## FSU Foundation Seeks Funding Proposals for Opportunity Grants



The FSU Foundation is once again seeking funding proposals from faculty, staff and students for Foundation Opportunity Grants and several other awards for fiscal year 2016.

Those interested should complete the 2016 FSU Foundation Opportunity Grant Request Form, which includes a line item budget. All applications must be limited to two pages. A third page is only permitted for the line item budget. After you

complete the form, you must submit it online at [www.frostburg.edu/foundation/forms/opportunity-grant-request](http://www.frostburg.edu/foundation/forms/opportunity-grant-request). No paper or emailed applications will be accepted.

The deadline for proposals is midnight on **Sunday, March 8, 2015**. The campus community will be notified of the awards following the June 2015 Foundation Board meeting.

Projects may be funded from the following:

### FSUF Foundation Opportunity Grants

The selection committee is especially interested in funding projects that support FSU's institutional priority to enhance experiential and applied learning opportunities for students inside and outside the classroom.

Unrestricted gift revenues may also be made available to fund the following priorities:

- Improve learning technology, tools and equipment so students learn in a modern environment
- Improve student persistence to graduation
- Provide for educational and cultural enrichment of the University and the community
- Improve student health and wellness
- Enhance the University's practices and reputation regarding environmental protection and sustainability

The Foundation, Alumni Association and the Faculty/Staff Special Gifts Committee are working hard to grow the Annual Fund to be able to increase the funds to disperse in this competitive process.

### Al and Dale Boxley Faculty Award/Student Research Award

The purpose of this fund is to support faculty or student projects. The faculty awards may be used to cover travel and registration fees for a disciplinary conference at which the faculty member will give a formal paper that will result in a publication in a refereed journal or the conference proceedings, or the faculty member will give a presentation, poster session or other appropriate activity resulting in formal recognition. The student awards are to be used for travel and registration fees for a disciplinary conference at which the student will have an opportunity to present his or her work with the faculty member for a student research stipend or equipment and/or supplies for a specific undergraduate or graduate research project connected to the research program of a faculty member.

**Jonathan Gibraltar Presidential Leadership Fund for Alcohol Awareness and Education**

The purpose of this fund is to support educational programs, social programs and/or community service-related programs geared toward alcohol awareness and the importance of responsible behaviors and decision making. Applicants should demonstrate the potential impact of the proposed program by providing information on how the program’s success will be measured and estimating the numbers of participants the program is intended to involve. Consideration will be provided to those programs whose intent is to foster a broader awareness of alcohol-related issues beyond the immediate campus community. Programs that include the community of Frostburg or relationships between the University and community, for example, can be given consideration.

**College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Faculty Development Award**

The purpose of the fund is to support faculty development initiatives for faculty members in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

**Catherine R. Gira Campus to Community Awards**

The purpose of the fund is to support students or student projects that demonstrate an entrepreneurial spirit, critical thinking skills and a determination to be successful. The activities benefit students and further enhance FSU’s role as a leader in the promotion of real-life experiences that complement traditional classroom instruction.

**Woodward and Virginia Pealer Faculty Development Award**

The purpose of the fund is to support student scholarships and faculty development initiatives. Foundation Opportunity Grants can utilize up to 40 percent in support of University faculty development programs for the following uses:

- Stipends/funding and travel expenses for visiting scholars, lecturers, artists, performers and programs
- Recognition and promotion of these activities
- Equipment purchases in conjunction with these activities
- Outreach/professional development programs for Allegany County, Md.

**Stephen M. Spahr Student Activism Award**

The purpose of the fund is to provide financial assistance to student organizations, classes or informal groups of students needing funds to travel to programs or centers of governmental activity to experience, firsthand, the workings of the democratic process.

**Marlene Weimer Memorial Scholarly Endeavors Fund**

The purpose of this fund is to support scholarly endeavors in the area of innovative mathematics faculty development initiatives and/or scholarship support for outstanding mathematics students, depending on the area of greatest need as determined annually by the Mathematics Department.

**Celebrate Holiday Season With Heartwarming ‘Trial of Ebenezer Scrooge’**

Theatre and Dance at FSU will celebrate this holiday season with an ingenious new take on Charles Dickens’ family classic with “The Trial of Ebenezer Scrooge” by Mark Brown. Hailed by The Seattle Times as “a sequel worthy of Dickens’ approval,” performances will run **Dec. 11** at 7:30 p.m., **Dec. 12** at 5 p.m. and **Dec. 13** at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre of FSU’s Performing Arts Center.

In this trial of the century, Scrooge returns to his curmudgeonly ways by charging Jacob Marley and the Christmas Spirits with attempted murder, kidnapping, breaking and entering, stalking and the intentional infliction of emotional distress.

It’s 1844, exactly one year after the night in question, and the old penny-pincher goes head-to-head with the savvy and clever Solomon Rothschild in a cross-examination of your favorite characters from “A Christmas Carol.” As disorder in the court erupts, the audience is led to wonder what will become of the merciful holiday ghosts. Will the strict Judge Pearson, a bit of a scrooge himself, find the spirits guilty as charged? Will the cold-hearted Scrooge get them banished from Christmas forever?

