Bobcats Celebrate Homecoming and Family Weekend at FSU Oct. 17-20

It's that time of year again when Bobcats of all generations come together to celebrate during the FSU 2024 Homecoming and Family Weekend! FSU students, families, friends, alumni, faculty and staff will be showing their Bobcat pride **from Thursday, Oct. 17, to Sunday, Oct. 20**.

The celebration kicks off by showing appreciation to FSU retired employees through an invitation-only Retired Employee and Employee Service Awards Luncheon on

Thursday in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall of the Lane University Center. A faculty and staff Ice Cream Social follows from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. in back of Lane Manicur Hall. Later that night, a Bobcat Variety Show will be held from 7 to 9 p.m., also in Lane Manicur Hall.

As part of FSU's Homecoming weekend, FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance will open its 2024-2025 season with the children's musical, "Blueberries for Sal," on **Saturday, Oct. 19**, at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre of the Performing Arts Center.

Based on the cherished children's book by Robert McCloskey, "Blueberries for Sal: The Musical" brings all of your favorite characters to life in the imaginative setting of Blueberry Hill.

Kuplink, kuplank, kuplunk! Sal and her mother grab their pails and head to Blueberry Hill to pick delicious blueberries for the winter months ahead. On the other side of the hill, Mama Bear and Baby Bear also fill up on scrumptious blue morsels for the long hibernation. When fearless Sal and frightful Baby Bear wander off, they have a mixed-up adventure in the Maine woods. Featuring catchy and heartwarming tunes like "Big Big Kid," "Little Pail," "Why Does Winter Happen" and "Learn to Fly," "Blueberries for Sal: The Musical" highlights the powerful bond between parent and child and the exuberant joy of wildlife, imagination and self-discovery.

Directed by *Nicole Mattis* with musical direction by Michaela Hale and choreography by theatre major *Grace Stevenson*, "Blueberries for Sal" was adapted for the stage by Michael J. Bobbitt and Sandra B. Eskin with music and lyrics by William Yanesh.

Storyteller Adam Booth to Appear at MCTA



FSU's Mountain City Traditional Arts will host storyteller Adam Booth for an enthralling evening of Appalachian Tales on **Wednesday, Oct. 16**, at 7 p.m. at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The live entertainment is open to the public through general admission with a suggested donation of \$15.

Recognized in 2022 as West Virginia Folk Artist of the Year, Booth blends traditional mountain folklore, music and an awareness of contemporary Appalachia to create story artistry. His cinematic style, both humorous and touching, is influenced by generations of diverse storytellers from West Virginia.

Booth's new multidisciplinary program, "The Heron's Journey," has been selected for the 2024-2025 Mid Atlantic Arts Touring Roster. As a nationally touring artist, his professional telling appearances include premiere storytelling events across the United States, including the Kennedy Center Millennium Stage, the Timpanogos Storytelling Festival, the National Storytelling Festival and Teller-in-Residence at the International Storytelling Center (four times), as well as resident at the Banff Spoken Word program in Alberta, Canada, multiple storytelling and music events in 30 states and collaborations with the West Virginia Dance Company, Goose Route Dance Company, Frederick Chorale, Hagerstown Choral Arts Society and Winchester Musica Viva.

Equally at home as a teller and educator, his research fellowships and presentations have included the Berea Appalachian Sound Archives Fellowship, Ghost Ranch, the National Storytelling Conference, the Appalachian Studies Association Conference, the National Endowment for the Humanities Voices from the Misty Mountains summer seminars and institute and a commission from the National Academy of Medicine.

He is a member of the Recording Academy (GRAMMYs), and his stories and recordings have been honored with many national awards, including a Parents' Choice Gold Award, two Parents' Choice Silver Honors, five Storytelling World Awards and Honors, the National Storytelling Network's J.J. Reneaux Mentorship Grant and four West Virginia Liars' Contest wins. Booth serves as the inaugural Storyteller-in-Residence at Shepherd University and is the founding artistic director of the Speak Story Series, now in its 12th season. Booth is most at home sharing stories and music with the next generation of listeners and tellers throughout Appalachia.

Saxophonist Jeremy Koch Will Perform Guest Artist Series Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present saxophonist Jeremy Koch in a Guest Artist Series concert on **Monday, Oct. 7**, at 7:30 p.m. He will be accompanied by pianist Molly Orlando.

For this concert, Koch will perform works by Jennifer Jolley, Miriama Young, Carter Pann, Max Bruch and Jerod Tate.

In addition to the performance, a master class will be held at 3 p.m. in room 213 of the Performing Arts Center.

Koch is a saxophonist, chamber musician, educator and arts administrator in the Washington, D.C., area. He is former principal saxophonist and section leader of the United States Air Force Band and has been a featured concert soloist on countless national tours and international conferences. As a freelance saxophonist, Koch has performed at prestigious venues such as Carnegie Hall, Chicago's Orchestra Hall and the Kennedy Center. He regularly performs with the National Symphony Orchestra, Kennedy Center Opera Orchestra and Atlantic Reed Consort. A proponent of new music, Koch has premiered solo, saxophone quartet, reed quintet and concerto works at numerous conferences. He can be heard on countless recordings with the USAF Band.

Committed to teaching, he regularly presents educational clinics, coaching and lessons to students ranging from fifth grade, high school and college to those preparing for professional auditions. He is lecturer of saxophone and chamber music at George Washington University as well as an adjunct professor of saxophone at Shepherd University and maintains a private teaching studio in Bethesda, Md.

As an arts administrator, Koch was appointed the manager of Guest Artist Relations for the USAF Band and has directed collaborations with celebrated artists from across the musical spectrum. Previously, he managed, developed and curated chamber music programs for the USAF Band at the Smithsonian American History Museum, National Gallery of Art, National Archives and Kennedy Center.

