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Film

UPC Launches International Film Series at FSU

The FSU Programming Council will present its international film series, “Bridges to the World,” which brings views of unique cultures from around the world to the campus of FSU. The series will begin on **Feb. 9** and run every Tuesday until **March 9**. All show times are at 7 p.m. in Tawes 153.

The month-long series will begin **Feb. 9** with a film from Russia. “The Island” is a biographical film about a 20th century Eastern Orthodox monk. The film offers a moving parable about sin, faith, prayer, forgiveness and redemption played out in a monastery on the shores of the White Sea.

The second film of the series, on **Feb. 16**, showcases a romantic comedy from Korea. “My Dear Enemy” follows a slightly absurd day in the life of ex-lovers who reunite for financial reasons. As in most romantic comedies, the two could not be more different. Fortunately, the film avoids a clichéd romantic trajectory and instead

focuses on the effect the two ex-lovers have on each other.

The third film of the series, on **Feb. 23**, comes from Argentina. “El Hijo de la Novia” or “Son of the Bride” is an intimate, sentimental film about family expectations, obligations and love. The rather serious topics are well-balanced with humor and laughter.

The fourth film of the series is from Estonia, debuting on **March 2**. “Detsembrikuumus” or “December Heat” is Estonia’s official submission to

the Academy Awards Foreign Language Film category for 2010. This historical action-drama was produced for the 90th anniversary of the Republic of Estonia, and tells the story of the attempted communist coup. The film follows a young soldier and his wife as they struggle to save their lives and their country. Along the way they receive help from legendary Gen. Ernst Rodder and battle the new Estonia bureaucracy and the communists.

The series will end with a film from Nigeria on **March 9**. “Royal Messengers” is a Nollywood (Nigerian film industry) comedy that tells a story of King Igwe who has 21 daughters, but no son to take his place. He discovers that he may have a son but only has 30 days to find him. His journey begins as he searches for a son that he knows nothing about.

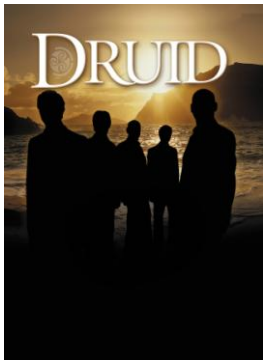
are just as fascinating to people of other nationalities and ethnicities.

and Thursday, March 4, to Saturday, March 6, at 7:30 p.m., with a matinee performance on **Feb. 27** at 2 p.m.

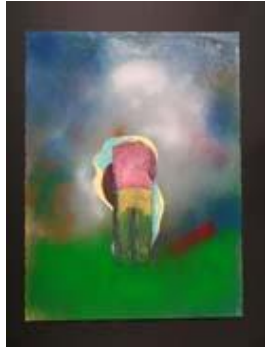

The collection features Recent Works on Paper as the basis for

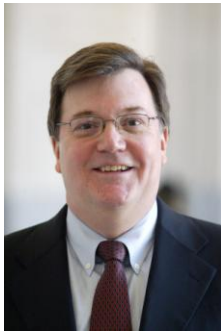

Academic Scheduling/Religious Observances

It is FSU's policy that its academic programs and services be available to qualified students who have been

admitted to its programs, regardless of their religious beliefs. Students will not be penalized because of observances of their religious holidays and will be given an opportunity to make up, within a reasonable time period, any academic assignment that is missed because of individual participation in religious observances. It is the student's responsibility to notify his or her instructors of conflicts between religious observances and scheduled course activities.

Students should notify their instructors of conflicts and make arrangements for making up missed work **before** an absence due to religious observance.

United States Census 2010



Census Day is **April 1**. The census is a count of everyone residing in the United States. The U.S. Constitution

requires this process be done every 10 years. All U.S. residents must be counted: people of all races and ethnic groups – citizens and non-citizens – must participate. The questionnaire responses should represent the household as it exists on that day.

Every year the federal government can allocate more than \$300 billion to states and communities based on this data, which aids in obtaining additional funding for community services, school lunch programs and new construction, such as highways and hospitals. The data collected is also included in grant proposals, which are important to the University.

The Census questionnaire is only 10 questions, 10 minutes of your time, and it is confidential. The Census Bureau cannot share an individual's census questionnaire with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement entities.

The Biggest Loser Returns to FSU

CHILL is bringing its "The Biggest Loser on Campus" program back to campus for the second year in a row.

"The Biggest Loser on Campus" is designed to promote student wellness by encouraging increased participation in aerobic activities and health programs on campus. During this two-month program, teams of four will be

awarded points for completing tasks that aim to improve participants' overall well-being, including meeting with personal trainers, submitting nutritional analyses and engaging in campus programs.

This program rewards campus engagement and self-awareness, not weight loss. However, past participants noted that their shrinking waistlines were a benefit of their new diet, exercise and stress management techniques. In spring 2009, the top three teams lost a combined total of 114 pounds, and each accumulated multiple participation points by being involved in campus blood drives and walking in the annual Relay for Life event.

"Vagina Monologues" to Be Performed

FSU will present Eve Ensler's "The Vagina Monologues" at 7:30 p.m. on **Friday, Feb. 12, and Saturday, Feb. 13**, at PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The Vagina Fair will be held from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., which includes the V-Day Scarf Sale, as well as displays from groups such as the Family Crisis Resource Center.

"The Vagina Monologues" dives into a range of emotions buried in real women's experiences. Proceeds will benefit the Family Crisis Resource Center in Cumberland and the Dove Center of Garrett County.

In 2009, over 4,200 V-Day benefit events produced by volunteer activists took place in the U.S. and around the world, educating millions of people about the reality of violence against women and girls – violence that affects one in three women! To date, the V-Day movement has raised over \$70

million and educated millions about the issue of violence against women and the efforts to end it; crafted international educational, media and PSA campaigns; launched the Karama program in the Middle East; reopened shelters; and funded over 11,000 community-based antiviolence programs and safe houses in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Haiti, Kenya, South Dakota, Egypt and Iraq. V-Day was named one of Worth magazine's "100 Best Charities" in 2001 and Marie Claire's "Top 10 Charities" in 2006.

As part of its 2010 V-Day Campaign, FSU will have its annual Scarf Sale **Feb. 8 through 11** in the Tawes Lobby at FSU and during the performances of "The Vagina Monologues." Proceeds will benefit both local centers.

The Clothesline Project, designed to "air out society's dirty laundry," will be held from **Feb. 8 to 11** with the Scarf Sale. Women and men are invited to create shirts that will be displayed during the performances of "The Vagina Monologues" as a visual representation of real stories of violence against women.

FSU Students Offer Free Tax Prep

Free help preparing 2009 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program at FSU.
Help with **basic** federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from **early February through early April** by FSU’s College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee student preparers.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A or a basic Form 1040 return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to credits and deductions. Electronic filing will be available.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Dr. Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. A drop-off service will be available throughout the week and select Saturdays will be available.

Taxpayers should bring tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2s, Form 1099s, a copy of last year’s returns and other relevant info. Taxpayer and dependent Social Security numbers must be verified with proof of ID.
