Student Speakers Shine **During Graduation Festivities**

FSU will celebrate and recognize the achievements of its May 2007 graduating class during the University's 130th commencement ceremonies Saturday, May 26, in the Harold J. Cordts Physical Education Center's Main Arena on the FSU campus.

Dr. Jonathan C. Gibralter, FSU President, will confer degrees on graduates during two exercises throughout the day. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences ceremony will start at $10\,$ a.m. and the College of Business and the College of Education will present degrees beginning at 2 p.m.

Jennifer Berkow, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences; Jodi Keefer, College of Business; and Eric Worley, College of Education, are the featured student speakers for the

spring commencement exercises. **Thomas Finan** Jr., a member of the University System of Maryland Board of Regents, will offer congratulatory greetings at both events.

To many faculty, students and staff, Jennifer Berkow is known as a highly motivated and ambitious student who has made the most of her time at FSU. While attending

FSU, Berkow, a resident of Westminster, Md., pursued a double major in art and design and French language and litera-





Faculty Achievement Honored at Convocation

The recipients of the 2007 Faculty Achievement Awards, along with top graduating students from every degree program, will be honored at the University Honors Convocation at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, May 25, in the Pealer Recital Hall, Performing Arts Center. All members of the University community are invited to attend the Convocation and the reception that follows.

This year's Faculty Achievement Award recipients are **Dr. Joan DeVee Dixon**, Division of Performing Arts, for Academic Accomplishment; **Dr. George W. White**, Department of Geography, for Academic Accomplishment; and **Dr. Amit J. Shah**, Department of Management, for Univer-

sity and Community Service. The awards are made possible through generous gifts to the FSU Foundation, Inc.

When Dr. Dixon arrived at FSU, she was a nationally known pianist. Today, most of her international programs are on the pipe organ. Her transformation from piano to the pipe organ has entailed years of practice and dedication. Her organ recordings include three volumes of "The Psalms of Emma Lou Diemer," "Psalms: The Lord's My Shepherd," "Psalms II: I Lift My Eyes to the Hills" and "Raise the Roof." Her piano recordings include "Something Old, Something New" and sacred favorites in "Jubilee" and "Spirituals" by Diemer, and "Christmas" by Dixon. Dr. Dixon has performed at major venues for sacred music throughout the world. She shares her expertise with students through her teaching in performance studies as well as in music management classes. Her contributions—both her teaching and performances—have brought international recognition to FSU.

Dr. Shah gives back to his students, FSU, the community and his profession at all levels. He has served as Director of The Center for Community Partnerships, Director of External Relations for the College of Business, Chair of the Economic Development and Community Outreach Committee and Associate Chair for the Department of Business Administration. He also has served on the **Cultural Events and International** Studies Steering Committees, assisted University marketing efforts and has been the adviser of the award-winning student chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management since 1990. In the commu-

nity he has worked with the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Allegany County Chamber of Commerce, Leadership Allegany! and the Frostburg Business and Professional Association. Dr. Shah's outreach activities have built positive connections that enhance the University and the region.

Dr. White, Associate Professor of Geography, focuses his teaching and research specifically on political geography, with emphasis on the complex and nuanced attributes of national identity. His work on the nations of Eastern Europe influences the debate on the role of territory in intergroup relations. He regularly presents papers at national and international conferences. His publications include "Contemporary World Regional Geography: Global Connections, Local Voices"; "Nation, State, and Territory, Vol. 1: Origins, Evolutions, and Developments" and "Multi-Ethnicity and Islamic Identity in Muslim Countries" in "Teaching about the Islamic World." Dr. White has emerged as an important figure in academic geography circles. As chair of the Department of Geography, he

ceaselessly promotes the department and FSU at the local, national and international levels.

In addition to the faculty awards, one graduating student per degree program will be honored for academic excellence and leadership. Faculty in each program have selected 14 graduate students and 36 undergraduate students who will be recognized. Twenty-eight undergraduate students will also be commended by receiving honors in General Education, based on completion of all requirements of the University Honors Program. VP of University Advancement Appointed

B.J. Davisson, a FSU alumnus with a strong record of fund raising, particularly for higher education, has been named Vice President of University Advancement at FSU. President Jonathan Gibralter announced the selection

to the campus community on May 10.

As Vice President of University Advancement, Davisson will oversee all of the University's fund-raising and alumni relations programs, as well as an ongoing \$15 million capital campaign. Selected as the result of an extensive national search, he will begin his duties in late June.

"Mr. Davisson brings to his alma mater a solid record of success in raising funds for higher education. Increasing the financial resources available to FSU will be essential to our ability to attract and support the best students and provide programs and facilities that meet the needs of our future students and a changing world," said Dr. Gibralter

Davisson, a native of Westernport,

currently works for Kaspick and Company, serving as a liaison between the non-profit organizations who are the firm's clients and those who manage and administer the more than \$4.2 billion in planned gifts for those organizations. Prior to that, Davisson's career spans more than 20 years in higher education, most spent in the field of advancement, primarily for The Johns Hopkins Institutions and Hood College. It's an honor to work with individuals who want to use their resources to express who they are and what they care about," Davisson said.

