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Season Too! to Present 'The Fantastiks' Musical

FSU Theatre Season Too! will present the musical favorite "The Fantastiks" on Friday, Feb. 22 and Saturday, Feb. 23, at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Drama Theatre.

The world's most frequently produced musical, "The Fantastiks" is also the longest running show in American theatre, with a debut date of May 3, 1960, and closed recently in New York on Jan. 13. This simple work speaks of the pain of growing up and does so with exquisite craftsmanship that is as full of theatrical magic as any show in American musical theatre. Audiences of all ages return to see it. Several songs, including "Try to Remember" and "Soon it's Gonna Rain" have become standards. The score is by Harvey Schmidt, with lyrics by Tom Jones.

Justin Seward, a senior majoring in theatre, will direct this production, which is part of FSU's student-directed series, Season Too!

Africana Film Series Set for Spring

The African American Studies Program is sponsoring an Africana Film Series for spring 2002. The series will feature four contemporary films on Africana history and culture, with one scheduled per month from February to May. The first to be presented is "Mama Flora's Family" on Wednesday, Feb. 27, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center Atkinson Room, room 201.

Based on the epic story by "Roots" author Alex Haley, this star-powered miniseries is the sweeping chronicle of an African American family's unforget-table journey through the tragedies and triumphs of the 20th century. With a standout cast including Cicely Tyson ("Roots"), Della Reese ("Harlem Nights," "Touched by an Angel"), Mario Van Peebles (Sally Hemings: An American Scandal"), Blair Underwood ("Deep Impact") and Queen Latifah ("Out Loud"), Flora's story begins amid the racial strife and the exploitation of sharecropping of the American

South in the early 1900s, continues to the North where the family is caught up in the struggles of the Great Depression, two devastating world wars and racial discrimination, then is carried through the promises and challenges of the Civil Rights and Black Panthers movements.

Through the story of Flora's family, it is the whole history of African Americans struggling for social justice and human rights, which is played out from post-slavery to the Civil Rights movement. Going beyond the relationship between blacks and whites, the film also confronts the delicate issue of color and class within the African American community.

The titles and dates for the next three films will be announced subsequently. All the sessions are free and open to the general public. Each session will be followed by an open discussion.

Maryland Symphony Orchestra Returns to FSU

Free help preparing 2001 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained by the IRS.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.
