Recipients of graduate program honors, undergraduate departmental honors, and honors in general education will be introduced by their faculty mentors. In addition, the accomplishments of the four faculty winners of the 2001 Faculty Achievement Awards will be summarized by Provost Chris Grontkowski. A reception follows the formal ceremony.

Local Students Can Join Summer Dance Retreat

Local dancers will have an exciting opportunity this summer to study dance with renowned teachers from New York's Martha Graham Dance Company. For the second year, FSU will host the four-week, intensive Frostburg Summer Dance Retreat from July 11 to Aug. 7 on campus.

Directed by FSU Associate Professor Dr. Barry Fischer, the Retreat is open to dancers aged 15 to 25 who will study with notable choreographers and master teachers from the world of professional dance. Although no previous study of modern dance is required, applicants should have some previous study of other dance techniques such as ballet or jazz.

Thorough and intensive, the Retreat curriculum will include classes in Graham-based technique, ballet, Afrojazz, composition and yoga.


Students attend at least three classes daily, Monday through Friday, and prepare to appear in a public gala performance in the PAC Drama Theatre on Tuesday, Aug. 7.

Local students will work alongside dancers from across the country who have auditioned to attend the Retreat. Approximately 25 students from as far away as California and Washington will come to Frostburg for the four-week program. Students from Western Maryland, West Virginia and Pennsylvania will be eligible to attend for a discounted tuition of \$500.

The faculty coming to Frostburg from New York City includes some of the most recognized names in the professional dance world. Included among the 2001

York company the whose New Mary Anthony Dance Theatre is among the country's oldest dance troupes, has been hailed by The New York Times as having, "a notable role in establishing the technical and stylistic qualities to be found in dance today." Ethel Winter, a faculty member of the Juilliard School, was a principal dancer with the Martha Graham Dance Company from 1944 to 1969. She is considered to be one of the great modern dancers and teachers of her generation.

The artistic director of the Martha Graham Dance Ensemble, Kenneth Topping returns to the Frostburg Retreat for his second year, as does Mario Camacho from the Rotterdam Dance Academy in Holland. Both Topping and Camacho were principal dancers with the Graham Company in the 1980s and early 1990s. Other faculty members will be announced.

Do Your Student Teaching in Copenhagen


Education majors who would like to earn a semester of FSU credits while
