Staking Our Claim **Legacy of Love**

Reflected in New FSU Scholarship Fund

Before FSU alumnus Michael Schrodel died of cancer in August 2001, he wrote a letter to his friends and family that included a special section to his daughter, Carmen. Whenever she missed him, he said, she should look up at the sky and pick out a star. That star was him looking down on her.

Today, Carmen is 10 years old, and she already has her sights set on FSU for college, just like her dad. And a constellation of support that includes Michael's friends, family members and loved ones has established a scholarship worthy of his legacy of generosity and love.

For the past seven years, Michael's fraternity brothers in Sigma Tau Gamma, his wife, Teresa Schrodel (Class of 1993 at FSU), and other enthusiastic volunteers have gotten together for the annual Michael D. Schrodel Golf Classic, which recently raised enough money to create the Michael D. Schrodel Scholarship Fund.

The scholarship includes a special preference for Sigma Tau Gamma

legacies. It's a fitting tribute to Michael and the strong brotherhood he shared with his fraternity, who stood by him when he was sick, doing everything from arranging rides for him to get radiation treatments to installing tile in his house so he could better maneuver his wheelchair. They also donated money to cover Michael's funeral expenses.

"It's these brothers who came to rally and help us during Michael's courageous battle," said Teresa, who became quite close to Sigma Tau Gamma and was named their White Rose Sweetheart in 1992. "It's also these same brothers whom I call upon and I know are ready and willing to offer emotional and any other type of assistance to Carmen and me.'

Eric Dorman (FSU Class of 1990), Michael's Big Brother in Sigma Tau Gamma and an avid golfer, came up with the idea for organizing the annual golf tournament fundraiser.

"I know for some fraternity brothers it's an event they look forward to every year," he said. "We even have people who don't play golf but come to participate just for the camaraderie. As time goes on, we get more and more busy, and we forget the core of our relationship through the fraternity. This is the one time that we embrace that and celebrate Mike's life together.'

"While I would rather watch paint dry than play golf, I make sure to attend this golf tournament every year," said Eric Udler (FSU Class of 1990), another Sigma Tau Gamma alum. "It's a great way to keep in touch with so many fraternity brothers and raise money for a very worthy cause."

In addition to funding the Michael D. Schrodel Scholarship Fund, proceeds from the golf tournament have also gone toward the American Cancer Society's Hope Lodge in Indianapolis, where the Schrodels stayed while Michael received treatment, Calvert Hospice and a Maryland 529 College Savings Plan for Carmen.

"Michael wanted to give back to those who helped him during his illness," Teresa said. Teresa and her daughter also decided to celebrate Michael's life by adding him to FSU's Wall of Honor, where "students and faculty will walk by and see his name."

"Frostburg is where it all began," Teresa said. "It's where Michael's parents met in the '60s. It's where he and I fell in love. Michael's legacy will always be there. And I'm glad students will have some sort of assistance to help finance their education through this new scholarship. It shows Carmen what a wonderful person her father

H1N1 Flu Advisory



Many of you are aware that a new strain of the influenza virus has appeared in Mexico and is spreading to a number of U.S. states. The situation is developing

quickly, and it is important that everyone remains aware of new developments in this illness. The FSU home page (www.frostburg.edu) and Brady Health page (www.frostburg.edu/brady) offer links to updated information on this situation. Check these links often!

Symptoms of the 2009 H1N1 flu virus in people are similar to those of regular flu and include fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people have also reported diarrhea and vomiting associated with swine flu.

No vaccine exists yet to protect against this flu, but you can take these everyday steps to protect your health:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the used tissue in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you get sick, stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

Changes to Financial Aid Process

The Financial Aid Office is notifying students about changes in the financial aid process for the 2009-10 academic year. The office will begin processing its student loans through the William D. Ford Direct Lending program. It will no longer be processing Federal Stafford Loans or Federal Parent PLUS Loans through banks via the Family Federal Education Loan Program. Students and parents applying for a federal loan for the 2009-10 academic year will be required to sign a new Master Promissory Note (MPN). This change will benefit students by saving them 1.5 percent in loan origination fees. Students and parents will not be able to complete a new MPN until after Monday, June 1. Students will be sent a notification with instructions to their FSU e-mail accounts before June 1 and should watch their mail and email for important announcements and updates.

Summer Arts Academy Offered for High Schoolers at FSU



High school students with hopes and dreams of becoming world-renowned singers, musicians or artists, or even actors or rock stars, can bring those dreams closer to reality at the FSU Savage Mountain Summer Arts Academy this summer.

FSU will host the 2009 Savage Mountain Summer Arts Academy. The academy offers six programs for students entering grades nine through 12. The programs include Creative Writing, Wind Chamber, Stage Combat, Choir, Garage Band and Appalachian Folk Arts. Each program is a week long (Sunday through Saturday) and students can reside on campus or commute.

The Garage Band Workshop, **June 14 through 20**, will offer an
opportunity to work with successful
area musicians and receive one-on-one
training on the guitar, bass or drums.
Students will form bands and learn the
musical and communication skills
necessary for being in a booming rock
band. The bands will chose a name,

develop a logo, create a biography and set up a MySpace music page. Students will learn about song structure, lyric writing and the finer points of being a working musician.

Child safety seat laws require:

- A child under age 4 (regardless of weight) or a child weighing 40 pounds or less (regardless of age) must be secured in a child safety seat.
- A child weighing more than 40 pounds and under age 16 must be either in a child safety seat in accordance with the safety seat and vehicle manufacturer's instructions or seat belt.
