Performances will take place in the PAC Drama Theatre Friday, Feb. 26, and Saturday, Feb. 27, and Thursday, March 4, to Saturday, March 6, at 7:30 p.m., with a matinee performance on Feb. 27 at 2 p.m.

Loosely based on the ancient folk song, "The Ballad of Barbara Allen," "Dark of the Moon" is a powerful, mystical folk drama set in the mysterious and mesmerizing Smoky Mountains of Appalachia in the 1920s. A tale of tragic love, reminiscent of "Romeo and Juliet," is at the heart of


a story that depicts a clash of incongruent worlds – the mountains where witches and other supernatural

Marcellus Shale Display at Ort Library

The display in the Ort Library contains a brief history of Marcellus shale and outlines the process of horizontal drilling in the Marcellus formation. Marcellus shale, named after Marcellus, N.Y., where an outcrop formation was discovered, extends throughout most of the Appalachian basin. Scientists have speculated that the Marcellus formation holds anywhere between 168-500 trillion cubic feet (tcf) of natural gas. A feasible recovery percentage could be 10 percent, approximately 50 tcf of natural gas (enough to sustain U.S. energy demands for two years), having a wellhead value of \$1 trillion.

Free help preparing 2009 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee student preparers.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A or a basic Form 1040 return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to credits and deductions. Electronic filing will be available.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Dr. Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. A drop-off service will be available throughout the week and select Saturdays will be available.

Taxpayers should bring tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2s, Form 1099s, a copy of last year's returns and other relevant info. Taxpayer and dependent Social Security numbers must be verified with proof of ID.
