how the passage of time and images from dreams shape memory and imagination. Featuring a colorful mix of paintings, collages and other works by four distinct artists, "Instigators of Memory" will be on view at the gallery through Sept. 27.

Gail Watkins, an artist based in Annapolis, Md., creates richly collaged abstract paintings that play with perceptions of time by fusing the Pop art aesthetic of American comic strips with ancient motifs and antiqued surfaces.

Connecticut-based Ann Weiner also relies on familiar imagery in her mixed-media artwork. Weiner uses antique dolls, emblems of childhood and innocence, to depict the progress of a spiritual journey.

Registration for the Fall 2006 BITS (Basic Information Technology Skills) Test will take place from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday, Sept. 11, through Friday, Sept. 15, at the FSU Bookstore.

The BITS Test is one option available to FSU students following the FSU Undergraduate Catalog 2005–2007 to meet the technology fluency graduation requirement. Students must score 70 percent or higher on this 100-item, timed, online group-proctored test to fulfill their technology fluency graduation requirement. To register for the BITS Test, students must present their FSU Student IDs and pay a non-refundable \$15 registration fee. 

## WFWM 'Dialogues' Features FSU Folklorist

Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas, FSU folklorist, is the featured guest for the latest edition of the locally produced program "Dialogues" on WFWM 91.9 FM, public radio from FSU. This edition will air at 1 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 10, with a repeat airing on Monday, Sept. 11, at 7:10 p.m.

Thomas, who received her doctorate in Folklore and American Studies from Indiana University Bloomington, was selected by the University as its first folklorist in over 20 years as part of an effort to place folklorists throughout the state by Maryland Traditions, a partnership of the Maryland State Arts Council and the Maryland Historical Trust. Concerned with the study of human creativity and tradition as a reflection of culture, community, and/or place, Rogers Thomas and her students are documenting a variety of regional traditions, including family recipes, narratives, beliefs and customs, music, folk art and more. She is an integral force behind the University's first Appalachian Festival, which will be held on campus Saturday, Sept. 23. In addition, she has produced a series of two-minute informational segments titled "Featuring Folklore," which began airing on WFWM Public Radio this month.

"Dialogues," hosted by Dr. Keith Schlegel, presents conversations with University faculty on significant topics of local, national or international interest. It is produced by WFWM Public Radio in cooperation with the FSU Department of English.

Schlegel has taught at FSU since 1971 and recently completed his third term as English department chair. The author and performer of a dramatic monologue in the character of Walt Whitman as "The Good, Gray Poet," he is also heard every Thurs-

day at 5:25~p.m. on WFWM as the voice of "Oasis," where "poetry and history meet."
