FSU to Celebrate Leadership and Homecoming Weekend

Homecoming season is here and FSU will celebrate **from Thursday, Oct. 18, to Sunday, Oct. 21**. Past, present and future students are encouraged to participate. Activities will include a pep rally, comedy show, tailgating, football and the Bobcat athletic reunion.

The weekend will begin with the Growl, the annual pep rally where the 2012 Homecoming King and Queen will be crowned on **Thursday** at 6:30 p.m. in the Cordts PE Center's Main Arena.

On **Friday**, the events will begin at 9 a.m. with a campuswide career expo. At 12:30 p.m., there will be a Career Expo luncheon held at Lane Manicur Hall. The Bobcat Hall of Fame cocktail hour, induction ceremony and dinner will begin at 5 p.m. in the Cordts Main Arena. There will be a \$30 charge for adults and a \$15 charge for children under 12. Later, the Black Student Alliance invites everyone to Lane Manicur Hall at 7:30 p.m. to enjoy a comedy show. The cost of this event is \$7 for students and \$12 for visitors. There will also be an All Campus Sing at 8 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. This event costs \$3, or \$2 for students wearing letters from recognized Greek organizations.

Saturday events begin at 8:30 a.m. with the Jim Anderson Memorial Baseball Breakfast in Lane Manicur Hall. The charge for this event is \$20 for adults and \$10 for children under 12. Following that at 9 a.m. will be the Captain James A. Graham Memorial Project Kick-Off on the library deck. Alumni can update contact information at the Welcome Center from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Bobcat Stadium. At 10 a.m. there will be a Friends of Music Steering Committee Meeting and Brunch at St. John's Episcopal Church, 52 Broadway.



The campus tour will begin at 11 a.m. in Lane's upper lobby. The President's Leadership Circle Reunion will also begin at 11 a.m. in the Lane South Addition.

At 11 a.m. FSU's Volleyball team will take on the Salisbury Seagulls in the Cordts Main Arena. Afterward, come support the FSU Football team with a tailgating party from 11 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. Free parking will be available. For a list of tailgating rules and regulations, visit www.alumni.frostburg.edu. At noon, the Black Student Alliance will host a "Mentoring and Networking" workshop in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). Cheer on the Bobcats during the football game in Bobcat Stadium, where the Bobcats take on the Buffalo Bengals. The game starts at 1 p.m. and admission is free. From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. is the Bobcat Athletic Reunion on the Lewis J. Ort Library's deck. The cost is \$20 per person and \$10 for children 12 and younger.

The family can enjoy a movie and popcorn at 1 p.m. in Lane 111. Immediately following the football game at 4 p.m. will be an Impromptu Alumni Step Show presented by FSU's National Pan-Hellenic Council. At 5 p.m., FSU's Men's Soccer team takes on the Marymount Saints in Bobcat Stadium.

The evening activities begin at 7:30 p.m. with a dance concert featuring

FSU students in the PAC Drama Theatre. Admission for this event is \$6 for students and \$12 for guests. At 8 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall, join alumni and friends at a dance party featuring Queen City Funk and Soul. There is a \$10 cover charge. The evening festivities will continue with Club Connections, co-sponsored by Frostburg Connections, at the Lyric Theatre on Main Street from 10 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. The night wraps up with a mixer hosted by the Black Student Alliance and Student Government Association from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. in the Cordts Main Arena. The cost is \$10 per student and \$15 for non-students.

On **Sunday** at 9:30 a.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room, there will be an Alumni Association board of directors meeting. The Men's Alumni Basketball Game will begin at 11 a.m. There will be a worship service at 11:30 a.m. at Cook Chapel. The Bobcat Field Hockey team will play against the Salisbury Seagulls at noon in the Bobcat Stadium. Also at noon, the Student Government Association will hold its Big Event; everyone is invited to help clean up the streets of Frostburg.

