Frostburg State University Mourns Student-Athlete Derek Sheely

FSU continues to focus on supporting the family, teammates and friends of **Derek Sheely**, who died late Sunday, Aug. 28, after collapsing during football practice on the morning of Monday, Aug. 22.

Derek was a senior History and Political Science major, a starting fullback for the Bobcats and a two-year All-Atlantic Central Football Conference all-academic honoree. Derek will be posthumously awarded a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Studies, cum laude.

Following is a message from Derek's family, sent by his mother shortly after he passed away:

"It is with heavy hearts that we must inform our dear family and friends that our beloved son, Derek Thomson Sheely, passed away moments ago after a courageous fight. We want to thank all of you for your thoughts and prayers. They've meant so much to Ken, Keyton, me and especially Derek. We're incredibly proud of Derek. He's all one could hope for to have in a son/brother and more. He's never run from a challenge and he

fought this with everything he had. Please, if you can, go to Derek's Facebook page and post a note on his wall. Or text us. It would mean so much to us. – The Sheelys"

Funeral services for Derek were held on Sept. 1 at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Gaithersburg, Md. Additional efforts to honor Derek's memory are in the planning stages.

All of us at FSU send our deepest condolences to Derek's family, teammates and friends, and we ask everyone to keep them in your thoughts and prayers.



Event to Celebrate Tri-State's Rich Heritage

The public is invited to experience and learn more about the Appalachian region's rich cultural heritage during FSU's 2011 Appalachian Festival on **Friday, Sept. 16, and Saturday, Sept. 17**. Now in its sixth year, the much-anticipated free event brings together performers and craftspeople to celebrate the history, music, artistic offerings and food of Western Maryland and the surrounding areas. The renowned Irish band, Buffalo in the Castle, will perform at the historic Palace Theatre in downtown Frostburg during the Saturday evening capstone concert.

The festival will kick off Friday at 2 p.m. on the Upper Quad at FSU with "Building Sustainable Communities Through Community Engagement and Activism," an informative symposium focusing on contemporary conflicts created by surface mining and natural gas drilling. The event will feature speakers from the Keeper of the Mountains Foundation and CitizenShale, as well as a musical performance by Jay Smar.

Following the symposium, an Appalachian Film Festival featuring the "The Wild and Wonderful Whites of West Virginia" will cap off Friday's activities at 7:30 p.m. in Frostburg's Palace Theatre. The legendary family is as well-known for their wild, excessive criminal ways as they are for their famous mountain-dancing members, including Jesco White, the star of the

cult classic documentary, "Dancing Outlaw." After the film, Jacob Young, the director of "Dancing Outlaw," will moderate a critical discussion.

Saturday activities begin with the Frostburg Rotary Club Pancake Breakfast from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. at St. Michael's Church in Frostburg. Then, starting at 10 a.m., check out the daylong presentations, workshops, arts and crafts demonstrations, live music, Appalachian dance, environmental talks and various children's activities on FSU's Upper Quad. Two stages will feature music highlighting the area's strong bluegrass, old-time, Irish and Scottish music traditions.

In addition to the music, there will be a singing workshop, storytellers, dance demonstrations, an overview of fiddling traditions and the early banjo, and a reading and book signing with local author Rory Shane Riggs. There will also be talks on medicinal roots, mountaintop removal, Marcellus Shale and eminent domain, and the Cherokee Trail of Tears, as well as Scales to Tales, an up-close view of the region's wildlife. At 2 p.m., members of Buffalo in the Castle will present "Foreign Sounds Rendered Familiar" in which they will explore the historic and dynamic connections between American old-time music and traditional music.

Children will have their own hands-on area of crafts and activities to keep them entertained, including Horn's Punch and Judy Show.

Artists and artisans will exhibit lace, baskets, portrait art, nature photography, woodcrafts, pottery, coverlets, braided rugs, herbal products, jewelry, stained glass, fiber arts, stuffed animals and chair bottoming.

Other groups, such as the Western Maryland Chapter of the Archeological Society, Western Maryland Adventures and The Nature Conservancy, will also have booths.

