NASA/WSU Collecting Atmospheric Data at Frostburg State University

NASA scientists and another group of researchers from Washington State University will arrive on the FSU campus **Monday, Nov. 8**, to begin work on a satellite project.

For two weeks, the groups will take measurements from the Tawes roof to determine atmospheric levels of sulfur dioxide. The readings will be compared with those from the NASA AURA satellite that was launched in 2004 to measure trace gases in the Earth's atmosphere each day.

The scientists will then calibrate the satellite sensors to ensure the satellite is sending accurate data back to earth.

While field campaigns around the world have verified measurements of ozone, nitrogen dioxide and

formaldehyde, sulfur dioxide outside of volcanic emissions has not been verified. The purpose of this field campaign at FSU is to measure sulfur dioxide in the downwind plume of the power-generating plants of the Ohio River Valley, where there is a reasonable abundance of the gas.

By measuring the ultraviolet spectrum of the sun and sky with WSU's MFDOAS (multi-function differential absorption spectrometer) and NASA's PANDORA suite of small spectrometers, the team will be able to determine the amount of sulfur dioxide in the lower atmosphere where sulfur dioxide from the power plants resides.

Dr. Jay Herman of the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center will lead the NASA group, and Dr. George Mount, a professor in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at WSU and director of the WSU Center for Environmental Research, Education and Outreach, will head the WSU group.

Bob Boyce and the physical plant staff at FSU helped to set up the equipment on the roof at Tawes. **Lori Bennett** from Networking and Telecommunications established a wireless network for the team.

Children's Novel to Take FSU Stage

The Second Stage series at FSU will present an adaptation of Lois Lowry's Newberry Medal-winning novel "The Giver" on **Nov. 12** at 7:30 p.m., with matinee performances on **Nov. 13 and 14** at 2 p.m.

In this story, directed by junior theatre major **Alex Ferentinos**, 12-year-old Jonas lives in a community where everything is the same. Everyone is assigned a mother, a father, a husband, a wife, a sibling. People do not experience pain, color, memory, choice or violence. Everyone is equal and happy.

In a rite of passage, Jonas is apprenticed to a man called The Giver, guardian of the most sacred of Life's gifts – memory. In his new role, Jonas is allowed to see all memories from the time before sameness. As he becomes aware of concepts like joy and color and pain, he realizes that his community was built on dark secrets,

which forces him to make some difficult decisions.

Adapted by Eric Coble from the award-winning book by Lois Lowry, "The Giver" is a science fiction adventure about the power of knowledge and the courage it takes to embrace new ideas.

Viva Las Vegas!

The Sustainability Studies Minor Steering Committee, with the support of the FSU Foundation, will present “Las Vegas – The Sustainability Everytown” by Dr. David M. Hassenzahl on **Monday, Nov. 8**, at 7:30 p.m. in Compton 226. The event is free and open to the public.

The presentation will demonstrate how Las Vegas – and by extension any city or town – can be used to explore a wide range of interacting conditions that promote or preclude sustainability, while presenting the fundamentals of sustainability.

Hassenzahl is the founding dean of the School of Sustainability and the Environment at Chatham University in Pittsburgh. His research, outreach and teaching focus on incorporating scientific information and expertise into public decisions, with particular emphasis on the management, interpretation and communication of uncertainty. He has spent the last 25 years addressing subjects as diverse as climate change, energy, toxic chemicals and public health from this perspective. In addition to numerous papers and essays, he is the co-author of several books, including “Environment,” “Should We Risk It?” and, most recently, “Visualizing Environmental Science.” Hassenzahl is a senior fellow of the National Council for Science and the Environment. Before joining Chatham, he was chair and an associate professor in the Department of Environmental Studies at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Hernandez Elected to Herbalists Guild

Mimi Hernandez, coordinator of the Appalachian Center for Ethnobotanical Studies at FSU, was recently elected to the council of the American Herbalists Guild, a national organization representing the goals of herbalists specializing in the medicinal use of plants.



Since arriving at FSU in January 2010, Hernandez has developed the Mountain Herbalist Series, a series of educational workshops designed to create a forum for community interaction and cultural arts preservation by reflecting the traditional and local uses of plants while highlighting the scientific evidence base of these uses. Recently, she has established and completed the first certification course in community herbalism in the Cumberland area.

Hernandez is a nationally known speaker for herbalism, nutrition and holistic health topics. In her role at the Appalachian Center for Ethnobotanical Studies, she has introduced Appalachian Mountain Roots to several events around the country.

Hernandez has a special interest in economic development and collaborates with the FSU College of Business to enhance economic development for area growers, harvesters and value-added product manufacturers in the region. These meetings subsequently resulted in an award from the Federal Economic Development Administration University Center Partnership Program to catalog the natural products industry of Western Maryland. The goal of this work is to support existing businesses and facilitate the development of new local business to explore the sustainable and economic uses of regional plants.

The primary emphasis of AHG is to promote a high level of professionalism and education in the study and practice of therapeutic herbalism. AHG professional membership currently serves as the most recognizable standard of competency in botanical medicine in the U.S. Hernandez, a clinically trained herbalist, has been a professional member of AHG since 2008.
