Innovative Saxophonist Derek Brown to Appear in CES' On the EDGE Series



CES at FSU will present innovative beatbox saxophonist Derek Brown as part of its On the EDGE series on **Thursday, Oct. 24**, at 7:30 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall. The event features informal table seating, comfortable couch and armchair seating, a free appetizer and a cash bar. Brown will be joined onstage by the WVU Potomac State College/Community Jazz Ensemble and **faculty members from FSU's Department of Music**. (Due to a scheduling conflict, the FSU Jazz Orchestra will no longer perform at this event.)

Crossing genres from jazz to classical to funk, Brown is best known for his particular style of playing, dubbed "BEATBOX SAX," which combines various extended techniques, percussive effects (e.g.,

stomping and beating his saxophone) and at times vocal elements. His particular style has gained him a following around the world, and his popular YouTube videos have received more than 11 million views.

Jazz journalist and historian Scott Yanow raved, "Brown performs unaccompanied solos that occasionally make one recall Bobby McFerrin in his early prime and the great saxophonist Eddie Harris ... utilizing slap-tonguing, circular breathing, a wide interest in musical styles and dazzling coordination to create rather unique music." According to National Public Radio, "When you listen to Derek Brown play the sax, you figure this guy has got to be using all kinds of loops and overdubs and electronic pyrotechnics. And then when you figure out it's just him playing live, it is a little bit hard to fathom."

Community members are invited to observe Brown as he leads a master class with student musicians, also on **Oct. 24**. The 2 p.m. event will take place in Pealer Recital Hall. Space is limited and reservations are requested; contact ces@frostburg.edu for reservations.

Zhicen Liu Will Perform Junior Piano Recital

FSU student Zhicen "Luke" Liu will present his junior piano recital on Saturday, Oct. 26, at 7:30 p.m.

Liu will perform "Prelude and Fugue in F Minor, WTC I, BWV 857" by Johann Sebastian Bach; "Largo – Allegro," "Adagio" and "Allegretto" from "Sonata in D Minor, Op. 31, No. 2" by Ludwig Van Beethoven; "La Cathedrale engloutie" from "Preludes, livre 1" by Claude Debussy; and "Scherzo in C-sharp Minor, Op. 39" by Frederic Chopin.

"The Well-Tempered Clavier, BWV 846–893" ("Das Wohltemperirte Clavier") is a book of preludes and fugues in all 24 major and minor keys, dated 1722, composed "for the profit and use of musical youth desirous of learning, and especially for the pastime of those already skilled in this study." In Bach's time clavier (keyboard) was a generic name indicating a variety of keyboard instruments.

Beethoven wrote his 32 piano sonatas between 1795 and 1822. The German Romantic composer Hans von Bülow called them "The New Testament" of the piano literature (Bach's "The Well-Tempered Clavier" being "The Old Testament"). "Piano Sonata No. 17 in D Minor, Op. 31, No. 2," composed in 1801-02, is usually referred to as "The Tempest."

"La Cathédrale engloutie" ("The Submerged Cathedral"), written for solo piano and published in 1910 as the 10th prelude in Debussy's first volume of 12 piano preludes, is an example of his musical impressionism in that it is a musical depiction of, or allusion to, an image or idea. The piece is based on an ancient Breton myth in which a cathedral, submerged underwater off the coast of the Island of Ys, rises up from the sea on clear mornings when the water is transparent.

Chopin completed "Scherzo No. 3 in C-sharp Minor, Op. 39" in 1839, in the abandoned monastery of Valldemossa on the Balearic island of Majorca, Spain. This is the most terse, ironic and tightly constructed of the four scherzos.

MCTA to Present Irish Fiddler Frankie Gavin, With Tommy McCarthy and Louise Costello

FSU's Mountain City Traditional Arts will host legendary Irish fiddler Frankie Gavin on **Monday, Nov. 4**, at 7 p.m. at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. He will be joined by world-renowned musicians Tommy McCarthy on fiddle and Louise Costello on banjo. The live entertainment is free and open to the public with a suggested donation of \$15.

Known as a founding member of the Irish supergroup, DeDannan, Gavin has been a fixture in the traditional Irish music scene for more than half a century. He has performed for four American presidents, starting as a 7-year old, when he played for John F. Kennedy on his 1963 visit to Ireland. He holds the Guinness World Record as fastest fiddler.

Originally influenced by the great Irish and American-Irish fiddle players James Morrison and Michael Coleman, Gavin later played with stars such as The Rolling Stones, Stephane Grappelli, Elvis Costello, Earl Scruggs and Yehudi Menhuin, as well as with some of the prominent contemporary players and singers of traditional Irish music. All have left their mark on his eclectic approach to music.