The dancers of the FSU Dance Company will present a back-to-basics performance on **Friday and Saturday, Oct. 19 and 20**, at 7:30 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre. A casual question-and-answer session with choreographers will take place after the **Oct. 19** performance. Tickets are \$6 for students and \$12 for the general public.

The FSU Dance Company will get back to basics during FSU's Leadership and Homecoming Weekend, foregoing flashy costumes and lighting to focus on the natural flow of human movement in time and space. The

dancers will perform new choreography as well as earlier works.

Senior **Caitlin Moore** will bring her high-impact and fully energized choreography to the stage in a new work titled "Fight for It, Rejoice in It, Our Hold on Love." Afro-centric beats will mix with the soft melody of strings to create a "harmonistic collision," symbolizing the differences between individuals. According to Moore, "the tie that connects us all is the ability to love."

"Hurt," choreographed by senior **Elisia Daniels**, will highlight the unconventional movement that

characterizes her style. Her dance moves connect tightly with the accompanying music, creating a tangled web that pulls the spectator in and out of the moment.

Director **Jamie McGreevy** will debut a new work and restage two works from her repertoire, both of which were originally created at FSU. The duet "Raw: Re-stripped" is a passionate interaction between a man and woman through movement and the senses. This choreography, originally staged in 2011, is based on McGreevy's research into movement through imagery and sensory awareness.

Activist Son to Speak on 'My Two Moms'



The adult son of two lesbian mothers will speak at FSU about the heartfelt speech he gave to the Iowa House Judiciary Committee defending his two moms, which later became a sensation on the Internet and beyond. Zach Wahls will appear on **Monday, Oct. 22**, at 8 p.m. in Lane Manicured Hall. This event is free and open to the public.

While Wahls was an engineering student at the University of Iowa, he spoke out against the proposed constitutional amendment to ban gay marriage in Iowa at a hearing before the Iowa House Judiciary Committee. In his testimony, he said that "the sexual orientation of my parents has had zero impact on the content of my character." Although his speech had no effect on the outcome of the hearing, it did touch the hearts of many others.

This courageous act landed Wahls a spot on Ellen DeGeneres' show, where he talked more about his experiences growing up with two mothers. Wahls has since dedicated himself to activism and promoting his new book "My Two Moms: Lessons of Love, Strength and What Makes a Family," which was published last April.

Stonestreet to Present Senior Soprano Recital

Soprano *Brittany Stonestreet* will present her senior vocal recital on **Sunday, Oct. 21**, at 3 p.m. She will be accompanied by pianist Dr. Sean Beachy.

Stonestreet will perform a range of works, from Baroque and Romantic to Classical and Contemporary, in Italian, German, French and English. Her recital opens with Antonio Lotti’s “Pur dicesti, o bocca bella” and Handel’s “V’adoro, pupille” (from “Julius Caesar”), followed by lieder (German art songs) by Schubert and Wolf, and the aria “Batti, batti” from Mozart’s opera “Don Giovanni.”

The second half of her recital will open with two French pieces: a lullaby, “Bonne Nuit,” by Jules Massenet, and the fun, lighthearted song “A des Oiseaux” (“To the Birds”) by Georges Hüe, followed by a couple of British folk songs by Benjamin Britten. Stonestreet will conclude her recital with Richard Hundley’s “Come Ready and See Me,” Michael Head’s “The Fairies’ Dance” and Rolf Lovland’s “Your Raise Me Up.”

FSU Faculty and Guest Artist Recital

Join the FSU Department of Music on **Tuesday, Oct. 23**, at 8 p.m. for an exciting Faculty and Guest Artist Recital of newly composed chamber music. FSU Professor *Pamela Murchison* (flute), Barney Culver (cello) and Scott Christian (percussion) will present works by living composers, including the broody “Cineshapes 3” by Pittsburgh-based composer Amy Williams and “Into the Whirlwind” for flute, cello and percussion by David Stock.

