# **FSU Cultural Events Series Announces Exciting Season**

The FSU Cultural Events Series presents its 35th annual season of captivating performing arts events. The 2012-13 season includes professional music, dance and theatre events with world-class artists from the United States and abroad. # **CAST to Present 'Antony & Cleopatra'**

the Cambridge
American Stage
Tour presentation
of one of

Shakespeare's most moving yet underperformed masterpieces, "Antony and Cleopatra," on **Tuesday, Sept. 18**, at 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall.

In this tragedy set in ancient Rome, Mark Antony, triumvir and legendary soldier, has abandoned his domestic duties in favor of his beguiling Egyptian queen. Into a spinning backdrop of furious wars, forced smiles and too-firm handshakes, Antony must come home. Yet even the titans of Rome cannot sever him from the pull of Cleopatra, the volatile point around which Antony whirls and anchors his world. Devastatingly poignant and startlingly comic, "Antony and Cleopatra" sets a rising star against a hero in decline, while pushing to a breaking point the passion that could topple empires.

CAST is an annual theatre tour from Great Britain to the United States that has been running for the last 12 years. Each year, a company of the Cambridge University's most talented directors, producers, actors and technicians bring one of Shakespeare's plays to universities, high schools and professional theatres across the east coast of America.

Nikki Moss, director, has an extensive background in physical theatre, and in her own words is "aiming to create a fresh piece of classical work from an incredible story, in our own way, with our own energy and passion, and to create a performance that is as tremendous as its heroes."

She'll be helped along the way by the largest company the tour has taken to the U.S., in its most ambitious production yet. The tour also boasts a number of performers with professional film credits, including Genevieve Gaunt (Cleopatra), an alumna of the Harry Potter franchise.

Ticket prices are \$6 for students and \$12 for the general public. Tickets can be purchased at the door on the night of the performance.

# **Frostburg One-Act Play Festival Winners** Announced, Date Set

FSU's Center for Creative Writing announces that Roger Strauss' play, "Delicious," is the winner of the 2012 One-Act Playwriting Competition for the Frostburg One-Act Play Festival. The plays were judged on plot, character development, dialogue and overall quality. His play, and those of the runners-up, will be produced for the festival, to be held Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29, in Frostburg.

Strauss, of Moretown, Vt., came late to playwriting. He began his writing career upon semi-retirement from 30 years as executive director of a community mental health center. His play, "Caring," won the new play contest of the Tennessee Theatre Company in Knoxville in 2005. In 2006, "The Lessons of History," a one act, was awarded Honorable Mention at the FirstStageLA One-Act Play Contest. Strauss is also a founding member of the Vermont Playwrights Circle. In "Delicious," Adam, Eve, Snake and God come back to deconstruct and reconstruct the classic myth that got us all to where we are today. Strauss will receive the top prize of \$750 and a full-stage production of his play.

Lawrence Joseph's "The Color in the Bathroom," a play in which partners Martin and Louis discuss colors, relationships, Vegas, Aunt Polly and more, won second place. Joseph is a

long-time actor who moved from the Denver area to Fort Worth, Texas. The third-place winner, "The Next Move," about an elderly couple who uncover some disturbing things while bickering their way through a Sunday afternoon, is by New Yorker William Fowkes. Fowkes is an award-winning playwright and published fiction writer. Joseph and Fowkes will receive \$250 and \$100, respectively.

# **FSU Honors Three** With Staff Awards for **Excellence**

FSU honored three outstanding employees, Patrick Deasy, Linda

Brumage and Gary Robinette, at its recent Fall Convocation. The annual Staff Awards for Excellence recognize outstanding service to the institution, and the recipients are nominated and chosen by their colleagues. This year's award winners have a combined 107 years of service to FSU.

Deasy was honored in the Exempt (salaried) employee category. Employed by FSU for the past 41 years, he serves as a clinical counselor in the Counseling and Psychological Services Department as well as the coordinator of Veterans Affairs. As a clinical counselor, he provides counseling, crisis intervention and many other psychological services that contribute to the academic success and personal development of students. As coordinator of Veterans Affairs, he serves as FSU's certifying official in dealings with the Maryland Higher Education Commission and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Beyond his job responsibilities, Deasy can be found volunteering at commencement ceremonies, serving as a student judicial board member or helping the Allegany County Combined Crisis Response Team in times of local or regional disaster.

Brumage was honored in the category of Nonexempt employee. An employee at FSU for 43 years, she has been a stenographer and office secretary, and for the past 19 years, executive administrative assistant to four deans of the College of Education. Beyond her commitment to FSU, Brumage has given back to the community. She is involved with the Western Maryland Health System Auxiliary, the Allegany County Commission for Woman and the Cumberland Business and Professional Women, to name just a few activities.