"I'm thrilled to be returning to FSU. English Professor Wins Coveted Pushcart Prize

Barbara Hurd, an English professor at FSU, recently joined the ranks of some of America's most notable writers when she won the Pushcart Prize, an American literary award that recognizes the best writing published by small presses. The prize, which in the past has been given to literary greats such as John Irving, Raymond Carver and Andre Dubus, is the second for Hurd, who also received a Pushcart Prize in 2004.

"To win one of the Pushcart Prizes is especially pleasing to me, not only because of the honor, but because the awards go to writers associated with those often-overlooked small presses of this country, where so much good

literary work is happening," Hurd said.

This year, Hurd was honored for her essay, "Fine Distinctions," the lead essay in the Fall 2006 issue of "Fourth Genre," a journal devoted to creative nonfiction. The essay is set on a shingle beach of southeast England and muses upon the ecology of the area's habitat, along with how it was the setting for top-secret radar testing in the late 1960s, and a place where local legends abound about a merman and UFOs.

"Ultimately, it's an essay about physical and psychological transformation," Hurd said.

Hurd's essay will be featured in "The Pushcart Prize XXXII: Best of the Small Presses" edition that will be published in the fall of 2008. Her essay will also be included in another upcoming book of essays she recently finished that is tentatively titled "Tracings: On Tidal Shifts and What Remains," her third creative nonfiction book.

Joshua Couchman, a senior majoring in recreation and parks management, showed his Frostburg pride when he appeared on the Tuesday, May 15, episode of "The Price is Right" wearing his Frostburg State Rugby t-shirt. Josh got the right price on the elliptical trainer, but overpriced the snowmobile. Joshua's girlfriend, Heather Hamor, a recent FSU recreation grad, was with him in the audience, also showing her FSU pride. Joshua happened to be in California finishing up an internship.

English professor *Dr. Judith J. Pula*, *Kathryn E. Greenbeck* and *Christopher R. Murphy* made two presentations May 9 at the annual "Life Beyond High

School" conference for parents of students with disabilities, sponsored by Allegany County Board of Education Partners for Success. The sessions were "Tips from Students for Students: How to Have a Successful Freshman Year at Frostburg State University" and "College Study Partners: Possible Applications to Other Contexts" (a PowerPoint kiosk presentation). Greenbeck and Murphy are Dr. Pula's former students. Greenbeck is an English major, and Murphy is a computer science major. Pula is his UROS mentor. UROS is an FSU undergraduate program in which students are mentored for a future career in research and/or university teaching.

Kelly Boyce, former M.S. graduate in applied ecology and conservation biology, and advisor Ron Barry (biology) co-authored an article, "Seasonal home range and diurnal movements of Sylvilagus obscurus (Appalachian cottontail) at Dolly Sods, West Virginia," published in the journal, Northeastern Naturalist (2007. Volume 14, Issue 1: pp. 99-110).

Keramat Poorsoltan, a professor in the Department of Management, was recently recognized with two notable opportunities in scholarship. He was awarded a \$5,500 Sasakawa Fellowship, which supports participation in the National Faculty Development Institute on "Incorporating Japanese Studies into the Undergraduate Curriculum," a gathering that will be held at San Diego State University from June 4 through June 22. He also was selected to participate in the National Endowment for the Humanities 2007 Summer Institute on "Berber North Africa: The Hidden Mediterranean Culture," which will be held on the campus of Oregon State University June 25 through July 20.

Learn More about the Region's Native Plants

Regional landowners who are interested in learning more about the native plants in Western Maryland and their many uses are invited to attend a forest plant sustainability workshop Saturday, June 16, at New Germany State Park near Grantsville, Md. The event, hosted

by the Appalachian Center for Ethnobotanical Studies at FSU, is free and open to the public.

The FSU Savage Mountain Summer Arts Academy offers a variety of workshops for high school students grades 9-12. The programs offered for Summer 2007 are in creative writing, wind chamber music and stage combat.


Safety Message

Summertime Work Requires Precaution

Hot summer days and nights pose special hazards for those who work outdoors. This group must protect themselves against heat, sun exposure and other related hazards—insects, vehicle traffic, etc. It is important to know these potential hazards and how to manage them.

The combination of hot sun and humidity can be a serious health threat during the summer months. Sun rays contain ultraviolet (UV) radiation, which causes premature aging of the skin, wrinkles, cataracts and skin cancer. Protect yourself by following these tips:

- 1. Wear a hat (wide brim), long sleeves (to help to cool you), gloves and sun glasses to reduce your exposure to the UV rays.
- 2. Use sunscreen. A sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15 that blocks 93 percent of the UV rays. Follow the directions on the container.
 - 3. Drink plenty of water before your



get thirsty—at least once or twice an hour. Carry it with you in a water bottle, so you always have it ready.

- 4. Take frequent breaks in a shaded area.
- 5. Eat smaller meals before extreme work activity.
 - 6. Avoid

caffeine and alcohol or large amounts of sugar.
