Marshall, a civil rights pioneer who was instrumental in a number of cases, most notably Briggs v. Elliott, which became part of the Brown v. Board of Education ruling that desegregated schools, eventually became the first African American appointed to the Supreme Court of the United States.

Raised in the housing projects of San Francisco, Henderson has written numerous books and papers and made presentations all over the world on energy policy, urban dynamics, organizational theory and racial and ethnic studies. King to Speak about Living on the 'Down Low'

J.L. King, a national HIV prevention educator, producer and author, will speak at FSU on Wednesday, March 1, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall. King will speak about "Living on the Down Low" – the secret lives of men who have sex with other men, but who do not consider themselves to be gay or bisexual.

King, who specializes in the behavior and lifestyles of African American men on the "down low," has interviewed more than 1,000 men in his research and has himself lived the "down low" lifestyle. He was married and has three grown children, but also led a second life of relationships with men, all the while denying that he or anyone he loved was at risk of contracting HIV through his actions.

King has been credited by the Centers for Disease Control for exposing the "down low" lifestyle, which is putting African American women who thought they were in committed relationships at much greater danger of contracting HIV.

Szabo to Discuss Alcohol, Mental Health

Ross Szabo, director of youth outreach for the National Mental Health Awareness Campaign, will share his success story in overcoming his struggles with alcohol and depression in a presentation entitled "Mixed Drinks, Mixed Emotions: Alcohol and Mental Health" in the ARMAH on Monday, March 6, at 8 p.m.

Diagnosed with bi-polar disorder at the age of 16, Szabo has waged a battle against mental illness and its related problems ever since. His program is designed to put a face to the feelings and thoughts of those with serious mental disorders and give students the necessary tools to deal with family members or friends who exhibit symptoms of mental illness. Addressing the issues candidly, Szabo translates the technical jargon of mental illnesses, depression and suicide prevention into real-life language and examples.

After graduation, Mac hiked the entire 2,169 mile Appalachian Trail from Georgia to Maine, with his father Dr. Fred Sloan, Education Department. Melanie joined the two for nearly 1,000 miles of the journey, starting in New Jersey and completing the northern remainder of the Trail.

After living in northern California, the couple decided to return to FSU to pursue their graduate education. Both Mac and Melanie were accepted into the Master's of Arts in Teaching Program (MAT), with Mac in the secondary program and Melanie in the elementary program. Upon graduating in May 2005 they embarked on the journey.
