Based on Mark Twain's literary classic, "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," the show sweeps the audience down the mighty Mississippi as the irrepressible Huck and his friend, Jim, a runaway slave, escape to freedom. Their hilarious, suspenseful and heartwarming adventures feature a motley crew of unforgettable characters ranging from the virtuous to the villainous.



Simple Gifts to Perform Live! at the Loft at FSU

Two women plus 12 instruments equals one good time when Simple Gifts takes the stage at the Lane University Center Loft at FSU Friday, Feb. 8, beginning at 8:15 p.m. At 7 p.m., prior to the concert, the duo will also offer a rhythm workshop.

Presented by Live! at the Loft, Center Stage and the FSU Department of Student and Community Involvement, Simple Gifts draws on an impressive variety of ethnic folk styles. This award-winning

duo plays everything from lively Irish

jigs and down-home American reels to hard-driving Klezmer frailachs and haunting Gypsy melodies, spicing the

mix with the distinctive rhythms of Balkan dance music, the lush sounds of Scandinavian twin fiddling, and original compositions written in a traditional style.

Combining tradition with innovation, Simple Gifts creates some of the finest arrangements in folk music today: swing fiddle creeps into a Romanian dance, spoons show up in an Irish reel, and the concertina ventures far beyond styles considered traditional for that instrument. Based in the hills of

central Pennsylvania, these women play

an amazing array of instruments. Linda Littleton and Karen Hirshon switch with ease among two fiddles, concertina, mandolin, banjolin, recorders, bowed psaltery, hammered dulcimer, baritone fiddle, guitar, piano and percussion.

Simple Gifts is frequently complimented on its stage presence, which is warm, personal and accented with humor. These women deliver their music with rare intensity and contagious enthusiasm.

Before their concert at 7 p.m., the performers will conduct an hour-long rhythm workshop, "Learn to Play in 7/8 Meter." Simple Gifts will first shows participants how to count and feel a 7/8 rhythm and then will teach the Bulgarian tune "Minka." Bring your instruments, or if you don't have an instrument or don't know how to play, come anyway; the artists will teach you.

Spring Int'l Film Series Launches with 'Himalaya'

FSU's 2001-2002 International Film Series resumes with "Himalaya" on Tuesday, Feb. 5 at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Atkinson Room on the second floor. The series is sponsored by Center Stage and the Department of Student & Community Involvement.

"Himalaya" presents a colorful picture of the traditional life of Tibetan herdsmen, set in the bleak but majestic scenery of the Himalayas of Nepal. Centered around a caravan journey through the mountains, this story of a future village chief's youth is an epic of pride and endurance. Film critic Robert Ebert describes the movie as "a film of unusual visual beauty and enormous intrinsic interest."

Burchette, Birch and Dowell Featured at Roper

A variety of artwork by Andrea Burchette, Karen Birch and Margaret Dowell will be on exhibit from Friday, Feb. 1, through Sunday, Feb. 24, at the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery at FSU. An opening reception, which is free and open to the public, is scheduled for Friday, Feb. 1, from 7 to 9 p.m. Gallery hours are Sunday through Wednesday from noon to 4 p.m.

The artists will give a slide presentation on their work at 6 p.m. on the night of the exhibit opening in the Fine Arts Lecture Hall, room 132.

The three artists were recently honored by the Delaplaine Visual Art Center with the Meredith Springer Memorial Award for lifetime achievement in art and art leadership in the community.

Burchette, a resident of Frederick, Md., explores the human condition by symbolically using birds and other animals in pastel drawings and watercolor paintings. Through layering biological truth with bird mythology, she works to capture the dueling forces within people in a universal context. An adjunct professor at Montgomery College and Frederick Community College, she is active in the Frederick and Baltimore-Washington area as a lecturer, juror and exhibitor. She earned her bachelor's degree from the Pennsylvania State University and an M.F.A. from Towson State University.

A resident of Brunswick, Md., Birch works on a miniature scale with hand embroidery, glass seed beads and acrylic paint on linen to create highly detailed, elegant abstractions of nature. She uses these materials to manipulate the surface texture and create multiple layering, luminescence and meditative repetition. Educated at a variety of crafts and art schools, she has published numerous articles in art journals. Her works have been exhibited throughout Maryland and as far west as Nebraska, and a collection can be seen at the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art in Washington.

Dowell, a resident of Woodsboro, Md., creates large-scale paintings in oil and pastel after years of working as an installation sculptor. She uses the human image to address social issues such as mental illness, gender bending and human potential. An art education graduate of Frostburg State, she earned an M.F.A. in sculpture and Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction from the University of Maryland. Her works have frequently been exhibited in Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

Antonio Named VP of Enrollment Management

James Antonio has been appointed FSU's new vice president of enrollment management. He will assume his duties Jan. 30.

A graduate of FSU and the parent of an FSU freshman, Antonio previously served as dean of admissions and financial aid at St. Mary's College of Maryland for nine years, and as director of admissions before that. He holds a master of arts in higher education administration from George Washington University.

