Singing and Dancing at FSU

FSU Dance Company to Present Spring Concert



The FSU Dance Company, under the artistic direction of Dr. Barry Fischer, will present its 2001 spring dance concert on May 4, 5 and May 6 in the Performing Arts Center's Drama Theater. Friday's and Saturday's performances are scheduled for 8 p.m., while Sunday's performance is a 2 p.m. matinée.

Featured works include a variety of modern and jazz dance pieces choreographed by professionals, choreographers and FSU Dance Company members. Guest artist Elizabeth Auclair, a soloist with the Martha Graham Dance Company, will perform two original works. "Excerpting," a jazz piece by Cornelius Carter of the University of Alabama, features the

song "Shaft" by Isaac Hayes. "Play," an audience favorite from the Mid-Atlantic Regional American College Dance Festival's Gala Concert recently held at FSU, returns to the Drama Theatre with student dancers/choreographers Alexandra Holmes and Timothy Zeller from Virginia Commonwealth University. A total of six works will showcase the choreography and dance talents of students from the FSU Dance Company. To conclude the concert, Fischer has reconstructed and restaged "Steps in the Street," a 1936 work originally choreographed by Martha Graham that he used as the basis for his New York University doctoral dissertation.

Fischer is offering free tickets, based on availability, to those who have not previously attended an FSU Dance Company concert and come to the Performing Arts Center at least one hour prior to the performance. Tickets go on sale Monday, April 30, at \$4 each to FSU students with a current ID and \$7 for the general public.

Department of Music to Perform Choral Concert

The FSU Department of Music will present its annual Spring Choral Concert, "Music from Diverse Cultures," Sunday, May 6, at 3 p.m. in the PAC's Pealer Recital Hall. The concert is free and open to the public.

The program will feature the University Chorale and Collegium Musicum under the direction of Dr. Karen Soderberg and assisted by pianist Kimberly Andrews.

The University Chorale selections include Johann Michael Haydn's "Gloria et Honore" and "Prayers of Steel" by F. Melius Christiansen. Selections from Scandinavia include "Aftonen" and "A Maiden Is in a Ring" by Hugo Alfven (Sweden), "At Sunrise" by Toivo Kuula (Finland) and "Rondes" by Folke Rabe (Sweden).

The Chorale will also perform "Prayer of the Children" — written by Kurt Bestor and arranged by Andrea S. Klouse — which is a commentary on the innocent children caught up in the brutal war in Yugoslavia that splintered into warring factions between the Serbs, Croats and Bosnians. Other music includes "The Battle of Jericho," arranged by Moses Hogan, and "Bwana, Ni Nani Atakayekaa?" a Sukuma melody from Kenya, adapted and arranged by Boniface Mganga.

Collegium Musicum's performance will include "Yesu Wainyanza," a Luhya spiritual arranged by David Zalo Okuku and "Kaung'a Yachee," arranged by Boniface Mganga from Kenya. They will also perform Veljo Tormis's "Curse of Iron" featuring Aaron Torgerson, tenor, and Ken Odom, bass, with Shaman Drum, and "St. John's Song," from the cycle of "St. John's Day Songs for Midsummer Eve" from Hargla, Estonia. Collegium Musicum will also perform "Hine e Hine," a Maori lullaby from New Zealand and "Byker Hill," an Irish folk song arranged for male chorus by Mitchell Sandler.

Through research, arrangement and performance of a vintage repertoire from Ragtime to Dixieland to Big Band, Baltimore's eminent ensemble "edutains" its audiences with a blend of informative narrative and virtuoso playing that takes the listener on a stroll through America's musical history.

FSU's Jazz Ensemble will join students from the Allegany County school system

in a day of workshops and masterclasses with the Peabody musicians.
Seventy-nine middle and high school jazz band students will spend the day in workshops held on the FSU campus. Among the participants are musicians from Beall, Fort Hill and Westmar high schools and Westmar, Washington and Mount Savage middle schools.

'Shattering the Silences' Video Set for 2 Sessions

"Shattering the Silences: Minority Professors Break into the Ivory Tower," a PBS video program will be shown in Lane Center 201 on Monday, April 30.

There will be two sessions, one from 10 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and one from 2 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. with a half-hour discussion period following each one.

"Shattering the Silences" takes a surprising and provocative look at the success and distress of minority scholars in the humanities and social sciences in universities from Seattle to New York.

This is a bold, compelling documentary. There are poignant stories about the obstacles and challenges on the journey to the ivory tower. There is both humor and pain as these minority voices in the academy tell a double-edged story. Minority scholars are introducing new perspectives and fresh questions in university classrooms. While they have invigorated disciplines by contributing a wealth of new scholarship, the number of minority professors is still alarmingly small and the pipeline is fragile. Across all disciplines, ninety percent of professors are white.

One of those "new voices," Darlene Clark Hine, historian, states in this program: "If we want a new world, I think we have to make new people, and I look upon students as new people in the making, and we have to teach them a new history.

This is a film filled with compassion, humor, anger and tears, (including student perspectives and reactions). The characters are engaging and provocative. They are superb teachers; riveting role models; and path-breaking scholars in history, literature, sociology, ethnic studies and political science.

Following the MLK message from Bruce Jacobs—writer and poet—this program can provide windows for understanding and compel an interesting and productive discussion.

Power Dynamics in Writings Topic of Talk

The power dynamic of the master/mistress-servant relationship, as represented in the works of several contemporary Mexican women writers, is the focus of Dr. Sandra Messinger-Cypess' presentation Thursday, May 3, at 4 p.m. in Lane Center 201. Professor of Spanish and Latin American Literature at University of Maryland College Park, Messinger-Cypess will disclose ways in which the power relationship may be further entangled by layers of class and ethnicity.

Hosted by Sigma Delta Pi, LaSO and the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures, Messinger-Cypess' lecture, presented in English, will highlight and illuminate the influence wielded by the "Malinche Paradigm" upon plays, novels and stories by Rosario Castellanos, Elena Garro and Cristina Pacheco.

Students may choose from a broad range of course offerings at campuses set in beautiful and exotic surroundings. Scholarships are available from both FSU and AustraLearn.

Celebrate Octoberfest in Germany

FSU students who would like to take part in UMUC's semester programs in Schwabisch Gmund in southern Germany are advised to apply to the CIE. The campus is part of the University of Maryland system, and all credits transfer back to FSU. Live in a beautiful village and study on a campus with international students from over 80 countries. All teaching is in English, and German instruction is offered as well. Scholarships are available from both FSU and UMUC.

Scholarships for Students on Financial Aid

The U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs announces a new study abroad scholarship program for undergraduate students who are receiving financial aid and are citizens or nationals of the United States. The Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program will provide scholarships of up to \$5,000 for students of limited financial means to pursue study programs outside of the United States for up to one year. A result of the International Academic Opportunity Act of 2000, this program aims to broaden the student population studying abroad by focusing on students who might not otherwise be able due to financial constraints.
