


Int'l Film Series Presents 'L'Auberge Espangole'

MAT – Secondary to be Offered at USM-H

Following recent approval by the Maryland Higher Education Commission, FSU will begin offering its Master of Arts in Teaching program for secondary education at the University System of Maryland at Hagerstown.

FSU has offered the secondary education program at its Frostburg campus for two years and a similar elementary program in Hagerstown since 2000. FSU's Master of Arts in Teaching programs are designed for career changers or recent college graduates who want to pursue careers in teaching. The full-time program, which begins in the summer and lasts a year, provides its students with all of the necessary course work and classroom experience to obtain teacher certification in the state of Maryland.

The MAT programs are part of FSU's effort to address the growing shortage of teachers in Maryland, especially in certain critical subject areas.

Two information sessions are scheduled at USM-H in March. They will be Tuesday, March 15, and again on Thursday, March 31, to speak to prospective applicants for the group beginning studies this summer. Both sessions are at 6:30 p.m. in room 124-125 of the 32 W. Washington St. center.

The deadline to apply is April 1 to join the cohort of about 20 students that will begin studies begins this

Content certification will be offered in English, mathematics, social studies, biology, chemistry, earth science and physics. Certification in French, Spanish and K-12 art are currently offered in the MAT program that meets on the Frostburg campus, and they may be available in Hagerstown if there is sufficient demand.

Candidates must hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university in the subject area in which they plan to seek certification, in addition to other requirements, including a passing score on the PRAXIS I test.



Students Offer Free Tax Return Preparation

Free help preparing 2004 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee these student preparers.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible. Electronic filing will also be available this year.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. Students will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in FSU's Framptom Hall (except for March 19 and 26). A dropoff service will also be available throughout the week.

Taxpayers arriving for an appointment should bring any tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, all Form 1099s, a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses. Taxpayer and dependent social security numbers and birth dates are also required (especially for electronic filing).