Choral Concert, 'Solidarity Forever: Music of the Labor Movement'

FSU's Department of Music, in collaboration with *Dr. Gregory Wood* of FSU's Department of History and the Ort Library's Special Collections, will present the Fall Choral Concert, "Solidarity Forever: Music of the Labor Movement," on **Friday, Oct. 18**, at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Scott Rieker, director of Choral Activities, will conduct this concert of choral arrangements of songs representing the struggle of workers throughout the United States, particularly in Appalachia. Rieker spent the summer researching, transcribing and arranging music from the Smithsonian Folkways archive, and this concert features numerous premieres, including songs that have never before been written down. The FSU Chamber Singers, University Chorale and Troubadours Tenor-Bass Choir, accompanied by pianist *Dr. Joseph Yungen*, will be joined by alumni instrumentalists for this uplifting retrospective that has an uncanny relevance to current day events.

Tickets are \$10 for adults; \$5 for members of the military, seniors and FSU faculty and staff; and free for students and children. Tickets can be purchased at <u>tickets.frostburg.edu</u>. Tickets will also be available for purchase at the door.

Then, come back the following evening at 7:30 p.m., when the FSU Chorale will join the FSU Wind Ensemble for "The Circus Band" (1894) by American composer Charles Ives. "The Circus Band" is the last in a set of five songs that Ives called "Five Street Songs," written while he was a student at Yale University. This stirring march in "quickstep time" is primarily tonal, with moments of unexpected rhythmic twists and syncopations, as well as a sprinkling of "wrong notes" in homage to the amateur town band.

FSU Social Justice Summit

The 2024 Social Justice Summit will be held **Friday, Oct. 25, through Sunday, Oct. 27**. Registration ends **Wednesday, Oct. 9**. The summit is free and open to all FSU students.

This event provides FSU students with the opportunity to increase their awareness surrounding issues of diversity, equity and inclusion. Action plans developed during the weekend will assist them in being agents of positive change on campus. This weekend-long event gives students the chance to learn more about self, engage in discussion with other students on a variety of issues and create strategies for implementing social change.

Social justice is the continuous process of eliminating ignorance and prejudice through education and advocacy to bring about greater equity among all members of society and ensuring no dimension of identity is continually faced with systemic oppression. Social justice is a process in which we strive to eliminate the roots of oppression through education and the redistribution of resources, opportunities and responsibilities. In the pursuit of social justice, education must be used as a tool to empower people so that they can eliminate the oppression of all. Acting as one, we must create an open, equitable and just society.

Learning outcomes for the summit include the following:

Participants will be able to articulate concepts and terminology related to social justice. (Terms: social justice, privilege, power, oppression, marginalization and intersectionality)

Participants will be able to recognize their own intersectional social identities in relation to privilege, power and oppression.

Participants will be able to articulate how concepts of privilege, power and oppression operate within the FSU community and larger society.

Participants will be able to explain how they will incorporate learning from the summit into their daily practices.

Duggan has had residencies at Fish Factory, Creative Center of Stöðvarfjörður, Iceland; Sculpture Space Inc. in Utica, N.Y.; Praxis Fiber Workshop in Ohio; Cooler Ranch, Landfalls and Governors Island Art Fair in New York; the Musk Ox Farm in Alaska; Ponyride, as a Knight Foundation Emerging Artist, in Michigan; and Rob

Dunn Lab at North Carolina State University and North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences.

Awards include the Juror's Prize at Art on the Trails by Sarah Montross; the Integrated Coastal Programs Coastal Fellowship (Coastal Studies Institute), RCAA, East Carolina University; and project grants from the North Carolina Arts Council. An associate professor at East Carolina University, Duggan has also taught at the University of North Texas, Georgia State University and Penland School of Craft.

Duggan's work simulates binary systems, drawing attention to inter-reliance between dichotomies by positioning grey areas in balanced tension. Textile strategies, technology and materials have been a reliable foundation for the artist's work to reflect social, political and historical implications of power.

Duggan constructs installations in three-dimensional space by applying principles of tension and repetition to post-consumer and post-industrial materials. These works range from intimate to significant in scale through material choice and context. When performing with sound, image or as image, Duggan steps into these roles directly inhabiting spaces of lost and self-possessed agency.


FSU Professors to Read Essays From Armiento's New Book on Poe

Health and Safety Messages

October is Fire Safety Month



Each year, the National Fire Protection Association observes National Fire Safety Month in **October** with **Oct. 7 to 13** being national fire prevention week and **Oct. 13** being National Home Fire Drill Day.

Below are some steps to follow to ensure your workplace (and home) are fireproof.

Eliminate clutter. Clutter can easily become a fuel source in the event of a fire, allowing it to spread quickly. Clutter can also restrict access to emergency equipment and exit routes.

Maintain the appropriate type and number of fire extinguishers. Conduct monthly and annual extinguisher inspections to ensure they are in good working condition. Provide training for employees on the correct use of fire extinguishers.

Use and store chemicals safely. Read hazard warning labels and safety data sheets to determine flammability and other fire hazards. Ensure your chemical storage areas provide adequate ventilation for the storage of chemical or other hazardous substances.

Limit the accumulation of flammable or combustible materials and residues.

Ensure emergency exit route diagrams are posted and accessible in all areas of the facility for all employees to easily view. Additionally, ensure means of egress are well-lit with regulated exit signs.

Employees should have access to a list of contact phone numbers in case of an emergency. Remember that human nature is to panic in emergency situations; therefore, basics such as the company address, important phone numbers and a building floor plan should be posted on or with the emergency action plan.