Murchison currently plays piccolo with the West Virginia and Akron Symphony orchestras. She is also active as a chamber musician, performing with Trillium Ensemble and other chamber groups throughout Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Maryland. As a founding member of Mainspring, a chamber group devoted to a fusion of classical and world music, Murchison was featured on WQED-FM in Pittsburgh, and toured throughout the U.S. She regularly participates in community and educational outreach, and is developing a school program titled “Music Tells a Story” for solo flute. Murchison is completing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at West Virginia University.

Culver, the product of a musical family, started playing the cello at the age of 3. He attended the University of Michigan and Carnegie Mellon University, where he studied with Anthony Elliott, Anne Martindale Williams and David Premo. Culver is the assistant principal cellist of the

West Virginia Symphony and the Erie Philharmonic, a section cellist of the Sarasota Opera and a co-principal cellist in the Utah Festival Opera. He is also a substitute cellist with the orchestras in Pittsburgh, Sarasota, Naples, Rochester, Charleston, Savannah and Tampa.

Christian is the acting principal timpanist with the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra, maintains a teaching studio, performs in a percussion duo and has an ongoing Timpani Chamber Music Project. He was a member of the Minnesota Youth Symphonies where he won their concerto competition, performing the “Mayuzumi Concertino for Xylophone.” He earned his Bachelor of Music degree and a Master of Music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, then taught for the Cleveland Institute of Music’s Preparatory Department for five years and conducted the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra percussion ensemble for two seasons.

On **Wednesday, Oct. 24**, at 3 p.m. there will also be a lecture by the guest artists titled “Twenty-First Century Chamber Music: Risks and Rewards.” The lecture will take place in Performing Arts Center room 216.

Recording Artist Michael Jacobs



Award-winning recording artist Michael Jacobs will present a live concert on **Thursday, Nov. 1**, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in the Lane Center Loft. Afterwards, Jacobs will host a coffee shop hour, talking with the campus community about Native American culture and history. Jacobs creates a compelling musical mixture of Native American, roots rock, pop and folk. He doesn’t just address Native American culture or issues – he addresses human issues: peace, justice, suffering, the environment, relationships, personal responsibility and wholeness.

Jacobs’ debut solo CD, “Sacred Nation,” received the 2003 Native American Music Award for Best Independent Recording. “The Journey” received a 2006 Indian Summer Music Award, and “Mystery,” his next release, covering topics from the environment and politics to the ecstasy and agony of life and relationships, received two 2008 Indian Summer Music Awards. Jacobs’ latest, “The Art of Peace,” a blend of Native American influences with powerful roots rock, pop and folk, recently received three 2012 Indian Summer Music Awards. With personal songs of love and loss, to commentary on social issues and shared humanity, this CD is insightful, yet very entertaining.

To date, Jacobs has performed at over 193 colleges and universities in 34 states, besides numerous libraries, museums, pow-wows, festivals and fairs across the U.S. and Canada.

Creative Writing Center to Host Michael Downs



FSU’s Creative Writing Center will welcome author and former newspaper reporter Michael Downs back to the Lyric Theatre on Main Street in Frostburg on **Tuesday, Oct. 23**, at

7:30 p.m. for a book reading. This reading is free and open to the public.

Born in Hartford, Conn., Downs won third-place in an all-comers writing contest at Naubuc Elementary School for his story “The Day the World Went Poof.” Since then, Downs has written everything from homemade comic

books to newspaper reports on college basketball games to reviews of restaurants that serve too much fried food.

When he studied literary writing, he was fortunate to have a mentor who told him, "we write from where we get the wound," which led Downs to focus on his hometown. The results include "House of Good Hope: A Promise for a Broken City," which won the River Teeth Literary Nonfiction Prize, and "The Greatest Show," a story collection inspired by the historic Hartford Circus Fire.

A former newspaper reporter, Downs has received fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation and the Anderson Center for Interdisciplinary Arts. He lives in Baltimore and teaches at Towson University.

New Displays at the Ort Library

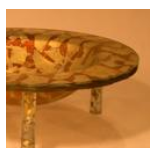
