The FSU Wind Ensemble, University Chorale, Guitar Ensemble and Clarinet Choir will join forces to present the Department of Music's Holiday Concert on **Sunday, Dec. 12**, at 3 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The concert will include various selections that reflect the holiday spirit.

Under the direction of **Philip Klickman**, the FSU Wind Ensemble will perform "Holiday Piece" by David Foster, arranged by Jay Dawson; "Overture to 'The Nutcracker'" by Peter Ilich Tchaikovsky; "Divinum Mysterium," a 13th-century plainsong arranged by Tom Wallace; "Cantique de Jean Racine" by Gabriel Fauré, arranged by Larry Daehn; "Concerto Grosso, Op. 6, No. 8" ("Fatto per la Notte di Natale") by Arcangelo Corelli, arranged by Mark Hindsley; "The Eighth Candle" by Steve Reisteter; and "Farandole" from "L'Arlesienne Suite No. 2" by Georges Bizet, arranged by Larry Daehn.

Selections by the Guitar Ensemble, under the direction of **Stephen Tunstall**, will include "Sarabande" by George Frederic Handel, featuring **Robert Wallace, Alex Althouse** and

The FSU Clarinet Choir, directed by **Mark Gallagher**, will perform the humorous "Twas the Night Before Christmas" by Clement Moore, arranged by William Jamieson, and featuring Klickman as the narrator.

The University Chorale's performance will include two selections from Benjamin Britten's "Ceremony of Carols" – "Adam Lay Ybouden" with student conductor **Emily Hornbaker** and "That Yonge Child" with student conductor

Laura Fehle. The men will perform Jeffrey Ames' arrangement of the South African freedom song "Tshotsholozala."

Conducted by **Dr. Karen Soderberg** and assisted by pianist **Dr. Joan DeVee Dixon**, the chorale will also perform the traditional Estonian song "Ule Lume Lagadale" ("Over the Snowy Winter Roads"), arranged by Ken Berg; "Gloria Fanfare" by Jeffrey Ames, featuring **David Wall** and **Daniel Reynolds**, trumpet; and Ralph Vaughan Williams' "O Clap Your Hands" and "Fantasia on Christmas Carols," featuring cellist **Ellen Golman** and baritone **Christopher Delgado**.

The program will conclude with Klickman conducting the University Chorale and Wind Ensemble in a performance of "Merry Christmas, Everyone!" by Steven Reineke and "A Holiday Sing-Along" that includes the audience.

CES Jazz Club Presents Spyro Gyra



One of the most popular American jazz fusion bands to come on the scene, Spyro Gyra will play at the Cumberland Holiday Inn Ballroom on

Friday, Dec. 10, at 8 p.m. as part of the FSU Cultural Event Series Jazz Club program.

Spyro Gyra has been entertaining audiences since it was founded by saxophonist Jay Beckenstein in 1975 in Buffalo, N.Y. For more than 35 years, Spyro Gyra has maintained the well-deserved reputation as having an unmistakable sound. The band has earned 10 Grammy nominations and has sold over 11 million records, earning one platinum and two gold records. Even after 35 years, Spyro Gyra keeps moving and grooving with elements of funk, pop and R&B. Their smooth, toe-tapping sounds delight audiences and reinforce why this band has remained in the forefront of modern jazz. Their songs, including their most popular hits "Shaker Song" and "Morning Dance," are still heard on jazz and easy-listening radio stations and in venues around the world.

The beginnings of the band grew out of a weekly jam session at a club in Buffalo named Jack Daniel's. One late night, the owner asked Beckenstein to decide on a name for a new sign for the front of the club.

Beckenstein jokingly said, “Call it spirogira.” Spirogira is algae that he remembered from biology class that is commonly known as “pond scum.” The next week, that name was on the sign incorrectly spelled as “Spyro Gyra.” It was a joke that stuck.

Radio Tribute to a Famous Baritone

Richard Bryan Jamison, a former local radio personality and Cumberland native, has produced an hour-long radio tribute titled “A Remembrance of John Charles Thomas” to former Mt.

Savage resident and Meyersdale, Pa., native, John Charles Thomas, one of the most popular baritone singers of the early to mid-20th century. The program will air on WFWM on **Friday, Dec. 10**, at 9 a.m. and **Sunday, Dec. 12**, at noon.

John Charles Thomas was famous for possessing a distinctive baritone voice with remarkable flexibility. It made him a star on Broadway, on network radio, in concert halls and on the stage of the Metropolitan Opera. He was a major performer in opera productions in Brussels, London, Chicago, San Francisco and New York. For a quarter-century into the 1950s, Thomas was a ubiquitous presence on network radio, as a guest singer, for example, on the Bell Telephone Hour, and star of his own program on the Westinghouse Hour.

