FSU will celebrate and recognize the achievements of its December 2007 graduating class during the University's 131st commencement ceremonies Saturday, **Dec. 15**, in the Harold J. Cordts Physical Education Center's Main Arena on the FSU campus.

Dr. Jonathan C. Gibralter, FSU
President, will confer degrees on
graduates during two exercises throughout the day. The College of Business and
the College of Education ceremonies will
start at 10 a.m. and the College of
Liberal Arts and Sciences will present
degrees beginning at 2 p.m.

Courtney Kamauf, College of Business; Heather Shanholtz, College of Education; and Shavonne Shorter, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, are the featured student speakers for the winter commencement exercises. Thomas G. Slater, a member of the University System of Maryland Board of Regents, will offer a congratulatory greeting at the morning ceremony.

In the words of her professors, Kamauf, a quantitative economics major, "impressed everyone in the department with her maturity, congeniality and academic performance." It was these qualities that helped Kamauf sail through courses such as micro and macroeconomic theory, and 23 credit hours of math, all while maintaining a perfect 4.0 and a busy schedule. During her time at FSU, Kamauf, a resident of Cresaptown, Md., had the honor of serving as an intern with former Sen. Paul Sarbanes. She also was treasurer of the math honors society, Kappa Mu Epsilon, and a member of the business honors organization, Beta Gamma Sigma. Kamauf's professors feel confident she will represent the College of Business and FSU extremely well, given her history of outstanding scholarship and

enthusiastic involvement at FSU.

Shanholtz arrived at FSU with a dream she had known since she was five years old—to become a teacher, just like generations of her family before her. Throughout her time here, the Frederick, Md., resident has worked steadily toward her goal by serving as a teacher intern at Middletown Primary School and Middletown Elementary School and helping as a teacher assistant at Flintstone Elementary School—all while maintaining a 3.7 grade point average. The Council of University System Staff (CUSS) is again accepting nominations for the Board of Regents' University System of Maryland Staff Awards. Graduate Student Scholarship

The recipient must be enrolled full time or part time as a graduate student, have previously been an undergraduate at FSU and have received a varsity sport participation letter. Deadline is **March 1, 2008**; one award of \$500 is given annually.

F. Perry Smith Jr. Graduate Scholarship

The recipient must have completed high school education or the equivalency in either Allegany or Garrett Counties in Maryland and be enrolled at FSU with an overall grade point average of 3.0 or better. FSU's COB Profs Win 'Best Paper'

Drs. Thomas F. Hawk and Amit Shah won national recognition for FSU's College of Business when their paper, "Using Learning Style Instruments to Enhance Student Learning," was named 2007 Best Paper in the "Decision

Sciences Journal of Innovative Education." The honor was announced at the 38th Annual Meeting of the **Decision Sciences** Institute Nov. 17 through Nov. 20 in Phoenix.

This is a very prestigious award. It highlights the quality of our FSU faculty,

Raise Your Vote Voter Registration Returns

The Student Center for Volunteerism (SCV) is pleased to announce the return of the Raise Your Vote Voter Registration Campaign for the 2008 Election Season. During this year's campaign, FSU students will have the ability to register to vote in the Maryland Primary Election, request an absentee ballot and get general information about voting in Maryland.

Here are a few tips to ensure that your vote counts in the 2008 Maryland Primary:

- 1. The last day to register to vote in the Maryland Primary Election is Tuesday, **Jan. 22**, at 9 p.m.
 - 2. When you register, please make

sure the person who registers you is certified to do so in Maryland. If they can't produce a certification card, don't register with

them.
3. If you need an absentee ballot, make sure you request one early. The deadline to make a request for the Primary by mail or fax is Tuesday, Feb. 5. To apply after that date (through Election Day), you must apply in person at your local board of elections.

4. If you choose to mail your form, make sure it is postmarked on the deadline date or earlier, or your vote won't count.

Safety Message

Be Safe This Holiday Season!

Here are a few helpful tips to get you through the holidays safely!

Trees:

When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "fire resistant." Although this does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning.

When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness: green needles are hard to pull

off branches and do not break when bent between the fingers. The trunk

butt of a fresh tree is sticky with

resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles. PLEASE NOTE:

No fresh-cut trees or fresh-

No fresh-cut trees or freshcut decorations are allowed in any campus building. When setting up a tree at

home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators and electric heaters. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to

keep the stand filled with water. Cut two inches off the trunk of the tree and place it in water.

Use only non-combustible or flameresistant materials to trim a tree. When purchasing any decorations, look for those that are non-flammable or treated for fire resistance.

Lights:

Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be

sure they have been certified for outdoor use. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house, walls or



other fire supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples to hold strings in place, not nails or tacks. Or run strings of lights through hooks. When using lights outdoors, try to use approved GFCE's (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters): they will protect you if a short happens.

Turn off all lights when you go to bed, leave the house or leave your office. The lights could short out and start a fire.

Candles:

Candles are not allowed in any campus building. Special permission is granted by the Safety Office for those special events that require the use of candles

Enjoy the holiday season, have a great time away from work with your friends and family. Remember, taking a moment to find a safe way to do something you enjoy is not wasting time!

Remove Ice, Snow From All Windows of Vehicle Before Getting on the Road
