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Spring Dance Concert to Celebrate Graduating Artists

The Department of Theatre and Dance at FSU will present its Spring Dance Concert May 5, 6 and 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center. With an eclectic mix of group dances choreographed by company members, the concert will celebrate the accomplishments of four seniors and feature styles in ballet, contemporary, modern and jazz/tap.

Seniors *Elizabeth Collins, Brieana Jordan, Grace Gonzalez* and *Rita Peacock* will choreograph and perform in their final FSU dance concert.

Collins will perform two diverse pieces. "Don't Come Back at All," inspired by a quote by legendary singer Jim Morrison, is a contemporary dance that explores the similarity of emotions among strangers, and a ballet titled "The Corps" sheds light on the impact of a "corps" dancer within a dance company.

Jordan has teamed with Jaydee Moultrie on a piece titled "Rhythm Nation," where diverse dance styles like hip-hop, ballet, modern and African come together to portray various members of society. The piece focuses on social differences among economic lines, and points toward a world where all are equal.

A dramatic duet will combine Gonzalez's love for dance and theatre. In "Apartment No. 7," she focuses on the struggle between two lovers, one of whom is losing touch with reality.

With a series of collaborative efforts to her credit, Peacock will bring company members together with an energetic jazz and tap piece titled "Heat." This dance focuses on that unique moment when someone meets his or her significant other.

The concert will include 14 pieces, including dances choreographed and performed by faculty member *Nicole Frost* and company director *Jamie McGreevy*.

FSU Flute Studio and Ensemble Recital

The FSU Flute Studio will celebrate music old and new with FSU students presenting solo and chamber works for the flute and piano. The recital will be held **Monday**, **May 2**, at 8 p.m.

The repertoire will include Claude Debussy's "Syrinx" for solo flute, based on the mythology of Pan and Syrinx. The alto flute will be featured on "Eight Pieces" by American composer Lowell Liebermann, and the opera aria "Non più mesta accanto al fuoco," the finale of Gioachino Rossini's opera "La Cenerentola," will be heard in Frederic Chopin's "Variations on a Theme by Rossini."

The FSU Flute Ensemble will perform the second half of the program. Flutists *Amanda Kiser* and *Jessica Bussing* will perform with pianist *Mengwan Tu*. The "Flower Duet" from Léo Delibes' "Lakmé" will be followed by the virtuosic "Waltz di Bravura" by famed brothers and flutists from the 19th century, Franz and Charles Doppler.

Guitar Ensemble and Studio Recital

The FSU Department of Music will present the Guitar Ensemble and Studio Recital on **Tuesday, May 3**, at 8 p.m.

Stephen Tunstall, FSU guitar studio director and guitar instructor, will perform "The Cathedral" by Agustin Barrios, "one of the most colorful and difficult works in the quitar repertoire." A guitar quartet will perform Phillip Houghton's "Opals." Various duos and trios of the ensemble will perform the dance-like "Moment Musical" by Franz Schubert, the peaceful "Arrulladora Mexican" by Manuel Ponce, the rich, heartwarming "Girl With the Flaxen Hair" by Claude Debussy and the traditional Japanese folk song "Sakura," which depicts spring, the season of the cherry blossom. The guitar uses different techniques to imitate the sound of the koto, a traditional Japanese stringed musical instrument.

Members of the guitar studio will perform solo works, among them **Zachary Dodge**, performing Fernando Sor's melodic "Etude No. 14." **Robert Wallace** will perform Leo Brouwer's demanding but very musical piece "Etude No. 6" and "Etude No. 9."

Tunstall is an active performer in the D.C./Baltimore area and a member of Peabody's Creative Access, a community outreach program that gives volunteer performances at hospital wards, hospices and shelters. He teaches and coaches youth bands at Music Workshop in Baltimore and is a regular participant in the Guitar Foundation of America Convention. He has also performed at the Mid-America Guitar Ensemble Festival.

Percussion Ensemble Concert

Staking Our Claim Scholarships Bring Professor Phipps Full

When Dr. Tyra **Phipps '71**, a professor in the FSU Department of Mass Communication. decided to establish scholarships at her alma mater, her considerations took

her full circle from her life today to her days as a student in the old Compton Hall.

Phipps recently set up two scholarships, The Marjorie C. Phipps Mass Communication Scholarship, in memory of her mother who died on Mother's Day last year, and the Tyra C. Phipps Scholarship, for students in the Department of Health and Physical Education.

The scholarship in her mother's name serves students who want to study in the department that Tyra Phipps helped build. Her mother was a big fan of many of the students that she got to know or heard about over the vears.

"She loved my stories about the students," Phipps said. "She loved their perspective.'

