'Maroon 5" released its hit single "Harder to Breathe" in the fall of 2002 and by the summer of 2003, it remained on multiple radio charts. The group's latest single, "This Love," is popular in current radio airplay and the song's video is regularly featured in VH1's Top 20 and MTV. Lately, "Maroon 5" was the musical guest on NBC TV's "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" and "Saturday Night Live." They have performed over 200 live shows and have opened for artists such as John Mayer, Sheryl Crow, Jason Mraz and Counting Crows. Other appearances include "David Letterman,"

"Jimmy Kimmel Live," "Last Call with Carson Daly" and "The Late Show with Craig Kilborn."

FSU's Opera Theatre will present the Puccini classic "Gianni Schicchi" on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 20 and 21, in the PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The performances, which are free and open to the public, start at 8 p.m. both evenings.

Set in Florence in 1299, "Gianni Schicchi" is a comedy about a wealthy family dealing with the aftermath of their patriarch's death. As greedy relatives set out to find the will and determine who is the rightful heir to the fortune, chaos ensues in this story of mistaken identity, backstabbing and star-crossed lovers. Director of FSU's Opera Workshop Corey Trahan likens the on-stage antics to "the sitcom 'Mama's Family' set to opera.'

Stage director for the production is Richard Kagey. Karen Soderberg is conductor and Betty Jane Phillips is providing piano accompaniment. Kristina Driskill, of Dallas, Texas, will serve as guest artist, singing the lead mezzo-soprano role.

University Theatre to Present 2 Ionesco Plays

University Theatre will present "The Bald Soprano" and "The Lesson," two absurdist one-act plays by Eugene Ionesco, on April 22, 23 and 24 at 8 p.m. Performances will take place in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre of the PAC.

A leader of absurdist theatre, Eugene Ionesco wrote his first play, "The Bald Soprano," while he taught himself English as a third language. Studying from the "Assimil Manual," he became intrigued by the banal and repetitive practice sentences, which ultimately influenced the dialogue of his characters. "The Bald Soprano" follows Mr. and Mrs. Smith as they discover "astonishing" truths about the world through a series of humorous conversations.

Labeled a "comic drama," "The Lesson" also investigates the ways language can be used for purposes other than substantive human communication.

Former Asst. Secretary of Defense to Speak

Dr. Lawrence J. Korb, former United States Assistant Secretary of Defense in the Reagan administration, will give the presentation "A New National Security Strategy in an Age of Terrorists, Tyrants and Weapons of Mass Destruction" at FSU on Tuesday, April 20, at 2 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall.

Korb is an expert on national security, arms control and the U.S. defense budget. He currently holds the positions of adjunct senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and senior fellow at the Center for American Progress. Previously, he served as vice president and director of studies at the Council on Foreign Relations from 1988 to 2002. He was also a senior fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program and directed the Center for Public Policy Education for the Brookings Institution. He is a former adviser to FSU's International Studies program.

Korb is a frequent contributor to foreign affairs and national security journals and guest columnist for several national newspapers. He is the author of many books including "A New National

Italian Historian to Speak on the Fall of Fascism

Maria Gabriella Pasqualini, a distinguished Italian historian and policy analyst, will lecture at FSU about "The BBC and the Fall of Fascism and the Victory of the Allies in World War II" on Thursday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m. in Compton Science Center room 224. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Pasqualini specializes in modern military history and in the institutions and security issues of the Middle East and the Mediterranean region. She is a member of the political science faculty at the University of Perugia and Palermo where she teaches history and institutions of the Middle East. She also teaches the history of the Middle East and Central Asia in the Advanced Carabinieri Officers College in Rome and teaches graduate programs on the Mediterranean at the University of Cassino and the Italian Army Advanced

Studies Institute for Officers.

Her experience has included service as Cultural Counselor in the Italian Embassy in Iran at the time of the Iranian Revolution, and later at Italian embassies in France and Mexico; assistant to the vice president of the Italian Senate; and vice president of the Consultative Committee of the Defense General Chief of Staff.

Professor Pasqualini's visit is sponsored by the FSU Department of History. In addition to her public lecture, she will lead a faculty round-table seminar on the sources of stability and instability in the Middle East and visit FSU classrooms.

The educational discussion about key issues surrounding the Middle East crisis will feature speakers Rabbi Stephen Sniderman of Cumberland's B'er Chayim Temple and Imam Yahya Hendi, spiritual leader of the Islamic Society of Frederick, Md. Dr. Stephen Hartlaub of the FSU Political Science Department will moderate the discussion. There will be an opportunity to ask questions during the program.

The event is sponsored by United Campus Ministry, Catholic Campus Ministry, the Hillel Club and the Political Science Department. It is free and open to the public.

