Frostburg State University Awarded Military-Friendly School Title

G.I. Jobs, the premier magazine for military personnel transitioning into civilian life, has awarded FSU the designation of Military-Friendly School. The 2012 Military-Friendly Schools list honors the nation's top 20 percent of colleges, universities and trade schools that are doing the most to embrace America's military service members and veterans as students.

In its effort to help student veterans find the right school, G.I. Jobs incorporated a survey of student veterans for the first time. This feedback provides prospective military students with insight into the student veteran experience at a particular institution based on peer reviews from current students. Student veteran survey feedback can be viewed at www.militaryfriendlyschools.com/2012 list.

Service members and veterans can also virtually meet individual student



veterans from the various schools on the site to learn more about personal school decisions and the transition from the military to an academic environment. FSU's featured veteran is senior *Christopher L. Kelbaugh*, a biology major and geography minor, a member of the President's Leadership Circle and a Marine veteran who served for more than four years as an infantry mortarman, including tours in Afghanistan and Iraq.

The 1,518 colleges, universities and trade schools on this year's list prioritize the recruitment of students with military experience. These schools

are making the grade by offering scholarships and discounts, veterans' clubs, full-time staff, military credit and other services to those who served. The 2012 list of Military Friendly Schools® was compiled through extensive research and a datadriven survey of more than 8,000 schools nationwide.

A full story and detailed list of Military Friendly Schools® will be highlighted in the annual G.I. Jobs Guide to Military Friendly Schools and on a poster, both of which will be distributed to hundreds of thousands of active and former military personnel in early October. Free Bio-medical Screenings!

FSU's popular student health and wellness initiative is hosting another round of annual bio-medical screenings this fall. Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles (CHILL) will ask students to participant in their bio-

medical screenings on **Tuesday**, **Sept. 20**, **Wednesday**, **Sept. 28**, and **Thursday**, **Oct. 13**, from 8 a.m. to noon each day. Students will be able to have their blood pressure, body mass index, body composition, blood sugar and cholesterol levels checked at no cost, all while earning CHILL prizes.

To complete the screening, students will need to refrain from eating or drinking anything but water for at least eight hours before the screening. The screenings involve having a vial of blood drawn to check the blood sugar and cholesterol levels.

Each student screened will be eligible to receive follow-up care at Brady Health Center, including free consultations with nursing staff and the CHILL dietician.

In exchange for the student's time, each participant will receive a complimentary breakfast and a free CHILL T-shirt, and will be entered in drawings for other free CHILL prizes. The first 25 students in line each morning for the screenings will also receive a special bonus CHILL prize.

To be eligible for the screening, students must be at least 18 and not have any previous diagnosis concerning their blood sugar or heart health. Students who do not qualify for this screening are encouraged to contact Brady Health Center to make an appointment to have the screening performed at a later date.

Through the China Exchange Program, FSU students can spend a semester at Hunan Normal University (<u>www.hunnu.edu.cn/english/</u>) in Changsha, Hunan Province, P.R. China. Students pay FSU tuition and fees (based on residency status) through their student e-bill account and pay room and board costs to Hunan Normal University. The cost of living is generally less than it is at FSU and courses are taught in English.

Limerick, Ireland – Spring 2011

Students can study abroad for a semester in Ireland at Mary Immaculate College and pay FSU tuition. Financial aid can be used to help cover the costs of room and board. Credits will transfer back to FSU. Check out the website for Mary Immaculate College at www.mic.ul.ie/.