The festival will culminate with the 8 p.m. Saturday night performance of Buffalo in the Castle. Button accordion master Mairtin O'Connor and Desi Wilkinson, one of Ireland's leading exponents of the traditional Irish flute, provide the group's anchors for Irish traditional music, while Frank Hall, a top-notch fiddler and clogger, and clawhammer banjo player Lena Ullman supply a hearty serving of American old-time music. Tickets are available at Mountain City Traditional Arts and Main Street Books in Frostburg. Tickets are \$15 in advance or \$18 at the door; tickets for students and those 17 and under are \$8.

Radoslav Kvapil
Concert to Celebrate
Antonín Dvořák



FSU’s Department of Music and the FSU Foundation will host world-class Czech pianist Radoslav Kvapil on **Tuesday, Sept. 20**, at 8 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The concert is the first of two to be held at FSU to celebrate renowned composer Antonín Dvořák as part of the 2011 Mutual Inspirations Festival of the Embassy of the Czech Republic in Washington, D.C.

The program will feature “Dumka and Furiant, op. 12” and “Poetic Tone Pictures, op. 85” by Dvořák; “Song of a Winter Night” by Vítězslav Novák; “Sonata 1.X.1905” by Leoš Janáček; and “Czech Dances” by Bedřich Smetana.

Kvapil hails from Brno, Moravia. Throughout his distinguished career, Kvapil has been commended by music critics for his “sterling service for the cause of Czech piano music,” and praised as an “unrivaled master,” as well as a “magician at the keyboard.”

Kvapil has performed in major concert halls in about 50 countries in Europe, North America and Asia. Since 1977, he has given master classes and lecture recitals worldwide.

In 1967-1969, Kvapil recorded Dvořák’s complete piano works, the first such recording in history, and the complete piano works by Leoš Janáček. In 1975, he made a recording of the complete piano works by Jan Václav Hugo Voříšek. A second complete recording of Janáček’s piano works followed in 1989, and in 1990, the first two volumes of Bohuslav Martinů’s complete piano works were released. Kvapil has recorded dozens of other records and CDs of works by Bedřich Smetana, Zdeněk Fibich, Josef Suk, Franz Liszt, Johannes Brahms, Paul Hindemith, Franz Schubert, Frederic Chopin and others.

In 1974, Kvapil founded the South Bohemia Music Festival, which has been taking place annually since then. In 1999, he founded the International Dvořák Society, which has organized a number of concert series, including the Vysočina Music Festival, Afternoon Concerts for Seniors in Prague 2 and the American Spring Festival. In 2002, the French Ministry of Culture awarded Kvapil the title of “Chevalier dans l’Ordre des Arts et des Lettres.”

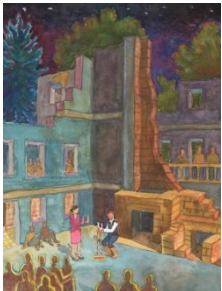

CAST to Present
“Macbeth” at FSU

FSU’s Department of English will host the Cambridge American Stage Tour presentation of Shakespeare’s “Macbeth” on **Monday, Sept. 19**, at 7:30 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall.

“Macbeth” tells the story of Macbeth, a Scottish lord, who, encouraged by his wife, commits greater and greater crimes to fill his lust for power. “Shakespeare translates brilliantly to a contemporary setting and, in ‘Macbeth,’ he gives us one of the first great portraits of dictatorship,” says director John Haidar. “So, what we’re hoping to create in this new production is a definitively modern, almost alien landscape, while at the same time remaining true to the spirit of the drama.”

Founded in 2000 and directed and produced entirely by members of the Cambridge University student body, CAST is performing in 10 venues across the U.S. Notably, this year’s tour features a number of actors with professional credits to their name, including Charlotte Hamblin, who recently worked with director Tom Hooper on the film “The King’s Speech.”

Play Festival Winner
Announced, Date Set

FSU’s Center for Creative Writing announces that Karen Hartline’s play,

“Life After Life,” is the winner of the 2011 One-Act Playwriting Competition for the Frostburg One-Act Play Festival. The festival will be held **Friday, Sept. 23**, and **Saturday, Sept. 24**, starting at 8 p.m. at the Palace Theatre on Main Street in Frostburg.

