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Chorale and Choral Society Join MSO to Perform Verdi's 'Requiem'

The Maryland Symphony Orchestra, led by Conductor Elizabeth Schulze, will return to FSU to finish out the Cultural Events Series season with a performance of Giuseppe Verdi's 90-minute masterpiece, "Messa da Requiem," featuring the FSU University Chorale and the Cumberland Choral Society. The two performances on **Saturday, April 30**, at 8 p.m. and **Sunday, May 1**, at 3 p.m. will be held in Pealer Recital Hall in the Performing Arts Center.

The large orchestra sound of the MSO will complement the classical "Requiem," which is a Roman Catholic

funeral mass written in remembrance of the Italian writer, Alessandro Manzoni. Written for four soloists, double choir and orchestra, the MSO will be accompanied by 120 choral musicians from the Cumberland Choral Society and the University Chorale. Additional guest artists will include soprano Lisa Williamson, mezzo-soprano Maria Dolan Barnes, tenor Jonathan Hodel and baritone Eugene Galvin. This event will bring together some of the most talented musicians in Western Maryland to produce a most enjoyable and emotionally charged music piece.

"Requiem" was first performed in 1874 in the church of San Marco in Milan, Italy, and was conducted by Verdi himself. Throughout the work, Verdi used vigorous rhythms, inspirational melodies and dramatic contrasts to express powerful emotions.

Spring Dance Concert to Celebrate Graduating Artists

The Department of Theatre and Dance at FSU will present its Spring Dance Concert **May 5, 6 and 7** at 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center. With an eclectic mix of group dances choreographed by company members, the concert will celebrate the accomplishments of four seniors and feature styles in ballet, contemporary, modern and jazz/tap.

Seniors **Elizabeth Collins**, **Brieana Jordan**, **Grace Gonzalez** and **Rita Peacock** will choreograph and perform in their final FSU dance concert.

Collins will perform two diverse pieces. "Don't Come Back at All," inspired by a quote by legendary singer Jim Morrison, is a contemporary dance that explores the similarity of emotions among strangers, and a ballet titled "The Corps" sheds light on the impact of a "corps" dancer within a dance company.

Jordan has teamed with **Jaydee Moultrie** on a piece titled "Rhythm Nation," where diverse dance styles

like hip-hop, ballet, modern and African come together to portray various members of society. The piece focuses on social differences among economic lines, and points toward a world where all are equal.

A dramatic duet will combine Gonzalez's love for dance and theatre. In "Apartment No. 7," she focuses on the struggle between two lovers, one of whom is losing touch with reality.

With a series of collaborative efforts to her credit, Peacock will bring company members together with an energetic jazz and tap piece titled "Heat." This dance focuses on that unique moment when someone meets his or her significant other.

The concert will include 14 pieces, including dances choreographed and performed by faculty member **Nicole Frost** and company director **Jamie McGreevy**.

FSU Presents Concert by Jazz Band and Vocal Jazz Ensemble

The FSU Department of Music will present a concert by the FSU Jazz

Band and the Vocal Jazz Ensemble on **Thursday, April 28**, at 8 p.m.

The 17-member jazz band, under the direction of **Timothy Powell**, has worked up numerous pieces from which the program will be selected: Dizzy Gillespie's Afro-Cuban work "Manteca"; Joe Garland's chart-topping "In the Mood," popularized by Glenn Miller; Evan Berg's "Hot it Up"; Tony Guerrero's "The Buckethead Shuffle," which combines jazz and Latin pop rhythms; A.R. Jones' mellow "Easy Street"; Paul McKee's "That's What I Thought"; the big band, swing-tunes "Get Up and Go" by Sammy Nestico and "Changing Times" by Lennie Niehaus; and Kevin McElrath's soulful "Blues for Bubber," which features some "low-down" trumpet playing.

The Vocal Jazz Ensemble, under the direction of **Dr. Karen Soderberg**, will perform Ed Lojeski's arrangement of "Java Jive," which grooves with infectious style; "Words" by Anders Edenroth; "Telephone Song," arranged by Rosana Eckert, whose well-written vocals complement a fun rhythm section; and the sweet and simple "Lullabye (Goodnight, My Angel)" by Billy Joel, arranged by Philip Lawson.

