Spring Dance Concert Brings Famous Performers to FSU


'So You Think You Can Dance' Star a Guest Artist

Performances will take place at 7:30 p.m. on May 4 and 5 in the Performing Arts Center's Drama Theatre.


Just in time for spring, the dance concert will highlight electrifying performances by special guest artist Musa Cooper from the hit television show, "So You Think You Can Dance," and the work of guest choreographer Lauren Quattro from Alchemy Dance Company. A new piece by interim director Desiree Witt titled "The Contemporary Anarchist" will also be featured, along with choreography by dance company members Kelly Jones, Antonia deBarros, Katie Weedon, Ashley Askins and Jessica Seminerio.

Musa Cooper danced into hearts as a finalist during the second season of "So You Think You Can Dance" in 2006. Cooper, a dancer and model, specializes in hip-hop and street funk styles. He has performed for both Jay-Z and Beyoncé Knowles and danced on tour with Macy Gray and Neil Young. He also made cameo appearances on television programs such as "Sex in the City" and has acted in several television commercials. A selftaught mover from the East Coast, Cooper is known for energizing audiences with highly rhythmic and acrobatic performances.

Guest choreographer Lauren Quattro has appeared in countless performances including "The Nutcracker" and "Carmina Burana," and she also toured with the Cody Clark Ensemble. Currently codirector of Alchemy Dance Company in Morgantown, W.Va., Quattro has trained in classical ballet, pointe, modern, jazz, tap, Hawaiian/Tahitian and Russian character dance for nearly 20 years.

The FSU Chorale, the Cumberland Choral Society and the Orchestra of the Alleghenies present Franz Joseph Haydn's "Nelson Mass" and Frances Poulenc's "Gloria," under the direction of Karen Soderberg-Sarnaker, at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 6, in the Performing Arts Center, Pealer Recital Hall.

The "Missa in Angustiis," nicknamed the "Nelson Mass," was composed in 1798. The Koussevitsky Foundation of the Library of Congress in America commissioned the "Gloria." Poulenc composed the "Gloria" between 1959-60. Both are deemed as two highly significant works in music literature.

Haydn's "Nelson Mass" uses four

soloists, a choir and a smaller classical orchestra consisting of one flute, two oboes, two bassoons, three trumpets, timpani, strings and organ. Soloists include soprano Preshanti Navaratnam, from London, England, Patricia Kelby, mezzo-soprano, Jonathan Hodel, tenor, and baritone G. Ryan Bowie, a senior at FSU. Poulenc's "Gloria" is scored for soprano solo and a orchestra consisting of piccolo, two flutes, two oboes, an English horn, two clarinets, bass clarinet, two bassoons, contrabassoon, four horns, three trumpets, three trombones, tuba, timpani, harp and strings. The 100-voice choir includes the Cumberland Choral Society and the FSU University Chorale, under the direction of Dr. Karen Soderberg-Sarnaker. The Orchestra of the Alleghenies is comprised of musicians from the tri-state area, FSU music faculty and students.

Cinco De Mayo Triple Feature

The University Programming Council Films Committee will celebrate Cinco De Mayo with a triple feature showing of three excellent films by Robert Rodriguez: "El Mariachi," "Desperado" and "Once Upon A Time In Mexico." This special screening, free and open to the public, is scheduled for 7 p.m. Saturday, May 5, in the Lane University Center's Atkinson Room.

Touted as the cheapest film ever released by a studio, "El Mariachi" (1993) was a galvanizing send-up of Mexican action films, American Westerns and tough anti-hero movies. It depicts the fast-moving story of a mariachi musician who arrives in a Mexican border town at the same time as a hitman. Violent complications ensue after they accidentally switch guitar cases. With the help of the strength (and economy) of this first feature, acclaimed director Robert Rodriguez launched his career.

"Desperado" proved to be a superior action entry with style to spare. Intensely charismatic leads, delightful cameos and a killer score by Los Lobos aided immensely, but the bulk of the credit had to go to the gifted producer-writer-director-editor.

Rodriguez next returned to his roots with the "El Mariachi" sequel "Once Upon a Time in Mexico" (2003). The film was another rousing and popular venture, with Rodriguez demonstrating a remarkably fresh, fluid and riveting directorial style while also paying homage to his influences like director Sergio Leone. 
Comedy Night Features Jay Black

FSU Commits to Being 'Climate Neutral'

President Jonathan C. Gibralter made history April 18 when during the occasion of his inauguration, he pledged FSU's commitment to fighting global warming by signing the American College & University Presidents Climate Commitment (ACUPCC), a national pact that to date has united more than 160 higher education leaders in efforts to reduce and eventually eliminate their campus' greenhouse gas emissions.

"Global warming is a defining challenge of our time," Dr. Gibralter said. "As a large and complex institution whose goal is to educate tomorrow's leaders, we have an obligation to prevent damage to the environment.'

Following Mount Saint Mary's University, FSU is the second academic institution in the state of Maryland to sign the pledge and commit to going "climate neutral," meaning it will reduce global warming emissions as much as possible and foster educational and research efforts to help society re-stabilize the earth's climate.

"We are interested in not only developing our campus as a center for the use of wind and solar energy, but also other renewable sources as well, Gibralter said. "We currently have a Task Force of faculty and staff who are carefully investigating and recommending ways we can neutralize our greenhouse gas emissions and negate our impact on the atmosphere.

In addition to forming a campus task force, by signing the Presidents Climate Commitment, FSU also pledges to uphold

a series of initiatives, including the following:

- Adopting green standards for buildings
- Requiring ENERGY STAR certification for products purchased by the University
 - Encouraging public transportation
- Purchasing energy from renewable
- · Offsetting emissions due to air travel
- · Supporting climate and sustainability shareholder proposals through their endowment

Outstanding Faculty, Students Honored

FSU's Institute for Service-Learning is pleased to announce the 2007 winners of the Outstanding Service-Learning Faculty Award, Outstanding Service-Learning Student Award, and the Unsung Hero Award. Awards were presented at the Service-Learning Recognition Awards Reception on Friday, April 20.

Dr. Joyce Middleton (College of Business, Department of Accounting) is the recipient of the 2007 Outstanding Service-Learning Faculty Award for her dedication to the Volunteer Tax Assistance Program (VITA). Dr. Middleton has supervised the VITA initiative since the early 1990s, training and placing students from her ACCT 425 and ACCT 420 classes in the program. In 2005 alone, 278 federal and 264 state returns were completed for low-income, elderly and student taxpayers.

Victoria Kendall, Hansford Harrison and Dwayne Mason are the first ever joint recipients of the Outstanding Service-Learning Student Award. These students were nominated and selected as this year's student winners for their commitment and service to the READ TO SUCCEED! program, where each serves as part of the HallSTARS program. The students have shown tremendous dedication and leadership to the READ TO SUCCEED! program by agreeing to take on additional responsibilities as site leaders and mentors for the program's other volunteer tutors.

Finally, *Dr. Jason Edwards* (Psychology) is the 2007 winner of the Unsung Hero Award. This award recognizes members of the FSU community who give selflessly to promote change in their communities. Dr. Edwards was selected as this year's Unsung Hero for his PSYC 489 service-learning program, which requires students to complete 12 or more service hours with an area youth initiative. Since the beginning of his placement program, over 300 of his students have served with area children at various social and educational organizations.

Omicron Chi Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi Installed at FSU
