FSU to Participate in "Enough Is Enough" to End Campus Violence

Annual Martin Luther King Celebration Kicks Off Week of Programming



FSU will participate in "Enough is Enough," the national campaign to end

campus violence, the week of Monday, April 4, through Saturday, April 9. Each day will have a different theme, and events, workshops and information will be offered.



Monday is kick-off day, starting with the annual Martin Luther King Celebration in the Atkinson Room (232) of the Lane

University Center at 4 p.m. Bernard Wynder '78/M'84, assistant vice president of Student Services at FSU, will speak on "Enough Is Enough," concentrating on community with an emphasis on King's message of learning to love and serve one another. Wynder is the recipient of numerous awards, including the NAACP Image Award and the "Living Legend" award from Associated Black Charities of Maryland. He serves on the Allegany County Human Relations Commission and was recently elected president of the Allegany County chapter of the NAACP.

Wynder's speech will be followed by a rally and Harmony Walk beginning at 6:30 p.m., highlighted by the unveiling of the Lane Center wall fountain in the newly renovated lower lobby. Music will be provided by the FSU Chamber Choir, directed by

Dr. Karen Soderberg.



Following the Harmony Walk, Dustin Lance Black, Academy Award-winning screenwriter for the movie "Milk," will

speak, beginning at 7:30 p.m., also in the Atkinson Room. In addition to his work as a screenwriter, producer and

director, Black is a high-profile civilrights activist on LGBT issues.

Tuesday is Take the Pledge Day, in which members of the campus community can sign a pledge to take a stand against violence. There will also be the first of a series of brown bag lunches, beginning with "Facing Facebook Feuds" from noon to 1 p.m. in the Lane South Addition (244), which is also serving as headquarters for "Enough Is Enough" week. Members of Dr. Elesha L. Ruminski's CMST 345/Conflict Management class, with the Allegany Conflict Resolution Center and Alpha Phi Omega, will discuss why it is valuable to face rather than avoid conflict and offer basic strategies and resources for managing interpersonal conflicts that arise as a result of Facebook postings.

President Jonathan Gibralter and Dr. Tom Bowling, vice president for Student and Educational Services, will lead an online chat on civility on Bloq From the 'BURG (blogfromtheburg. blogspot.com) beginning at 6 p.m. That discussion will lead into the 7 p.m. workshop in the South Addition on cyber bullying and how the web plays a role. FSU students **Greq** Brightbill and Patty Malatt, representing the BURG Peer Education Network, will discuss how individuals can help stop the practice.

Wednesday, Unity Day, will feature a brown bag session on "Spirituality and Forgiveness" offered by the Rev. Dr. Cindy Zirlott of United Campus Ministry at noon in the South Addition. A workshop on healthy relationships, presented by the Family Crisis Resource Center, will begin at 7 p.m., also in the South Addition. Everyone will also be encouraged to leave a handprint on a "These Hands Don't Hurt" banner, which will hang from the Lane Center second-floor railing for the rest of the week.

Thursday will be Take Action Day. In addition to an opportunity for

students to create posters that will be displayed in the Lane Center, international fitness and wellness guru Scott Cole will present an evening workshop called "Get Crazy, Get Still" in Lane 111 beginning at 7 p.m. The first hour will be aerobic activity, and there will be a second hour of tai chi. Participants can join either or both activities. Also, members of the student organization, BTLGLASS (Bisexuals, Transgenders, Gays, Lesbians and Straight Supporters), will present "It Gets Better" at 7 p.m. in the South Addition.

On Friday, for Beats of Peace Day, members of the campus community will be encouraged to share random acts of kindness that will be used to create a "Random Acts of Kindness" PowerPoint slideshow, which will be on display in the Lane Center lobby. Cole will also return for a daytime workshop called "Get Active, Not Physical" in the Atkinson Room at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., and "Late Night in the LUC" will feature fun activities reflecting the week's themes.

Saturday is Campus Cares Day with campuswide community service activities. There will also be an all-day National Coalition Building Institute workshop in Lane 111 from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m.

The "Enough Is Enough" campaign was initiated by NASPA President Diana Doyle in response to the call by the vice president for student affairs at Virginia Tech, Zenobia Lawrence Hike, to take action after the shootings on the Virginia Tech campus. The campaign recognizes that parents, students and community partners are critical allies in the campaign to end campus and school violence.

Each year librarians, educators, parents and students come to the campus of FSU for the event to share their love of children's literature and learn more about successful ways to share that love with children.

The theme for the weekend will be "Children's Literature: Inspiring Compassion, Courage, Friendship and Love." Kathi Appelt, Carol Buckley, Carmen Agra Deedy and Lita Judge are the award-winning authors and illustrators headlining the event. Each writer has created stories that remind children about the importance of acting with compassion, courage, friendship and love.

Her children's picture books, "Travels With Tarra," "Just for Elephants" and "Tarra and Bella: An Elephant and Her Dog," reflect her love of elephants.

Deedy was born in Cuba and came to the U.S. as a refugee when she was a child. She has been telling and writing stories for over 20 years, and she has won many awards for her books. Some of them include "Martina the Beautiful Cockroach," "The Library Dragon," "The Yellow Star" and "14 Cows for America."

Judge is an Alaskan native who has written and illustrated various picture books for children. She has won the IRA Children's Book Award, ALA Notable Children's Book and the Junior Library Guild Selection. Her works include "One Thousand Tracings," "Pennies for Elephants" and "Yellowstone Moran: Painting the American West."