## Points of Pride

### FSU’s Andy Duncan Wins World Fantasy Award for Best Novella



**Andy Duncan**, an associate professor of English at FSU, has won the 2014 World Fantasy Award for Best Novella for “Wakulla Springs,” a novella about multiple generations in an African-American family living in a strange place in Florida. The awards, widely considered one of the most prestigious fantasy awards, were given at the World Fantasy Convention on Nov. 9 in Arlington, Va.

“Wakulla Springs,” which Duncan co-wrote with Ellen Klages, is also a finalist for this year’s Hugo, Locus and Nebula writing awards. This is his third World Fantasy Award. Duncan previously won in the Collection and Short Fiction categories. His novelette “Close Encounters” won a 2013 Nebula Award from the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America. He has also won the Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award for his novella, “The Chief Designer,” and has been nominated for the Hugo Awards multiple times.

The World Fantasy Awards are voted on by a panel of judges that changes every year as well as by the previous year’s convention members. In the 40-year history of the World Fantasy Awards, Duncan is only the eighth person to win three or more times in the fiction-writing categories (Short Fiction, Novella, Collection and Novel).

“Wakulla Springs” is different from other nominees and winners of the World Fantasy Awards in that it is not fantasy in the traditional sense. Fantastic elements in most fantasy fiction are obvious but are less so in “Wakulla Springs.”

“The monster never comes out of the woods,” Duncan said. “It’s about the magical worlds and monsters we create for ourselves.” Patrick Nielsen Hayden, editor of Tor.com, the online science fiction magazine that published the novella in October of 2013, calls the story “American Magic Realism.”

### FSU’s SOFI Program Wins Award at NUTN Network Conference

FSU’s Student Online Freshman Initiative (SOFI) program won the Open Division Recipient Award at the NUTN Network Conference in September. FSU won the award for developing an innovative program or practice that contributed to the field of distance education, in the context of a new or ongoing program and student support services.

FSU’s SOFI program allows freshmen to take one or more courses in core skills required for graduation in the General Education Program in the summer before their first semester. SOFI allows students to get a head start toward graduation and allows them more flexibility in planning their college careers. For example, students could use the flexibility to plan for study abroad, internships, earlier graduation or adding a second major or a minor to their degree.

**Stacey Utley-Bernhardt**, coordinator of SOFI at FSU, attended the NUTN Network Conference to accept the award and network with other professionals in the field of teaching with technology.

“The conference was very valuable because it helped me to think about how we market our online experience here at Frostburg,” Utley-Bernhardt said. “So many institutions in North America get stuck doing the ‘same old thing’ when it comes to distance education, and it was great for me to go and share SOFI with other people who are as excited about online learning as we at FSU are.”

## Dr. Greg Wood Invited Guest Speaker at Northern Michigan University

In October, **Dr. Greg Wood**, an associate professor and director of the Honors Program in the Department of History, was an invited guest speaker at his alma mater of Northern Michigan University at the retirement of his undergraduate mentor, Dr. Russell M. Magnaghi. Wood's presentation on "Industry, Labor and the Right to Smoke in Michigan's Arsenal of Democracy," examined the interwoven histories of smoking prohibitions and wildcat strikes in Detroit-area factories during World War II. It was first published in a 2014 collection of scholarly essays, "Northern Border: History and Lore of Michigan's Upper Peninsula and Beyond" (NMU Press, 2014), that honored Magnaghi's many contributions to Michigan and Great Lakes history.

You have the option of having alerts sent to two cell numbers and six email addresses, for example, if you want your family members to be informed. (They cannot sign up without your input.) This option is found under “Services.” Make sure to follow the validation steps to activate your choices.

**Unless FSU closure is announced on the outlets above, WE ARE OPEN.** Likewise, the message under option 2 at the main University number will either announce the closure or announce, “There are no delays or closures at this time.”

**FOR FACULTY/STAFF: Personnel compensation for closures or delays will be based on the appropriate cancellation/delay message as presented on the FSU voice-mail system.** A reminder: Essential personnel are required to report to work in the event of any cancellation or delay. These individuals have been notified of their “essential” status by their department heads. If you are unsure of your status, check with your supervisor.

If, in your judgment, it is not safe for you to come to work or class while the University is still open, you must contact your supervisor and provide this information. If liberal leave is announced for employees, it is expected that everyone will make an effort to report to work and class. Employees will be charged for the appropriate leave time. **The announcement of liberal leave DOES NOT cancel classes or relieve essential employees of their need to report to work during inclement weather.**

**FOR STUDENTS: The announcement of liberal leave for employees DOES NOT cancel classes.** If you have concerns about your ability to make it to class in bad weather, discuss them with your faculty members BEFORE the weather turns nasty. (If you are a student at a facility outside of Frostburg, officials from that facility will determine closures for those locations.)

Depending on the severity of the weather, **the Ort Library, the Lane University Center and the Cordts PE Center** may open with limited hours and services on days that classes are cancelled. This service is for students living on campus and within walking distance. Do not attempt to drive to campus if the weather is severe enough to warrant closing the University, for your own safety and for the sake of those who must work to clear parking lots and sidewalks. **When it is determined that it is safe to open these buildings, announcements will be made via student email and the front page of the FSU website.**

**FOR ALL: The final decision with regard to your personal safety resides with you.**