Conklin, accompanied by pianist **Hannah Lagno** and assisted on a duet by soprano **Britany Poindexter**, will perform selections by Franz Schubert, Claude Debussy, Richard Strauss, Gioachino Rossini, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Roger Quilter, Igor Stravinsky, Gaetano Donizetti and Franz Lehár.

FSU Flute Studio to Present Solo & Chamber Works

The FSU Flute Studio will celebrate music old and new with FSU students presenting solo and chamber works for the flute and piano. The recital will be held **Monday, May 2**, at 8 p.m.

The repertoire will include Claude Debussy's "Syrinx" for solo flute, based on the mythology of Pan and Syrinx. The alto flute will be featured on "Eight Pieces" by American composer Lowell Liebermann, and the opera aria "Non più mesta accanto al fuoco," the finale of Gioachino Rossini's opera "La Cenerentola," will be heard in Frederic Chopin's "Variations on a Theme by Rossini."

The FSU Flute Ensemble will perform the second half of the program. Flutists **Amanda Kiser** and **Jessica Bussing** will perform with pianist **Mengwan Tu**. The "Flower Duet" from Léo Delibes' "Lakmé" will be followed by the virtuosic "Waltz di Bravura" by famed brothers and flutists from the 19th century, Franz and Charles Doppler.

Guitar Ensemble and Studio Recital

The FSU Department of Music will present the Guitar Ensemble and Studio Recital on **Tuesday, May 3**, at 8 p.m.

Stephen Tunstall, FSU guitar studio director and guitar instructor, will perform "The Cathedral" by Agustin Barrios, "one of the most colorful and difficult works in the guitar repertoire." A guitar quartet will perform Phillip Houghton's "Opals." Various duos and trios of the ensemble will perform the dance-like "Moment Musical" by Franz Schubert, the peaceful "Arrulladora Mexican" by Manuel Ponce, the rich, heartwarming "Girl With the Flaxen Hair" by Claude Debussy and the traditional Japanese folk song "Sakura," which depicts spring, the season of the cherry blossom. The guitar uses different techniques to imitate the sound of the koto, a traditional Japanese stringed musical instrument.

Members of the guitar studio will perform solo works, among them **Zachary Dodge**, performing Fernando Sor's melodic "Etude No. 14." **Robert Wallace** will perform Leo Brouwer's demanding but very musical piece "Etude No. 6" and "Etude No. 9."

Tunstall is an active performer in the D.C./Baltimore area and a member of Peabody's Creative Access, a community outreach program that gives volunteer performances at hospital wards, hospices and shelters. He teaches and coaches youth bands at Music Workshop in Baltimore and is a regular participant in the Guitar Foundation of America Convention. He

has also performed at the Mid-America Guitar Ensemble Festival.

FSU Relay for Life Raises Nearly \$51K!



In its most successful year so far, FSU’s annual Relay for Life on April 15 had raised nearly \$51,000, making a total of more than \$250,000 raised for the American Cancer Society since FSU’s Relay began 10 years ago.

In advance of Friday’s event, 825 people – students, faculty and staff – had registered to walk, with another 50 registering on-site that evening. A total of 61 teams participated, with the What’s Up Doc (Pre-Medical Society) team raising the most, \$6,160. Relay for Life is the campus’ largest single volunteer effort each year.

While pledges are still being collected, the goal set for FSU’s Relay was \$52,000, and organizers are still trying to reach a “stretch goal” of \$54,000. Step into the Ort Library to view the displays on the Civil War. Learn about the war, see library resources and explore on your own. The displays are on floors 3 and 4 and highlight the war in general, as well as West Virginia and Maryland, including the local area.

On April 12, 1861, the provisional Confederate forces at Charleston fired on Fort Sumter in the Charleston Harbor. This began the bloodiest war in the history of the United States with at least 618,000 Americans from the North and South losing their lives. (Some historians fix the number nearer to 700,000.) The four years of the war from April 1861 to April 1865 were the bloodiest in American history; the effects are still visible today.