The Tyra Phipps Scholarship serves students in the Department of Health and Physical Education, reflecting her past as a Frostburg student-athlete and her present as a longtime multiple sclerosis patient who is helped by health care workers and physical therapists, the "health" piece of the discipline.

"I wanted to be a PE major, but gymnastics made me dizzy. I knew something was wrong by then," she said. She moved her major to the other half of the building, in the Department of Speech and Theatre, but she took every other class in the PE department that she could.

"That department helped me so much. This was in the days of Janet Thomas and Carol Cleveland, Sharon Irwin, Susan Eisel, the Surgents." The support she received from them and

others in Frostburg athletics helped her in her uphill battle to play on Frostburg's varsity tennis team. This was in the pre-Title IX days when there was no women's team at Frostburg or most other colleges. Despite early resistance, she became a member of the Frostburg men's team. After that, her teammates, her coach *Ken Kutler* and *then-President Nelson Guild* stood by her when other teams tried to refuse to play against "the girl."

"Because I kept winning," she said with a smile.

Phipps went on to have a successful tennis career, ranked nationally and competing against the best players in the 1970s. But when she was 27, multiple sclerosis struck hard, paralyzing all but one arm, albeit temporarily. She recovered from that attack and was able to play tennis for some years afterwards, but she eventually had to find another career. The chronic disease has worsened over the years, as is the nature of the type of MS that she has.

After FSU, she earned a master's degree and doctorate, and her career took some turns before she returned to FSU as a faculty member in 1989, where she was one of the originators of FSU's Mass Communication program.

After she broke her pelvis in a fall in 2006, she spent her recovery time writing a novel about issues close to her life and her heart. "Folded Notes," which is available on Amazon.com, begins with Kassie, a nationally ranked tennis player, driven to crisis by a sudden bout of paralysis. The rest of the book deals with what she learns about herself and those around her and how she decides to rebuild her life. That much mimics Phipps' experience, but it's a work of fiction. Kassie isn't Tyra, and the book is designed to tell a different story.

She dedicated the royalties from her book toward the scholarship. She quickly realized that would not be enough, but her book has started a conversation about MS, especially among her high school classmates in Florida; several had loved ones with multiple sclerosis.

Despite the limitations brought on by her disease, her underlying health remains good. Phipps continues to teach, mostly in an online format, and to supervise interns in the Mass Comm Department. She is helped with the physical tasks that her MS makes increasingly difficult by technology and student assistants. And it is the need she sees among students, those she's known over the years and those she interacts with today, that inspired her to set up the scholarships.

"The stress that they have now is so great. I didn't have to work all my summers. I just played tennis," she said. "I just figured, 'Maybe I can help out with scholarships.""

Points of PrideWISE Highlighted in ARC Report

FSU was one of six colleges and universities recognized by the Appalachian Regional Commission in the report "Green Schools and Sustainability in Appalachia: Case Studies in Rural Practice," which illustrates how they are providing critical leadership and training for the emerging green energy industry and helping communities develop markets for green products and services. The publication highlights best practices in Appalachian colleges that are environmentally sustainable themselves and foster educationcommunity partnerships to support local economic growth.

ARC Federal Co-Chair Earl F. Gohl said that the report was "part of ARC's ongoing energy initiative started in 2006 with the publication of the commission's energy plan for the Appalachian region, "Energizing Appalachia: A Regional Blueprint for Economic and Energy Development."

According to the report, research indicates that energy-efficiency investments could create 77,000 new jobs in Appalachia by 2030 while cutting projected energy use by 24 percent. This would result in energy savings of more than \$21 billion in the region. In addition, a projected 70,000 renewable-energy jobs could be created in Appalachia as a result of the production of 74 GW of renewable energy nationally.

Highlighted in the ARC report was FSU's Wind-Solar Energy (WISE) program, which offers a not-for-credit, two-stage program designed to reach non-traditional students; it provides participants with the knowledge needed to install residential wind and solar systems. The online component of the course is divided into eight sessions that cover the basics of wind and solar power and their applications in the residential environment. The on-site workshop offers an intensive introduction to the practical world of installing these systems.

Dr. Oguz A. Soysal, the program director and one of the program's founders and managers, is also a professor of electrical engineering in Frostburg's Department of Physics and Engineering. He prepared the online curriculum based on a broad range of reference sources. Faculty members for the hands-on part of the workshop primarily come from private industry, ensuring that students receive realworld instruction. The University also has adequate technology on hand for demonstrating the installation

techniques, including a residentialscale wind turbine and solar array.

To date, nearly 200 individuals have completed the program, which has been offered twice a year since fall 2007. Many graduates have gone directly into renewable energy fields, while others have used the knowledge to supplement their careers or install systems in their homes or businesses. In spring 2009, 40 students took the North American Board of Certified Energy Practitioners certificate of knowledge exam administered by FSU and 36 passed.
