Dance

FSU Theatre and Dance to Present Spring Dance Concert

The Department of Theatre and Dance at FSU will present the Spring Dance Concert **May 6, 7 and 8** at 7:30 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre. The evening will feature the sophisticated dance of guest artists Gina Milovan-Kohler and Jim Morrow, as well as an eclectic mix of original choreographies by the Dance Company.

With rapid energy and vibrant pacing, *Sam Flowers* and *Brie Jordan* use tap dance to commemorate famous dancers throughout history. *Kira Stanley* studied bumble bees to create a hip-hop piece that will have the audience “buzzing” to music by the Black Eyed Peas. Another high-energy piece, by *Jasmine Clark*, works closely with lighting and masks to present a dance with unexpected movement and special effects. In addition to six student choreographies, Director *Jamie McGreevy* choreographed an all-female ensemble piece set to music from the Broadway production of “The Lion King.” This dance explores the use of personal strength to break through barriers and pressures in life.

The Spring Dance Concert will also feature a duet titled “Excerpts of Dream Factories” by New York guest artists Milovan-Kohler and Morrow.

Milovan-Kohler is an independent choreographer, teacher and yoga instructor who has presented her work across the U.S. and internationally. Morrow is the founder and artistic director of Instruments of Movement. Tickets are \$6 for students and \$12 for the general public.

Dance Masters Milovan-Kohler and Morrow to Offer Youth, Adult Classes

FSU will host classes by dance masters Gina Milovan-Kohler and James Morrow in the FSU Dance Studio in the Cordts PE Center. **Saturday, May 8**, will be open to dancers ages 14 and up. **Sunday, May 9**, will be open to children 13 and under. The cost is \$10 per class.

Vinyasa Yoga class will start Saturday’s lessons from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. The class will begin with meditation and pranayama and move into a continuous sequence of asanas linked through breath. This class is open to a range of levels and can be tailored to meet the needs of the group.

From 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., a modern dance class will be taught. This class will begin with a full body warm-up and will work on embracing gravity with various exercises and

combinations. It will also blend Horton, Graham, Dunham and fall release techniques.

From 10:30 to 11:30 a.m., an urban fusion dance class will be taught. This class is a blend of West African, modern and urban dance styles fused with emerging techniques and various forms of hip hop.

From noon to 1 p.m., jazz is highlighted. Morrow’s class is rooted in the Joel Hall Urban Jazz style. This is a very energetic and aerobic dance class incorporating traditional jazz and vocabulary with new urban social dance styles.

From 1 to 2 p.m., a contemporary dance class will explore the relationships between breath and movement, the range and motion in the body, momentum, direction, technical specificity, space, musicality and intention.

From 2 to 3 p.m., hip hop will be presented and conclude the lessons for the day. This session encourages the students to appropriate the instructor’s style of dance with their own movement voice.

Sunday classes will begin from 9 to 10 a.m. with Milovan-Kohler’s Vinyasa Yoga class. From 10 to 11 a.m., jazz class will be held, followed by contemporary dance from 11 a.m. to noon. Hip hop will conclude the day of classes from noon to 1 p.m.

Dr. Joan DeVe Dixon, the featured soloist for the International Dvorak Society’s American Spring Festival, will perform at Windsor Hall’s Great Plates! **Friday, May 14**, at 8 p.m. Doors open at 7 p.m. for a food and wine reception.

Dixon is a featured soloist for the International Dvořák Society’s American Spring Festival. As such, she performs up to 20 concerts throughout the Czech Republic each summer. The festival features the music of Antonín Dvořák and other significant composers from the U.S. and the Czech Republic.

Her program at Windsor Hall will include several of Dvorak’s “Humoresques” and “Poetic Tone Pictures,” as well as Gershwin’s “Rhapsody in Blue.”

Dixon is chair of the Department of Music at FSU. She is a five-time winner of the prestigious Individual Artist Award from the Maryland State Arts Council, author of the bio-bibliography of American composer George Rochberg and has collaborated with American composer Dr. Emma Lou Diemer in over 100 world premiere performances. Dixon has recorded 11 CDs that are regularly aired on classical music stations and broadcasts such as “Pipedreams.”

Stroll through the poster presentations, stay for a short talk and meet some of the students and faculty involved in some exciting and

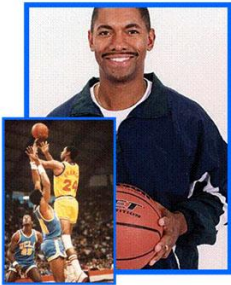
groundbreaking research right here on campus!

Assessment Completes CLA Initiative

With the help of nearly 200 FSU first-year students and seniors, FSU's Office of Planning and Assessment has successfully completed this year's Collegiate Learning Assessment (CLA) initiative. The CLA measures students' critical thinking, analytical reasoning, problem solving and written communication skills. The results of this initiative will be used to assess and ultimately improve academic student development at FSU.

In fall 2009, 100 first-year FSU students enrolled in Introduction to Higher Education participated in the CLA. In spring 2010, 89 seniors who were enrolled in upper-division courses participated. The results will be analyzed to determine whether improvement in average student performance between entry and graduation is in line with that of comparable students at other institutions. Residential Electronics Collection

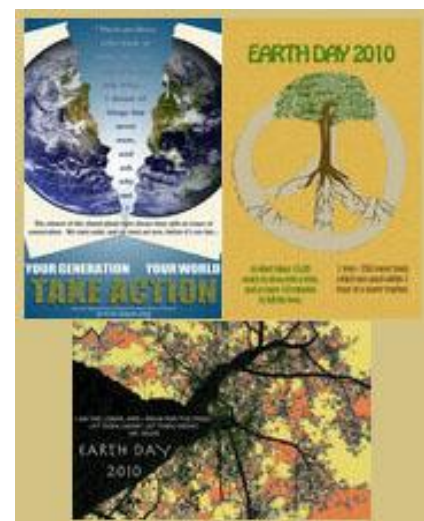
