FSU Foundation Gives Pinnacle Award to Gladys Wensel Faherty

The FSU Foundation, Inc., has honored *Gladys Wensel Faherty*, a member of the Frostburg class of 1955, with the Pinnacle Award, its highest honor, in recognition of the time, treasure and hard work she has given to the Foundation in its support of the mission of FSU.

Faherty, only the seventh person to receive the Pinnacle Award, served two terms as president of the Foundation and has been active in alumni affairs, including serving as past president of the Alumni Association. Grateful for the opportunities and assistance that she was given to attend college, she created the Wensel-Faherty Scholarship, providing financial support to FSU students from Allegany and Garrett counties in 1991, and has continued to build on that fund. To date, 62 Frostburg students have benefited from her generosity.

"Sam Ewing has said, 'Hard work spotlights the character of people: Some turn up their sleeves, some turn

up their noses and some don't turn up at all," said FSUF President Sam Griffith, presenting the award. "Whenever her beloved alma mater asks, Gladys Faherty shows up, rolls up her sleeves and, instead of turning up her nose, puts her nose to the grindstone."

"I have known Gladys for many years. She has devoted much of her time, talent and treasure to the Foundation in support of the University," wrote Ken Kennedy, fellow Pinnacle Award recipient and long-time Foundation treasurer, in his nomination letter. "Her compelling interest in the financial aspects of the board has always been directed toward increasing and maximizing the monies available to students for scholarships."

"Giving is contagious," Faherty said. "Once you start, you can't stop."

Faherty taught physical education at Beall High School for nine years and served for 26 years as the media specialist at Mount Savage School, as well as the coordinator for the Gifted and Talented Program. She also volunteered as a computer teacher at St. Peter's School in Westernport for 12 years.

Created in 1993, the Pinnacle Award recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions of time, talent or treasures in support of the educational mission of FSU through the Foundation. For info, visit foundation.frostburg.edu.

Hunan University of Commerce, FSU Sign Letter of Intent

A delegation of officials from the Hunan University of Commerce, Changsha, China, visited FSU on March 8, signing a letter of intent that is the first building block in working together to promote exchange and collaboration in education and

HUC Chancellor Dr. Tang Weibing led the delegation, which included the University's Vice President Lei Houjian, and members of the faculty and administration. They met with FSU President Jonathan Gibralter, Provost Stephen Simpson, College of Business Dean Ahmad Tootoonchi and other officials responsible for welcoming international students.

The HUC delegation came to Frostburg to begin the process of building a relationship. The two institutions have mutual academic and educational needs, and the letter of intent will allow them to work together to promote exchange and collaboration, including exchanging students, faculty and programs. HUC and FSU, in particular, want to achieve

an active exchange of students and faculty in the undergraduate Business Administration and graduate Master of Business Administration programs.

Tang told Gibralter that both universities have a similar tradition of caring for students. Tang had previously held a position at Hunan Normal University and was present when Gibralter spoke there in 2008. HNU was the first Chinese university to partner with FSU, and 26 HNU students are enrolled at FSU. In addition, nine FSU students who are members of the President's Leadership Circle and three faculty and staff members will travel to China to visit HNU during spring break as part of a leadership study tour.

She has been featured in People and The New York Times Magazine. Her children's picture books, "Travels with Tarra," "Just for Elephants" and "Tarra and Bella: An Elephant and Her Dog," reflect her passion for elephants.

Deedy was born in Cuba and came to the U.S. as a refugee when she was a child. She has been telling and writing stories for over 20 years and has won numerous awards for her books. Some of her books include "Martina the Beautiful Cockroach," "The Library Dragon," "The Yellow Star" and "14 Cows for America." Judge is an Alaskan native who has written and illustrated various picture books for children. She has won many awards, including the IRA Children's Book Award, ALA Notable Children's Book and the Junior Library Guild Selection. Her works include "One Thousand Tracings," "Pennies for Elephants" and "Yellowstone Moran: Painting the American West."

Campaign Aims to Stem Violence



FSU will participate in the campaign to bring an end to school and campus violence, "Enough Is Enough," Monday, April 4, through Saturday, April 9. Each day has a theme, and events, workshops and information will be offered.

Monday is kickoff day, starting with the annual Martin Luther King Celebration in the afternoon in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). It will be followed by a rally, march and the unveiling of the Lane Center waterfall. That evening, also in the Atkinson Room, there will be a talk by Dustin Lance Black, screenwriter of the movie "Milk."

Tuesday is Take the Pledge Day, in which members of the campus community can sign a pledge to take a stand against violence. Also on Tuesday will be the first of a series of brown bag lunches, "Conflict Resolution," offered by *Dr. Elesha* Ruminski and her students at noon in the new Lane South Addition, which will also serve as headquarters for Enough Is Enough week. That evening, President Jonathan Gibralter and Dr. Tom Bowling will hold a Blog from the 'BURG online chat on civility. The evening workshop that follows will be on cyber-bullying.

Wednesday, Unity Day, will feature a brown bag session on "Spirituality of Forgiveness," offered by the *Rev. Dr. Cindy Zirlott* of UCM, followed by an evening workshop on healthy relationships offered by the Family Crisis Resource Center. Everyone will also be encouraged to leave a handprint on a These Hands Don't Hurt banner, which will then hang from the Lane Center second-floor railing for the rest of the week.

Thursday will be Take Action Day. In addition to an opportunity for students to create posters that will be displayed in the Lane Center, international fitness and wellness guru Scott Cole will return to campus to offer an evening workshop called "Get Crazy, Get Still."

On Friday, for Beats of Peace Day, members of the campus community will be encouraged to share random acts of kindness. These statements will be turned into a rotating PowerPoint slideshow that will be visible from many locations. Cole will also return for a daytime workshop, and Late Night in the LUC will feature fun activities reflecting the week's themes.

Saturday is Campus Cares Day with campuswide community service. There will also be an all-day National Coalition Building Institute workshop.