McCarthy and Costello grew up in families steeped in Ireland's rich music history. McCarthy, born in London to Irish parents, grew up listening to traditional music and playing with all of the legendary Irish players who were living in London. Costello hails from Galway, Ireland. After playing with her father Denny and local fiddlers, she became part of the city's vibrant session scene. It was there that her banjo playing was influenced by Charlie Piggott.

CLA Will Host Poet John Hoppenthaler



FSU's Center for Literary Arts presents a night of laughter and emotion as award-winning poet John Hoppenthaler takes the stage on **Tuesday, Oct. 22**, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lyric Theatre at 20 E. Main St. in Frostburg.

As a child, Hoppenthaler wanted to become a comedian and was even labeled a class clown. He now uses his humor in his poetry as well as his insecurities, family and relationships. Most of his poems are persona poems. He creates a story or lyric moment that may not tell his complete truth, but it incorporates something of larger human truths.

Hoppenthaler edits "A Poetry Congeries" for the cultural journal "Connotation Press: An Online Artifact," and he is on the advisory board for Backbone Press, an organization dedicated to marginalized voices. For nine years he served as personal assistant to Toni Morrison. He is also a professor of creative writing and literature at East Carolina University.

His first book of poetry was "Lives of Water," followed by "Anticipate the Coming Reservoir" and "Domestic Garden," which won the Brockman-Campbell Award for the best volume of poetry published by a North Carolina writer in 2015. With Kazim Ali, he has coedited a volume of essays and interviews on the poetry of Jean Valentine, "This-World Company." His works have appeared in the "Virginia Quarterly Review," "Southern Review," "The Greenwood Encyclopedia of American Poetry" and many other publications.

Macklin specializes in audience participation, character education and developmentally appropriate programming with a talent for telling stories to young listeners, ages 3 years and up. She has received the Solo Theatrical

Performer Fellowship through Maryland State Arts Council, as well as the Arts and Humanities Council of Montgomery County, in addition to the Teaching Artist Institute Fellowship and was the Taft Museum's 2013 Duncanson Artist-in-Residence.

As a performer, certified educator and teaching artist, Macklin believes in "making a difference, one story at a time." She has performed from Massachusetts to California for venues such as the National Air and Space Museum, Cincinnati's Playhouse in the Park, National Association of Black Storytellers Festival and Conference, Wolf Trap's Theatre in the Woods, Smithsonian National Museum of African Art and the National Storytelling Festival's Exchange Place.

Philosophical Forum - FSU's Dr. David Atenasio to Challenge **Arguments Supporting Racial Profiling**



FSU's Department of Philosophy will present a lecture by Dr. David Atenasio, "Racial Profiling and Proximity to Crime," on Tuesday, Oct. 29, at 7 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). This event is free and open to the public.

The term "racial profiling" conjures up images of white police officers following black children around the mall or Middle Easterners being pulled out of airport security lines. However, a number of philosophers have defended limited versions of racial profiling. They argue that certain forms of racial profiling might have good consequences or that some racial profiling is part of the social contract. Their arguments rely on the claim that there are differential crime rates between races.

In this presentation, Atenasio, a lecturer in FSU's Philosophy Department, will challenge these arguments. After clarifying statements about differential crime rates and sorting different forms of racial profiling, he will argue that in its paradigmatic form, racial profiling attributes crime propensity rates to individuals based on race instead of proximity to crime, with no justification for doing so.



Dustin Davis' Metal Sculpture Wins 'Best of Show' in Online Art Competition

FSU's Professor of Visual Arts *Dustin Davis* has been awarded "Best of Show" for his sculpture "Yellow Abstract," which was featured in "The HUMAN Figure" September-October online show by the Bauhaus Prairie Art Gallery, one of several honors Davis' work has received in recent months.

The Bauhaus Prairie Art Gallery celebrates the modernity of creative contemporary and traditional art through online art competitions. Artwork submitted for "The HUMAN Figure" was required to represent qualities that are inherent in the human figure, such as proportions of the body and expressiveness.

"Yellow Abstract" is a metal assemblage that shows the figure in motion. The sculpture's design resembles a human figure skating across an icy pond. Davis' use of yellow makes it stand out from its surroundings and grabs the attention of viewers. Davis explained that he uses scrap metal for the sake of sustainability and for how the metal is shaped during the recycling process.

Davis' work has been exhibited in many international and national exhibitions. "Yellow Abstract" also won an Honorable Mention Award in the Second Annual Mind Body Spirit Art Exhibition at J. Mane Gallery, an online gallery whose mission is to promote the work of emerging and experienced artists. Davis has received two awards in the 3-Dimensional Category from the LightSpaceTime online gallery, second place in the July exhibit "Primary Colors" and third place in the summer exhibit "555 Special Exhibition." His work has also been reviewed in the Baltimore Sun and displayed in the online galleries LightSpaceTime, Fusion and Fine Arts America.



A world-premiere play from FSU alum *Keenan Scott II*, one of today's boldest new voices, "Thoughts of a Colored Man" blends language, music and dance.
