FSU Officially Opens Center for Communications & Information Technology

FSU's newest academic building, the Center for Communications and Information Technology (CCIT), had its grand opening on Wednesday, Sept. 24, with a virtual version of the traditional ribbon cutting created by FSU faculty and students, in keeping with the building's technological focus.

CCIT, which cost \$71 million, including design, construction and equipment, is home to the disciplines of Computer Science and Information Technologies, Graphic Design, Mass Communication/Communication Studies and Mathematics. Departments are furnished with equipment mirroring what graduates should expect to find in industry. CCIT also houses WFWM, the NPR affiliate radio station; FSU-TV3, the cable TV station; and the Multimedia Learning Center, featuring a planetarium with a live feed to the rooftop observatory.

"The students who study here will learn the high-tech trades they need to help drive our country into the future," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "I want to thank all of the staff and faculty who worked so hard to turn a dream into reality. I've seen the way their vision, creativity and skills all came together to design this facility. From the ground up, CCIT has been designed to facilitate student learning."

Using iPads, Gibralter, Md. State Sen. George Edwards, Allegany County Commissioner William Valentine, Frostburg Mayor Robert Flanigan, Cumberland City Councilman David F. Kauffman, Student Government Association President Kathleena M. Morgan and Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Joseph Hoffman jointly "cut the ribbon." As each person activated the web application, "scissors" started moving, then the animation launched, cutting through a red ribbon to an image of CCIT.

Additionally, screens throughout the building displayed information about the building and played a film, based on web-cam video, of the former Tawes Hall being demolished and CCIT rising in its place. This video can be viewed at www.frostburg.edu/ccit/time-lapse-video-demolition-construction.

Built and designed by a team of companies led by Gilbane Building Co. and Ayers Saint Gross Architects + Planners, the 127,000-square-foot structure sits in the middle of campus where Tawes Hall once stood. The building's technological advantages include industry-standard equipment for disciplines such as Mass Communication and Graphic Design, and the ability to create applications for businesses in Computer Science and Information Technologies.

In addition, CCIT is designed to have a big impact on education but a small one on the environment, from a green roof to the rainwater collection and bio-retention rain garden to the daylight-harvesting lighting system that senses ambient light and adjusts accordingly.

As part of FSU's fall 2014 Philosophical Forum, *Dr. Austin Dacey*, a lecturer in the Department of Philosophy, will give a presentation on "Beyond Religious Freedom: Conscience and the Law After Hobby Lobby" on **Tuesday, Oct. 21**, from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232).

In June 2014, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that "closely held" for-profit corporations cannot be required to provide health plans including contraception because this violates owners' free exercise of religion. This talk presents a legal, philosophical and moral case against special protection of religion and for equal treatment of all claims of conscience.

Dacey, a former NGO (non-governmental organization) representative to the United Nations, is the author of "The Secular Conscience: Why Belief Belongs in Public." His writings have appeared in the New York Times, USA Today, Salon and Dissent.

This year's award winners have a combined 51 years of service to FSU.

Knouse was honored in the Exempt (salaried) employee category. FSU Nothing But Nets Campaign Aims to Help Wipe Out Malaria in Africa

This is the final year of a three-year Nothing But Nets commitment at FSU to help defeat malaria in Africa. This year's campaign will run **through October**. FSU's Fellowship of Christian Athletes, through the Intermural program, will kick off the event with a Nothing But Nets Basketball Tournament on **Saturday**, **Oct. 4**, in the Cordts PE Center main gym. The deadline to sign up a team of five or more (up to 10) through the Intermural website is **Wednesday**, **Oct 1**. The donation is \$2 per person. Teams can be co-ed.

The campaign focuses on:

- Prevention: Distributing insecticide-treated bed nets (Nothing But Nets) and working to drain standing water where mosquitoes breed
- Education: Teaching people in rural areas how to protect themselves from mosquitoes and identify early symptoms of malaria
- Treatment: Improving existing hospitals and clinics, training community health workers and providing life-saving medicines

Malaria is preventable and treatable. Just \$10 buys a net that can sleep four people and protect them. In Rwanda alone, after bed nets and medication were distributed, the under-five child mortality rate decreased by 66 percent within two years.