Robinette was recognized under the Nonexempt employee/facilities/ maintenance category. He has been employed at FSU for 23 years. Although his official title is "carpenter," the Department of Theatre and Dance has always referred to him as their "Scene Shop Supervisor." Despite titles, he has taken on a supervisory role for some 30 students per semester, mentoring them in set construction, safety and other aspects of scene construction. Over the years he has worked side by side with students on over 130 theatre productions and music operettas. Robinette is a devoted member of the Little Meadows Baptist Church, where he is a deacon and volunteers as the church custodian. His generosity came as no surprise, to those who know him, when one year he realized that a local child care facility could not afford a Christmas tree, so he built one for them.

Award recipients were given a plaque, a certificate commemorating their dedication and a monetary award. Staff Awards for Excellence are funded by the FSU Foundation's Annual Fund Campaign.

# FSU Campus Affiliate of NCBI Increases Cultural Competence



This summer, 40 FSU faculty, staff and students participated in the NCBI Leadership for Diversity three-day Train-the-Trainer on the FSU campus. The session consists of a series of incremental, experiential activities that fine-tunes the leadership skills necessary to build inclusive environments and increase cultural competence. Participants also learned the NCBI Controversial Issue Process, which demonstrates how to move hotly contested issues forward by listening to the concerns on all sides, and reframe the debate in a way that builds bridges and doesn't divide.

Founded in 1984, NCBI International is a nonprofit leadership training organization dedicated to ending the mistreatment of every group, whether it stems from nationality, race, class, gender, religion, sexual orientation, age, physical ability, job or life circumstance. With chapters in nearly 50 cities worldwide, NCBI has dealt with prejudice and conflict in virtually every form. Each chapter is composed of leaders who are trained to provide prevention-based programs to reduce prejudice and intergroup conflict in their communities.

The FSU campus affiliate's programs develop principled leaders who examine their own leadership, initiate diversity programs and enter the heat of emotional group conflict to build bridges across difference.

## FSU to Continue Community Dialogue Series

FSU has announced plans to continue its "Sustaining Campus and Community" dialogues for at least the next two years. These community meetings, initiated last spring, convene students, year-round residents, local officials and University leaders to discuss a variety of issues and create new opportunities for collaborative problem-solving and coalition-building.

Ultimately the project, in partnership with the Maryland Judiciary's Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office (MACRO), should facilitate the development of a community-based action plan to support improved communication and conflict resolution. The previous sessions produced some focused areas of discussions that will be the basis for the dialogues to come this fall.

The project will begin with a planning retreat on Sunday, Sept. 30, at a location to be announced, to develop a strategic approach to the dialogues. Anyone interested in being included in the retreat and being part of the leadership of this communitybuilding effort should contact project manager Dr. Elesha L. Ruminski at elruminski@frostburg.edu or x4480. Ruminski is the chair of the Department of Communication Studies and coordinator of Leadership Studies at FSU, as well as the president of the Mountainside Community Mediation Center, a local partner in this dialogue series that will provide additional

The retreat will be followed by training sessions at FSU this fall to teach community participants how to lead a public dialogue, a conversational approach that helps people find common ground and build productive working relationships.

In addition, two open dialogue sessions are planned for the fall, both three-hour evening sessions with dates and downtown Frostburg locations to be announced. Both will be free and open to the public.

Everyone with an interest in the Frostburg community is invited to participate in any part of this process.

Nationally known conflict resolution scholar-practitioners who helped lead the spring sessions will return to offer their expertise, Dr. Frank Dukes, lecturer and director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, and Dr. Marvin Johnson, founder and executive director of the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution.

MACRO will also assist FSU in identifying and developing new community-university projects and capturing the "Sustaining Campus and Community" efforts in documentary form to educate other communities facing similar challenges and opportunities.

The series is part of a continuing set of initiatives designed to teach all members of the Frostburg community about conflict management and violence prevention. Others include the campus conversation event for students held last November, the new Conflict Communication Studies track in the Department of Communication Studies and participation in the second national Enough Is Enough week-long anti-violence campaign in April. Another part of the initiative is the recent agreement between FSU and the city of Frostburg that allows their respective police departments to share jurisdiction in the neighborhood surrounding the campus and provides funds from FSU to increase the staffing and pay for Frostburg City Police officers.

# Below Average – And That Ain't Bad!

The results of the 2012 CORE Survey administered to FSU students this past spring reveal that the binge-drinking rate (having five or more alcoholic beverages in a sitting) has decreased 16 percent over the past five years. FSU's self-reported binge-drinking rate is 41 percent, officially below the national average. The work of those involved with the President's Alcohol Task Force, NCHIP, the BURG Peer Education Network and others seek to make FSU a safe and healthy place in which to learn and grow.
