Civil Rights Leader at FSU April 17

The public will have the opportunity to learn from the Rev. Samuel Billy Kyles, a Civil Rights leader and close friend of Dr. Martin Luther King who was with him during the last hour of his life, when FSU honors King's legacy with a special celebration at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, **April 17**, in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. The free event, part of ongoing spring programming focusing on King organized by FSU and Allegany College of Maryland, features Kyles as the keynote

speaker, with welcoming remarks by FSU President Jonathan Gibralter, music by the FSU Chamber Choir and Unified Voices Under God's Dominion and a student art award presentation.

"Having Rev. Kyles here—someone who was actively involved in the fight for racial integration and bus boycotts in Memphis, among many other important advocacy efforts—is truly an honor, and a fitting tribute to our community celebration of Dr. King's message of peace and social justice," said John Bowman, FSU

Vice Provost. "This is an extraordinary opportunity for the public to hear first hand what it was like during the Civil Rights Movement, and to learn more about Kyle's current work as a national figure and advocate who is ensuring that Dr. King's ideas and legacy live on."

Celebrate Poetry Month with 2 Noted Authors

FSU's literary community will celebrate National Poetry Month by hosting a reading by poets Todd Davis and Shara McCallum at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, **April 16.** Davis, author of "Ripe" and "Some Heaven," and McCallum, author of "Song of Thieves" and "The Water Between Us," will read from their latest books at the FSU Cook Chapel. The reading is free and open to the public and a reception and book signing will follow.

Davis teaches creative writing, environmental studies and American literature at Penn State University's Altoona College and is the winner of the Gwendolyn Brooks Poetry Prize. His poems have been nominated for the Pushcart Prize and have appeared in such journals and magazines as "The North American Review," "The Christian Science Monitor," "Orion," "Indiana Review," "Iowa Review" and "Arts & Letters," among many other publications.

In addition to his creative work, Davis is the author or editor of six scholarly books, including "Kurt Vonnegut's Crusade, or How a Postmodern Harlequin Preached a New Kind of Humanism" and "Mapping the Ethical Turn: A Reader in Ethics, Culture, and Literary Theory."

McCallum, winner of the 1998 Agnes Lynch Starrett Poetry Prize, recently completed the manuscript of her third book of poems titled "To Enter this Room." She is the recipient of an Academy of American Poets Prize, a Tennessee Individual **Artist Grant** and a grant from the





McCallum and Davis will give a reading on April 16.

Barbara Deming Memorial Fund. McCallum's poems and personal essays have appeared in journals such as "The Antioch Review," "Callaloo, Creative Nonfiction," "Green Mountain Review," "The Iowa Review," and "Ploughshares." Over the past decade, her poetry has been featured in more than 20 anthologies of American, African-American, Caribbean and world poetry such as "New Caribbean Poetry," "Gathering Ground: A Reader Celebrating Cave Canem's First Decade" and "The New American Poets: A Bread Loaf Anthology." Originally from Jamaica, McCallum teaches and directs the Stadler Center for Poetry at Bucknell University.

the 1950s, Kyles' passion for social justice quickly surfaced. He joined the NAACP-Memphis Branch and became a strategist for the South's growing struggle for civil rights. In 1961, he was one of a small group of parents who enrolled their young children in an allwhite school to integrate the public school system. Two years later, he, along with other pioneers, fully integrated the city buses by sitting in the designated 'white" section. His initial action landed him in jail, but his involvement in nonviolent protests continued. Slowly, he and other leaders worked to bring down the walls of segregation in restaurants, movie theaters, department stores and workplaces in Memphis.

Today, Kyles is a highly regarded national speaker, addressing groups and organizations throughout the United States and abroad. He is a founding national board member of People United to Serve Humanity (PUSH) and a current national board and executive committee member of Rainbow Coalition/PUSH. He

served as executive director of Rainbow/PUSH-Memphis and executive producer of its weekly radio broadcast for more than 30 years. He was appointed by the Clinton administration to serve on the Advisory Committee on Religious Freedom Abroad, and in 1998 served as a panelist at the White House Conference on Hate Crimes.

life and legacy.