His duties will include overseeing the staffs of the FSU departments of Admissions and Financial Aid. He will also develop a management plan that focuses on admissions, enrollment and student retention.

"Jim's experience makes him very familiar with the prospective population of students in the state," said FSU President Catherine R. Gira. "Further, he knows some of the members of our admissions staff well because of his contacts with them over the years."

Domestic Partner Benefits to be Examined

University System of Maryland Board of Regents Chairman Nathan A. Chapman Jr. has appointed a three-member task force to study the issue of benefits for the domestic partners of USM employees. The task force, consisting of Regents Vice Chairman Admiral Charles R. Larson (USN Ret.), Lance W. Billingsley, and Patricia S. Florestano, will gather data such as the viewpoints of various USM constituencies, policies at other institutions across the country, and costs of such a program. They also will review a 1996 report on the same topic. The group will make specific recommendations on the issue to the full Board.

In its 2001 legislative session, the Maryland General Assembly approved the Antidiscrimination Act of 2001, which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation with regard to public accommodations, housing, and employment. The legislation does not require the extension of employee benefits to domestic partners, but it does suggest a more tolerant environment for unmarried domestic partners in the state of Maryland.

Japanese Visiting Scholar Will Teach in Spring

Ms. Shuko Takase will travel from Tokyo, Japan, to join the Foreign Languages faculty at FSU for spring semester 2002. Ms. Takase is spending a year in Frostburg through the International Internship Program based in Tokyo. She will be teaching two classes in introductory and basic Japanese.

Int'l Students Receive Rowe Scholarships

Three international students have been awarded Rowe scholarships for the spring semester 2002. All three students are computer science majors. Scholarships were awarded to Anuu Arjunon and Ravindra Mahabaleshwar from India, and Robert Hrgic from Bosnia. The Rowe Scholarships are the gift of Harold R. Rowe, a friend of FSU and a grandson of one of the University's founders.

First Gilman Scholarship Awarded to FSU Student

Karie Warnick is the recipient of one of the first Gilman Scholarships awarded to U.S. students who study abroad, and the first FSU student to receive this honor. Karie spent her intersession in Ecuador on FSU's study abroad program at the Centro de Estudios Interamericanos in Cuenca. The Gilman Scholarship was started in 2001 by Senator Benjamin A. Gilman and is sponsored by the Department of State and the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. FSU Students Offer Free Tax Prep Assistance

Free help preparing 2001 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved y the IRS.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a <u>basic</u> Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. Students will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in FSU's Framptom Hall (except for March 23 and 31). A drop-off service will also be available throughout the week.

Taxpayers arriving for an appointment should bring any tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, interest and dividend statements (Form 1099), a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses. Taxpayer and dependent social security numbers and birth dates are also needed.

Administered through the Maryland Higher Education Commission, the HOPE Scholarships provide financial assistance to students pursuing a 2- or 4-year degree in certain specialized career fields.

To qualify for this scholarship, a student must have a cumulative 3.0 grade point average and be a Maryland resident. In addition, the applicant must agree to teach full-time in a Maryland public school for one year for each academic year the award is received.

Several levels of ballet classes will be offered under the direction of Susan Manger, who studied at the Washington

School of Ballet on full scholarship. Classes will be held in the FSU dance studio on the first floor of the Cordts P.E. Center.

Pre Ballet will be offered for children ages 7 and 8 on Mondays from Feb. 4 to May 20 from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. There will be no class March 25. Students will learn mechanics of dance technique and articulation of the body. Through imagery and action, children will explore movement and solve problems; learn about control and risk involved in movement; and learn perception of space, time and energy. Girls are required to wear a solid-colored, long-sleeved leotard (black, pink or dark blue), white socks and ballet slippers. Boys are required to wear a white T-shirt, black leggings, white socks and ballet slippers.

Ballet I will be offered to children ages 9 to 12 on Mondays from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Classes will run from Feb. 4 to May 20. There will be no class March 25. This class is the beginning of formal ballet (barre, petit adagio, valse, allegro, etc., with floor work and supplementary exercises). Emphasis will be on placement and purity of movement and the intelligent use of energy and breath in movement. Students are also encouraged to continue exploration of time and space to cultivate freedom of movement. The required uniform for girls is a solidcolored, long-sleeved leotard (black, pink or dark blue), pink tights and ballet slippers. Boys are required to wear a white T-shirt, black leggings, white socks and ballet slippers.

Adult Intermediate Ballet will be offered for teens through adults with previous ballet training on Tuesdays from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Class will run from Feb. 5 to May 21. No class will be held March 26. This class is a formal ballet class (barre, petit adagio, valse, turns, petit allegro, batterie and grand allegro, etc., with floor work and supplementary exercises.) Elements from the Duncan technique will be included to explore the use of the solar plexus as

the source of all movement. The suggested uniform for this class is, for women, a solid-colored leotard or unitard, pink or black tights and ballet slippers, and, for men, a T-shirt, closefitting sweatpants or sweatshorts and ballet slippers.
