Learn About Renewable Energy

Conference an Educational Opportunity

Learn more about the possibilities of new energy sources and energy conservation methods, ideas, products and practices when FSU hosts the Renewable Energy Symposium and Exhibition Sept. 14 and 15 at the Compton Science Center on campus.

The two-day gathering, organized by FSU's Dr. Oguz Soysal and Hilkat Soysal, in collaboration with the Maryland Energy Administration, will bring together various facets of the academic and professional community from around the region, including faculty and students, entrepreneurs, small business owners, local and state administrators, legislators, media and industry representatives. The conference will explore topics such as a critical assessment of wind and solar energy potential; the socio-economic implications, design considerations and financial incentives of wind and solar energy; and the environmental impacts associated with wind and solar energy development.

The conference will also offer the public an opportunity to check out FSU's new Wind-Solar Energy Generation System (WISE) that was constructed near the Fuller House at 19 Braddock Road this summer. The grid-connected hybrid

generation system, which features a 1.8 kW Skystream 3.7 wind turbine mounted on a 33-foot monopole tower and 10 solar panels, was constructed as part of a University-wide project Dr. Soysal began in 2006 with funding from a Maryland Energy Administration grant. In addition to the presentation of many papers highlighting ideas and challenges in renewable energy, the conference will also include displays of various renewable



energy products and projects.

The Symposium and Exhibition are open to the public for a small registration fee to cover distributed materials and lunch. Registration is \$20 for students, \$60 for non-student participants. Interested parties may also register on site at the conference.

"Into the Woods," with music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim and book by James Lapine, will kick off the Main





Religious Observances

It is the policy of FSU that the academic programs and services of the University shall be available to all qualified students who have been admitted to its programs, regardless of their religious beliefs. Students shall not be penalized because of observances of their religious holidays and shall be given an opportunity to make up, within a reasonable time period, any academic assignment that is missed due to individual participation in religious observances. It is the responsibility of the student to notify his/her instructor of conflicts between religious observances and scheduled course activities.

Courtesy suggests that students should notify their instructors of conflicts and make arrangements for making up missed work PRIOR to an absence due to religious observance.

Exceptions to Grad Requirements

All students who would like to petition for approval of an exception to a baccalaureate degree or General Education requirement must appeal to the Academic Standards Subcommittee. A written request (including supporting letters and documentation, as appropriate) is due in the Office of the Provost, Hitchins 213, no later than Sept. 13, Oct. 11 and Nov. 15 during the fall 2007 semester. Students: Register for Fall 2007 BITS Test

FSU students following the 2005–2007 or the 2007–2009 FSU undergraduate



catalogs can opt to take the BITS Test to meet their technology fluency graduation requirement. With this option, students must score

70 percent or higher on this 100-item, timed, online, group-proctored test. To review other options, look at "Undergraduate Degree Requirements" [Item #9] in the Academic Life section of the FSU undergraduate catalog.

To register for the BITS Test, go to the FSU Bookstore for Registration Week Monday, Sept. 10, through Friday, Sept. 14, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., present your FSU student ID and pay your non-refundable \$15 registration fee. In addition to payment by cash, check or Bobcat Express, Visa, MasterCard and Discover are accepted.

BITS Test sessions will be offered at 7:30 p.m. on the evenings of Monday, Oct. 15, Tuesday, Oct. 16, and Wednesday, Oct. 17. The sessions will be held in Pullen Hall 107-110 depending on how many students register for each session.

PLEASE NOTE: You must present your student ID to register for the test and bring it with you to present it at your chosen BITS Test session. A student can register/pay and take the BITS Test only once per semester. NO credits are associated and/or available with this option. Any student with a disability needing accommodation should contact the Office of Disability Support Services (x4483) as soon as possible after registering.

Professor Performs Organ Concerts

FSU music professor Joan DeVee Dixon will present a series of organ concerts featuring music from the Czech Republic on Friday, Sept. 14, and Sunday, Sept. 16.

The Friday night "Mass for Spillville" will begin at 7 p.m. at St. John's Episcopal Church, 58 Broadway St., Frostburg, celebrated by the Rev. Rick Morley. The Sunday organ concert will begin at 4 p.m. at First Presbyterian Church on 11 Washington St. in Cumberland. Both programs, part of FSU's Faculty Artist Series, are free and open to the public.

Dixon's composition, "Polka Mass for Spillville" was commissioned by the Czech Heritage Partnership in Spillville, Iowa. The world premiere was given at St. Wenceslaus Church, the same congregation where Dvorak spent his famed Iowa summer in 1893. Dixon's Mass setting draws upon several influential Czech hymns, waltzes and chants.

"Polka Mass" is the term used for a worship service in which, traditionally, a polka band accompanies all of the music. Musical selections are based on the sacred texts of the Catholic Mass, arranged in a polka style.

Dixon's concert program at First Presbyterian Church in Cumberland will feature selections by Czech composers Dvorak, Nelhybel, Havlicek, Wiedermann and Strejc. American selections by Paul Manz and Fred Bock will include well-known hymn settings. The program will conclude with a set of original settings of American spirituals by Dixon, "Down by the Riverside," "I've got Shoes," "Give Me Jesus" and "When the Saints go Marching In."

Celebrate Appalachian Culture at Festival

The public is invited to learn more about the region's rich cultural heritage during FSU's Second Annual Appalachian Festival Sept. 21 and 22. The event brings together a variety of performers and craftspeople to celebrate the natural landscape, history, food and musical and artistic offerings of Western Maryland and the surrounding areas. Film, live music performances, storytelling and public demonstrations of timeless traditions are among the countless festivities that make up this year's event, many of which are free and open to the public and suitable for the whole family.

Then Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., FSU's Upper Quad comes alive with a variety of activities, demonstrations and music performances, all free and open to the public. Regional music, displays and sales of traditional arts and crafts, Appalachian food, history presentations, children's activities,

environmental talks, storytelling and more will be going on throughout the day.

Saturday concludes with a special music concert featuring Jay Ungar and Molly Mason at 7:30 p.m. at the Palace Theatre. Ungar and Mason perform a variety of musical selections, including hard-driving Appalachian melodies, Cajun and Celtic fiddle tunes, stirring Civil War classics, sassy songs from the Golden Age of swing and country and moving original works. They gained widespread recognition for their soundtrack work in Ken Burns' PBS series, "The Civil War," including the haunting performance of Ungar's original composition, "Ashokan Farewell."