Staking Our Claim

Meyers Siblings Give Addition to Renowned Collection at Ort

Like most people, Barbara Meyers decorates her Baltimore, Md., home with framed family photos displayed on bookshelves and tables. But a large oil painting hung in her dining room, a dramatic landscape of trees aflame in bold oranges and yellows set against majestic mountains, just as easily brings back some of her fondest memories of loved ones.

The painting, one of Barbara’s favorites, was a gift she and her brother, George “Douglas” Meyers,

bought for their parents in honor of their 25th wedding anniversary during a family trip to Mongolia in 1969. Their father, the late George A. Meyers, a former labor secretary of Maryland’s Communist Party and chairman of the National Labor Commission, was in Mongolia writing articles for “The People’s Daily World.” It was one of the few trips where Barbara and her brother got to go along, and Barbara remembers how the painting cost around \$100, which was three months’ pay for the Mongolian artist who created it.

“The painting was unusual because art work in that area was mostly political, and this was this beautiful landscape,” she said. “Our parents were so happy. They loved it so much.”

The painting is one of many artworks and knick knacks in her home that bring back memories of her father, his travels around the world and how people related to him.

There’s “The War Is Over” poster from a celebration Barbara’s mother, Alice, and Barbara’s brother, Douglas, attended in New York’s Central Park in 1975. Alice purchased the poster on the way to the event.

“My brother was like, ‘Mom, you’re not going to carry that poster while we’re here!’” Barbara laughed. “As a family, participating in demonstrations, like an anti-war rally against Vietnam and Dr. Martin Luther King’s march on Washington, D.C. – that helped to develop how Douglas and I felt about the war and civil rights.”

Now, Barbara, a retired educator of the Baltimore City Public School District, and Douglas, a professor at the University of Texas, El Paso, are turning over these items and sharing their memories with FSU’s Lewis J. Ort Library, where they will become a part of the renowned George A. Meyers Collection. The collection includes nearly 15,000 books on Marxism, Leninism, communism, socialism, labor, unions, women’s rights and U.S. civil rights – making up one of the largest collections of Marxist literature in the United States. It also incorporates manuscript materials, journals, photos, art works, posters, correspondence and memorabilia, all donated by the Meyers family and George’s many friends and contacts. It was first debuted to the public at the library in October 1997 and has attracted quite a bit of attention over the years.

“We have scholars borrowing materials from this collection almost weekly,” said Dr. David Gillespie, library director, who, together with his staff, has carefully compiled and catalogued countless items and organized them in meticulously labeled files and drawers over the years. “It’s probably the capstone of my career at Frostburg.”

The collection made its way to FSU because of George’s personal ties to Western Maryland and his deep

appreciation for the state’s overall working-class history. He grew up in Lonaconing, Md., and his grandfather was part of the community of coal miners whose nickels and dimes built the foundation for what eventually became FSU. George worked in the Celanese Corporation of America textile plant and was instrumental in organizing the Textile Workers’ Union of America local in 1935. Before his death in 1999, he visited the University monthly, sharing materials with the library for the collection.

The latest infusion of art work made possible by Barbara and her brother will probably lead to new reasons for art history buffs and labor scholars to make their way to Western Maryland.

“As a family, we really appreciated the art and how it made us more knowledgeable,” Barbara said. “It’s great to share with others what we grew up with and shared with each other – art from different countries and locations.”

Though she has parted with the items added to her father’s collection at FSU, Barbara has no shortage of art in her house – she loves going to art festivals and purchasing different works. And she still gives them away, an act of generosity for her friends and colleagues that George would have appreciated.

Board of Regents’ USM Staff Awards

Award Category Added for Effectiveness and Efficiency in Academic or Administrative Transformation

The Council of University System Staff (CUSS) is accepting nominations for the 2011 Board of Regents’ University System of Maryland Staff Awards. These awards represent the highest honor the regents give for achievements of exempt and nonexempt employees from USM institutions, and are presented to staff members who have demonstrated excellence in one of the following categories: (1) contribution to the institution and/or unit to which the person belongs, (2) service to students in an academic or residential environment, (3) public service to their university or greater community or (4) effectiveness and efficiency in academic or administrative transformation. Two employees are recognized in each category for a total of eight awards.

Nominations are first considered at an institutional level before being forwarded to the CUSS Awards Review Committee for final selection. An internal Staff Awards Review Committee made up of the following employees will select nominees from FSU:

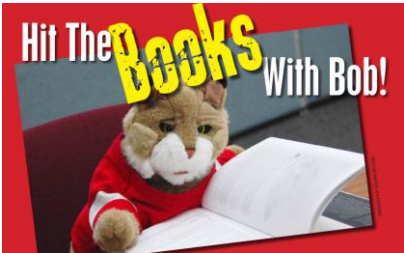