- Learn more about the eventful months in 1968 Memphis that led to King's death by watching the documentary, "At the River I Stand." The film will be shown at several times and locations: 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 15, at the Allegany Arts Council's Saville Gallery, 52 Baltimore St. in downtown Cumberland, and 7:30 to 9:30 pm. Wednesday, April 16, at Frostburg's Palace Theatre, 31 E. Main St. The Rev. Kyles will share his thoughts on the sanitation workers' strike and King's work in Memphis following the documentary screenings.
- The Rev. Kyles will discuss the events in Memphis leading up to King's arrival, King's vision of economic justice and Kyles' own recollection of April 4, 1968, during a discussion 9:30 to 11 a.m. Thursday, **April 17**, at Allegany College of Maryland Theatre, 12401 Willowbrook Road, Cumberland.





New AFSCME Scholarship at FSU

Members of the FSU Local 239 chapter of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees and the FSU administration gathered recently to sign papers establishing the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Pass-Through Scholarship, which will provide scholarships to full-time FSU students who are members or dependents of members of AFSCME's FSU Local 239. The funds, donated by members of the local, will provide an annual award of at least \$500.



New FSU Engineering Program Receives OK

The Maryland Higher Education Commission recently approved FSU's proposal to offer a Bachelor of Science in Engineering degree, with the first students eligible to enroll in the fall of 2008.

The new program will allow students to pursue concentrations in electrical engineering, materials engineering, industrial chemistry and engineering management. University officials expect prospective students to be attracted to the added flexibility of the program, which also makes it possible to pursue second majors or minors in disciplines such as physics, mathematics, chemistry or business.

This is FSU's first stand-alone engineering degree; FSU has offered engineering in collaboration with the University of Maryland since the 1970s.

Graduates of the new program will be prepared to pursue graduate studies in a variety of interdisciplinary engineering fields such as mechatronics, robotics, nanotechnology, environmental engineering, systems engineering or applied physics. It is also a suitable engineering foundation for students interested in careers in medicine, law or business administration.

Collaboration with the University of Maryland has been the basis for all past FSU engineering offerings, said Dr. Joseph Hoffman, dean of the FSU College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The new program will be in addition to these two other collaborative engineering programs:

The collaborative mechanical engineering program with University of Maryland's Clark School of Engineering allows students to stay on the FSU campus, but earn a U.Md. degree. A similar collaborative electrical engineering program with U.Md. is being replaced by the new FSU curriculum; it will be discontinued once its current students have graduated.

FSU's Dual Degree Engineering Program, which began in the 1970s, allows students to spend three years completing mathematics, physics, and general education courses at FSU, then transferring to College Park for two years to focus on an engineering specialty. After the first year, the students have enough credits to earn a physics degree from FSU. Then, after a second year, they earn a second bachelor's degree in their engineering specialty from U.Md.

FSU's new program has been designed to meet the standards of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology Education (ABET), which has previously accredited the FSU/U.Md. collaborative programs.

Learn About Natural Resource Management

The Western Mountains Chapter of Maryland Native Plant Society will hold its regular meeting at New Germany State Park at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, **April 15.** Guest speaker Sunshine L. Brosi will give a presentation called "Integrating Ecological and Ethnoho."

"Integrating Ecological and Ethnobotanical Approaches to American Chestnut and Butternut Restoration." The public is welcome to attend.

According to Brosi, natural resource management is able to achieve ecological restoration and promote healthy diverse forests which also produce products, such as edible nuts to revitalize rural economies. The loss of the American chestnut is one of the great environmental tragedies to have occurred in Eastern forests of North America which had significant impacts on local economies. Many other tree species face similar attacks by invasive, exotic pests. Brosi will present results from sevenyear-old chestnut plantings in Pennsylvania and Kentucky on surface mines, clearcuts, log landings, and natural gap openings. Brosi will also share research on preserving and restoring butternut trees while maintaining a supply of material for traditional Cherokee Indian artisans in western North Carolina. She will discuss how these integrated approaches can also be applied to other threatened species in Maryland.

Directions to the program: From I-68 take exit 22 and follow signs for New Germany State Park. Turn left into the

park onto McAndrews Hill Road. The meeting will be held in the Lakehouse. Parking is available in Lots # 4 or 5; there are also handicap accessible parking spaces at the Lakehouse.

Drogin describes a con-man, dubbed "Curveball" by the Western intelligence community, whom Drogin claims was lying when he sketched out Saddam Hussein's germ warfare program to American intelligence, driving America to begin a war. Drogin shows how those who doubted Curveball's evidence ignored their doubts because it fed a theory they had already believed.

Following the presentation, Drogin will be available to sign his book, which is a bestseller and was recently in the number five position of the Foreign Affair's Top 10 books list.