Hendi is the Muslim chaplain at Georgetown University, the first American University to hire a full-time Muslim chaplain. Hendi is also the Muslim chaplain at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md., and he serves as a member and the spokesperson of the Islamic Jurisprudence Council of North America.

Hendi was one of the Muslim leaders who met with the President of the United States in the aftermath of the Sept. 11 tragedy, and he serves on the national and the international interfaith councils. In May 2002, Hendi was chosen by Hartford Seminary to receive its annual "James Gettemy Significant Ministry Award" for his dedication to his Ministry and for his work to promote peace building between people of different religions.

Sniderman has been rabbi of B'er Chayim Congregation in Cumberland, Md., since January 2003. He previously served congregations in Sharon, Pa., and Rockford, Ill. Before that he was the rabbi of the Hillel Foundation at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana.

He was born in Toronto, Canada. He was educated at York University, the Johns Hopkins University and the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, where he was ordained in 1975.

Spring Festival of Children's Literature

The 2004 Spring Festival of Children's Literature will be held Friday, April 30, and Saturday, May 1, on the campus of FSU. In its 22nd year, the Festival features an impressive group of award-winning authors and illustrators including Susan Campbell Bartoletti, Denise Fleming, Brian Selznick and Douglas Wood.

Campbell Bartoletti is an author of both fiction and non-fiction books for children. She entered college as an art major but by her sophomore year realized that it wasn't her calling. She graduated with a teaching degree and taught eighth-grade English for 18 years. She published her first book in 1989 and her first picture book in 1992. She published other books while teaching and, in 1997, became a full-time writer. Some of her titles include "The Flag Maker," "The Christmas Promise," "Nobody's Nosier than a Cat" and "My Name is America: Finn Reardon."

Fleming is the author and illustrator of 11 books for children. Fleming is a native of Ohio, where she lives with her husband and daughter. A graduate of Kendall College of Art and Design in Grand Rapids, Michigan, she and her husband worked at a variety of art jobs before deciding to become free-lance artists. She creates her illustrations through pulp painting. "The whole process is wet, messy and wonderful — I haven't picked up a brush or a colored pencil since I discovered papermaking." Her work, "In The Small, Small Pond," published in 1994, is a Caldecott Honor Book.

Selznick is also a Caldecott-Honor winning illustrator and a New York Times best-selling author. His interest in art began as a child, but he didn't become interested in children's books until he began working for Eeyore's Books for Children in New York. His first book, "The Houdini Box," was published in 1991 while he was still working at Eeyore's. Selznick has illustrated books about famous people such as Eleanor Roosevelt and Marian Anderson. "When you draw someone's face over and over again, you begin to feel a bit like you know them." Selznick lives in Brooklyn.

Wood is an author, artist, musician, naturalist, and wilderness guide from Minnesota. His work has been heralded for taking his readers on a "journey of self-discovery." His books, considered inspirational, focus on themes of nature. They include "Old Turtle," "Grandad's Prayers of the Earth," "What Teacher's Can't Do," "A Quiet Place," as well as several books for adults.

Each year, approximately 350 librarians, educators, parents and students come to FSU to share their love of children's literature, and to learn more about successful ways to share that love with children. The Literature Festival provides an opportunity for its participants to interact first-hand with the featured authors and illustrators who bring characters to life and inspire children to read. Participants also mingle with fellow educators and exchange ideas and wisdom.

The agenda for the Festival includes large group presentations by the featured authors and illustrators, offered in a personal and relaxed environment, as well as informative small group sessions. Topics range from selecting quality children's books for a classroom to keeping social studies alive with historical fiction. An extensive book selection is available for purchase and autographing opportunities. The Festival was the brainchild of Dr. William Bingman, an FSU professor, who looked for a way to honor two colleagues, both of whom loved children's literature. The Festival has become a testament to those who enjoy and care about children's literature.

A special feature of the festival, The R. Margaret Hamilton Children's Hour, will be held on Friday, April 30, at 4 p.m. for children ages 4 to 13. Age specific workshops are presented by the authors, in which they share their work with children, as well as the process of writing and illustrating. Registration is required.

Admission to the Festival is by registration only and is limited in number. Pre-registration is required, and pre-orders are available for books that will be featured at the Festival.

Melange will exhibit the talents of four Frostburg's Bachelor of Fine Arts students as they incorporate painting, ceramics, sculpture and printmaking.



In memory of Dr. Nelson P. Guild, former Frostburg State president who passed away early this year, a tribute will be held on campus at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, May 4, in the PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The public is invited to attend.

The event, titled, "Celebrating the Guild Years," will pay honor to the man who came to Frostburg State College as dean in 1965 and served as FSC presi-