Over 40 one-act plays from around the world were submitted for this year’s competition. The plays were judged on plot, character development, dialogue and overall quality.

Hartline is a playwright from Oakland, Calif. Her work has appeared in the Bradley Playhouse Playwrights Festival, the Soft Serve Playhouse 10-Minute Play Festival and the Playwrights Showcase of the Western Region in Denver. “Life After Life” focuses on the thin line between reality and delusion. Hartline will receive the top prize of \$750.

New Jersey resident Walt Vail’s “Hattie’s Dress,” a play about the changes one goes through when reaching an understanding of life and death, won second place. The third place winner is “Closing Time” by Carl Williams of Houston, Texas.

projects designed to help a company plan and develop industrial training programs for its employees.

“Eleven Days of September”

FSU to Observe 10th Anniversary of 9/11

FSU, led by United Campus Ministry and Catholic Campus Ministries, will hold an observance of the 10th anniversary of 9/11, “Eleven Days of September,” on the FSU campus **through Sept. 11**. The event will be highlighted by a Campus and Communitywide 9/11 Remembrance Program; “The Wall,” where individuals can post their memories, prayers,

pictures and other information; and a flag display for the 9/11 casualties.

The Remembrance Program for the community, a service of ash, water and light appropriate for all faiths, will be held **Sunday, Sept. 11**, from 8 to 9 p.m. at the Clock Tower (or, in the case of rain, in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall at the Lane University Center). After the ritual of ashes – an observance of silence – FSU President Jonathan Gibralter and people from the community will share their personal stories about 9/11 or its aftermath. This will be followed by a ritual of water – a symbol of hope, comfort, mercy and grace. The diversity of the 9/11 casualties will be represented by a cylinder of multicolored glass pebbles that will be covered with water to represent this symbol in the various faith traditions. The service will end with a litany of resistance and ritual of light in a dark world – passing the peace in the form of passing the flame of the candle.

In the 11 days of prayer and reflection leading up to the 9/11 Remembrance Program, there will be a temporary wall located at the Ort Library that will include prayers for peace from all the major religious traditions, and memories, pictures and demographic information about the casualties of 9/11. Members of the community will be invited to add their own prayers, stories, poems, reflections, protests and pictures of people they knew. On **Sept. 11**, the wall will be moved to the area where the 9/11 Remembrance Program will be held.


In addition, there will also be a flag display for the 3,030 casualties of 9/11. U.S. flags will be installed to form a giant 9/11 on the hill near the Hitchins Administration Building, with a message that proclaims “Pray for Peace, Act for Peace” on the head flag of the display. The display will be constructed progressively – “9” on **Wednesday, Sept. 7**, “1” on **Thursday, Sept. 8**, and “1” on **Friday, Sept. 9**. The head flag will be placed on **Sunday, Sept. 11**.

FSU-TV3 is on Channel 3 on the Comcast Cable System in Frostburg, Lonaconing and Mt. Savage 24 hours a day. FSU-TV3’s program schedule can be viewed at www.frostburg.edu/dept/mcom/channel3/pschedule.htm.

FSU-TV3’s “Live Online” offers a simulcast of what’s airing on the channel. When selecting the Live Online option, mms://fsutv3live.frostburg.edu:8080, a Windows Media Player will open and show what is airing. Eighty percent of programming is available for simulcast. If a program is not available, Windows Media Player will not open, or if you are watching and the next show is unavailable, the player will shut down the feed until the next available program.

If you missed a show during its regular airtime, you can visit the program schedule to see if it’s offered as a Video on Demand option. If “view” appears below the program title, it is available. Click on “view” and Windows Media Player will open the television program. Apple users: If you don’t have Windows Media Player, you will have to download it from Microsoft and install it.

Between programming, FSU-TV3 cablecasts an automated educational and community message board. The message board provides information about FSU events, nonprofit organizations and community events. If you have an activity announcement to advertise, log on to www.frostburg.edu/dept/mcom/channel3/admin-pic/cf_upload.cfm, enter the information and click submit. A graphic or pre-made message can be loaded as well. Submit requests at least one week in advance.
