FSU Commencement Ceremonies Slated for Saturday, May 27

The 116th commencement ceremonies of Frostburg State University will be held Saturday, May 27, in the Harold J. Cordts Center Main Arena.

Two exercises will be held during the day. The College of Business and the College of Education will present degrees beginning at 10 a.m. and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will start at 2:30 p.m. President Catherine R. Gira will confer both graduate and undergraduate degrees at both events.

During the afternoon ceremony, the University will present Casper R. Taylor Jr., Speaker of the Maryland House of Delegates, with the honorary degree Doctor of Humane Letters, in recognition of his service to the State of Maryland, Western Maryland and FSU.

Student speakers at the spring commencements include Brian Davis for the College of Business, Nicholas Shockney for the College of Education and Jodie Goldsworthy Gordon for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

Davis, a business administration major concentrating in marketing, has excelled in his academics while working as a marketing assistant for the National Institute of Standards and Technology in Gaithersburg, Md

A transfer student from Frederick Community College, Davis was an honor roll student and a member of the business administration program. Since coming

to FSU, Davis has been an active member of Sigma Beta Delta, the international business honors fraternity, where he organized group fund-raisers and activities. He has also worked as a student tutor for the Programs for Academic Support and Study (PASS) office on campus. Shockney's work with children

has gone beyond the traditional classroom setting. The early childhood/elementary education major has obtained valuable experience as an American Red Cross lifesaving, CPR and first aid instructor and

a YMCA lifeguard and swim instructor. He has also served as an afterschool day-care worker, a substitute teacher and football coach.

At FSU, Shockney has had a wide range of classroom experiences in which he team taught, developed integrated units and worked with special needs students. He has developed a reputation for communicating high expectations and encouraging critical thinking in his students. Incorporating technology in the classroom, Shockney has been involved in the success of an after-school Internet "Surf Club" for his students.

Jodie Goldsworthy Gordon, who will graduate with a double major in political science and history, has been noted for her outstanding academic accomplishments and exemplary service to the community.

A non-traditional student, Gordon transferred to FSU from Allegany College where she received awards for excellence in philosophy and political science. She has continued her pursuit of academic excellence and is being recognized as the Department of Political Science's honors graduate. She is also a member of Pi Sigma Alpha, the national political science honor society.

While completing her academic work, Gordon was elected to the Allegany County Board of Education. Her leadership in promoting public education has led to her serving as the president of the board.

Presenting candidates for degrees will be Dr. Christine R. Grontkowski, Provost; Dr. Joseph F. Malak, Dean of Assessment, Graduate Services and Special Programs; Dr. Susan Arisman, Dean of the College of Education, Dr. Steven P. Info Sessions Set on Various M.Ed. Degrees

The Department of Educational Professions has scheduled several information sessions regarding Master in Education degrees

Proposed Master of Education in Special Education degree: Monday,
May 15, from 7 to 8 p.m. in the Leake
Room in the Cordts Center

The proposed degree is now in the process of university and state approval and is designed for certified teachers or candidates who are eligible for special education positions. The area of concentration is Special Education Teachers of Students with Disabilities in Individualized General Education Programs.

This 39-42-credit program is intended to lead to certification as a generic special educator of students with mild/moderate disabilities at the Elementary/Middle (K-8) or Secondary/Adult (6-12) levels

Applicants to this program must hold or be eligible for certification as a public school teacher.

Master of Education program in Reading: Tuesday, May 16, from 7 to 8 p.m. in Framptom Hall, Room 206.

This master's program has been updated to match International Reading Association, Maryland State Department of Education and National Collegiate Accreditation for Teacher Education standards. The 39-credit program is intended for people who hold a baccalaureate degree and want to receive additional training to be able to work in public/private schools as reading teachers.

Investment Challenge Winners Survive Market

Despite the scary performance of the stock market in recent weeks, the top two winners of the Stock



Investment Challenge at FSU managed to make money.

The challenge, sponsored by the FSU Finance Club and Primevest Investment Center, was to manage a simulated stock portfolio worth \$500,000 for eight weeks from Feb. 28 to April 28. It was open to all students in Business, Accounting and Economics in the FSU College of Business.

The winner, who got \$250 in real money, was Roberta E. Coccagna of Frederick, Md., whose ending portfolio value was \$608,004. She beat the performance of a simulated Standard and Poors 500 Index account by \$69,289.

The second place finishers were the team of Stacey Baker of Clear Spring, Md., and Sarah Strawderman of Cumberland, Md., whose ending portfolio value was \$512,748. They win \$100.

The third place team was Rizwan Jan of Hanover, Md., and Jake Dyer of LaPlata, Md., whose ending portfolio value was \$464,545.

For comparison, the average for all 18 participants, most in teams of two students, was \$352,856 for the period. The lowest performer had a value of \$138,353.

Course offerings are available in a wide variety of subjects. The cost of the program is the same as one semester (in-state) at FSU.

Dear Students:

Former students, principals, superintendents, and accrediting agencies have asked that all teacher education students spend more time in the field. Accordingly, Frostburg State University has increased field experiences for all students to meet these demands. To support this endeavor, we have had to raise our student internship fee to \$250.00. This amount does not cover the stipends given to the school-based supervisor. In future years, the fee will probably be raised to cover the full amount.

I realize that the increase in fees will be a hardship for many of you. Hopefully, the opportunity to qualify for a Hope Scholarship will decrease this hardship.

I wanted you to know this change before you leave for the summer so that you can plan to meet this new cost which will affect students starting their internships fall 2000.

Although I regret this increase, I truly believe that it is the best way to support the escalating demands described above.

Faculty Notes

Dr. Mary Kay Finan, Dr. David Fell, Dr. Tom Palardy, Dr. Melanie Biermann, Kim Rotruck and Maureen Palardy attended an intensive, two-day NCATE training for the Elementary Program Review at the National Conference of the Association for Childhood Education International (ACEI) on April 18 and 19 in Baltimore. ACEI is the specialty group that reviews elementary education programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels across the country for NCATE approval. New elementary education standards for the program review were adopted in October of 1999.

FSU is one of six pilot schools currently undergoing the review process. The reviews are due at the end of the summer. There is also a new review process in place for the pilot schools The emphasis has changed from reviewing syllabi to demonstrating evidence of the preservice candidates' successful teaching performance in the form of aggregated, summarized data proving the elementary standards are being met. The goal is to have our future teachers effectively use what they know to help children learn so

our schools of tomorrow will be a better place where all children can learn.

Dr. Joyce Wheaton, Dr. Tom Palardy, Dr. Vaughn Snyder, Fannia Boayue and Maureen Palardy presented multiple performance tasks and assessments tied to FSU's Integrated N-8 Block program at the 45th Annual Convention of the International Reading Association on May 3 in Indianapolis, Ind. More than 7,000 educators from across the country attended the conference.
