Gibralter Honored with National Award for Role in Innovative Alcohol Prevention Work

FSU President Jonathan Gibralter was honored on Sept. 3 with a national award recognizing his success in promoting a vibrant intellectual and social campus climate that de-emphasizes the role of alcohol. In the

midst of a debate among college presidents around the legal drinking age, Gibralter, along with the 17 other presidents who were nominated, stands out as an example of the real work being done to address this perennial, up-at-night issue for college campuses across the country.

The Presidential Leadership Award was developed by seven major higher education organizations, including the American College Personnel Association, American Council on Education, Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, Gordie Foundation, NASPA, Outside The Classroom, and United Educators. The goal: to highlight and congratulate the college and university presidents who have demonstrated keen vision and innovative leadership by developing and implementing a comprehensive strategy that not only addresses the specific educational needs of individuals but also seeks to bring about change at the institutional, community and public policy levels. The award carries a \$50,000 donation made to the institution in the name of the recipient.

'We've been glad to see the visibility of high-risk drinking raised through the recent conversation among college presidents," said Brandon Busteed, Founder and CEO of Outside The Classroom and a Representative of the Presidential Leadership Award Review Panel. "We're even more pleased to see practical examples of presidents who have begun to make progress on their campuses and in their communities. On behalf of all of the participating organizations, I want to congratulate Dr. Gibralter for his vision and implementation of programs and policies that have helped create a campus community less defined by alcohol.

By re-conceptualizing the way in which Frostburg views the issue of alcohol abuse, Gibralter has facilitated effective partnerships with students, staff, faculty, city residents and city officials. He provided support for student-led initiatives and was personally involved in bringing together onand off-

campus law enforcement agencies that led to a dramatic improvement in the sharing of information. As a result, the alcohol issue is no longer viewed as a constant source of contention between the university and the city of Frostburg. Instead, community leaders now actively partner with University officials to change the culture of alcohol abuse at both the campus and community levels.

Gibralter created a campus-wide Alcohol Task Force that meets twice each semester to address four key issues: Campus and Community, Policy and Procedures, Alternative Programming, and Today's Student. The Task Force makes recommendations in each of these four areas, which are then prioritized and implemented as resources are identified. As a result of the dialogue that has been facilitated by these meetings, FSU now sends representatives to meet with city groups such as the University Neighbors Association and the Frostburg Business and Professional Association. Gibralter has personally met with these groups and has also reached out on multiple occasions to have discussions with alcohol distributors in the area.

The National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) cites more than 1,700 alcohol-related deaths among college students each year, with another 500,000 injuries, 70,000 sexual assaults, and 159,000 first-year student dropouts due to alcohol and other drugs every year.

The award was developed by the American College Personnel Association, American Council on Education, Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, Gordie Foundation, NASPA, Outside The Classroom, and United Educators. Financial support is provided by the Gordie Foundation and Outside The Classroom.

CES Opens with 'Forbidden Broadway: Special Victims Unit'

In 1982 an unemployed actor, Gerard Alessandrini, wanted a showcase for his talents. He decided to assemble some of the musical parodies of Broadway shows he had written since childhood into a nightclub act, and "Forbidden Broadway" was born. Critics and audiences were wowed and it has since become New York's longest running musical comedy revenue.

Now in its ninth reincarnation, "Forbidden Broadway: Special Victims Unit" comes to the stage at Frostburg State University at 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 12, in the Pealer Recital Hall of FSU's Performing Arts Center. "Forbidden Broadway" is the opening production of the 2008-2009 Cultural Events Series at FSU.

"Forbidden Broadway" pays scathing and hilarious homage to Broadway's biggest shows and brightest stars, continuing the series' tradition of spoofing Broadway shows. It opens with the traditional parody of "Little Orphan Annie," portraying a bitter actress who portrayed Annie 20 years before and is now out of her prime, but not out of her Annie costume. She is shot suddenly and the shooting was no accident; it was a bust of another lousy Broadway show. The parodies and laughter begin.

This year's "Special Victims" include the puppets of "Avenue Q," the witches of "Wicked," Billy Joel's "Movin' Out," Robert Goulet in "La Cage aux Folles" and new looks at old favorites, including "Little Shop of Horrors," "Les Miserables," "Beauty and the Beast," "The Lion King" and "Chicago." Rounding out the laughs are Mel Brooks' "The

University Theatre Launches World Tour

Have you ever wanted to venture around the world, but couldn't afford it? Let University Theatre take you on a tour that starts in Paris and ends in ancient Greece during the 2008-2009 season.

"Victor/Victoria" will run from Oct. 10 - 18 at 7:30 p.m., with matinee performances on Oct. 11 and 18 at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre. Adapted from the musical film success, "Victor/Victoria" opened on Broadway in 1995 with the incomparable Julie Andrews in the title role of a nearly starved singer in 1930s Paris, where males impersonating females is all the rage on stage. Desperate for a job, Victoria Grant disguises herself as a man who then impersonates a woman and becomes a singing sensation. "Victor/Victoria" is gender-bending at its comedic best!

'Incorruptible," Michael Hollinger's, dark comedy about the dark ages will run from Nov. 7 - 15 at 7:30 p.m. with a matinee on Nov. 8 at 2 p.m. in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. The setting is Priseaux, France, circa 1250 B.C.E., where the Abbott and his brother monks have fallen on hard times as Sainte Foy, the patron of the monastery, hasn't worked a miracle in 13 years! They count on a visit from the Pope, until a rival church claims to possess the actual relics of Sainte Foy, which are working miracles and their coffers are overflowing. The destitute monks take a lesson from a larcenous one-eyed minstrel, who teaches them an outrageous new way to pay old debts. "Incorruptible" is a fun and gentle rib-poking look at how humans gleefully twist convictions in order to rationalize bad behavior.

Next, "bobrauschenbergamerica" offers a wild road trip through our American landscape from Feb. 27 –

March 7 at 7:30 p.m. with a matinee performance on Feb. 28 at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre. In the spirit of one of America's greatest artists, Robert Rauschenberg, Charles Mee paints a collage of people and places and music and dancing by the way of love stories and picnics and business schemes and shootings and chicken jokes and golfing. "bobrauschenbergamerica" embodies the exhilaration of living in a country where people make up their lives as they go.

The Main Stage series will close with Aristophanes' Greek comedy, "Lysistrata." Performances run from **April 17 – 25** at 7:30 p.m. with a matinee on April 18 at 2 p.m. Athens and Sparta have been locked in civil war for 20 years with no end in sight. In a bold attempt to save Greece from ruin Lysistrata unites the women of Athens and Sparta in a sex strike to force the soldiers to come to their senses. At the same time, the older women seize the Acropolis, cutting off war funding before the entire male population is wiped out. A comedic hit since 411 B.C., Aristophanes' fast-paced and bawdy comedy explores the war of the sexes while denouncing the war of the city states.

The Second Stage series will focus on the complex issues of 9/11 within two major American cities in "Recent Tragic Events" by Craig Wright on Dec. 11 and 12 and the musical "See What I Wanna See" by Michael John LaChiusa on May 1 and 2. Both productions will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. All Second Stage tickets are \$6.

Leadership Studies Scholar-in-Residence


