FSU Presents Draft Strategic Plan

FSU's Strategic Planning Team will seek public input on FSU's Draft Strategic Plan on **Monday**, **Dec. 1**, and **Tuesday**, **Dec. 2**, in the Leake Room of the Cordts PE Center. The draft plan will be presented at 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. on Dec. 1.

Members of the FSU community, and others with an interest in the University, are invited to participate in a Planning Charrette, which is a final collaborative effort to obtain stakeholder input, anytime from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Dec. 2. Participants are encouraged to socialize, tour the steps of the planning process, discuss aspects of the draft plan and provide valuable input for the final Strategic Plan. The key elements of the Strategic Plan that will be presented include environmental analysis and planning assumptions, vision, mission, core values, master goals, themes, strategic directions, key performance indicators and potential action items. FSU Planning Units will learn how they can shape the final Strategic Plan. The team will also provide recommendations for long-term strategic management at FSU. Refreshments will be provided.

President Jonathan Gibralter encouraged constituents to become involved in the planning process. "I have been extremely pleased with the collegiality and openness that has existed on the Strategic Planning Team. The group has worked for over a year and a half to develop a focused, strategic plan to move Frostburg State University into a strong and confident future. It is now time for faculty, staff, students, the local community and other stakeholders to react to the draft plan, and I hope everyone will take the time to honor the hard work of the Strategic Planning Team by becoming involved," Gibralter said.

The Strategic Planning Team has been meeting since the fall of 2007 under the leadership of Dr. Danny Arnold, Dean of the College of Business, and Dr. Amit Shah, Professor of Management.


A simultaneously tragic, funny and serious take on the aftermath of 9/11,

FSU, Frostburg Will Present Daylong Storybook Holiday

The opening celebration will occur at Failinger's Historic Hotel Gunter on Main Street, where guests can enjoy "Breakfast With the Elves" for \$5 a person at 8:30 or 9:15 a.m. The second annual Elf Olympics will begin at 9 a.m., followed by a performance from the Frostburg Dance Academy. Safety Message Driving Safety Tips for Winter

Slow down, reduce your speed and follow the speed limits.

Use these three good-driving safety tips in bad weather!

Winter won't technically be here for another month, but the weather we associate with it has already arrived. That means it's time to slow down and use caution when driving on roads that may be snowy or icy. AAA Mid-Atlantic offers some tips for surviving on wintry roads:

- Clear any snow or ice from all windows, mirrors, lights, hood, roof and trunk of your vehicle.
- Drive with your headlights on (old or newer vehicles).
- Keep a shovel and some rock salt, sand or kitty litter in the car in case you need to get unstuck from the snow or ice.
- Slow down Stopping distances are longer in snowy and icy conditions than on dry roads. Increase your following distance.
- If you have an antilock braking system, keep the pedal depressed and do not pump the brakes. If you do not have antilock brakes, pump the brakes gently at a rapid pace.
- If you skid on a slick surface, keep your composure and do not panic.
 Take your foot off the brake or accelerator and steer into the direction the vehicle is traveling to gain traction. When you accelerate, do so slowly.
- Use extra caution on bridges and overpasses - They freeze first and melt last.
- Drive in cleared lanes Changing lanes unnecessarily puts you at greater risk of hitting a patch of ice between lanes that may cause you to lose control of the vehicle. Also avoid passing snowplows or salt trucks unless it is absolutely necessary.
- Never use cruise control on slick roads (snow or ice covered).

Four-wheel-drive vehicles are great for initial traction and avoiding getting stuck, but when moving, they have the same difficulty keeping control and stopping as other vehicles.
