U.S. Colleges and Universities Join Forces to Address High-Risk Drinking FSU Part of National Learning Collaborative Effort

Colleges and universities from across the country, including FSU, are joining forces to address high-risk drinking on American campuses. This unprecedented group initiative – the Learning Collaborative on High-Risk Drinking – will use comprehensive evaluation and measurement techniques to identify and implement the most effective ways to confront this persistent problem and lessen the harm it causes.

"I am so pleased that Frostburg State University has been invited to join the Dartmouth Learning Collaborative so we can share the successful strategies we have implemented at Frostburg – strategies that have led to a 27 percent reduction in high-risk drinking since 1997," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "With the collaborative knowledge generated during this project, it is my hope that strategies will be implemented that will cause colleges and universities to focus upon the importance of high-risk drinking so they can share in and perhaps even exceed our success."

In addition to FSU, 13 other institutions have joined the Collaborative to date: Boston University, Cornell University, Dartmouth College, Duke University, Northwestern University, Ohio University, Princeton University, Purdue University, Sewanee: The University of the South, Stanford University, Stony Brook University, University of Wyoming and Wesleyan University. The Collaborative will accept additional schools through May 20.

"Binge drinking is a serious public health challenge, leading to injury and

in some cases, death, for hundreds of thousands of college students each year," said U.S Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius. "HHS agencies have tackled this issue over the years, strengthening the evidence base and identifying interventions that work to reduce binge drinking. The Learning Collaborative on High-Risk Drinking is a promising initiative that will implement evidence-based practices at college campuses around the nation."

The Learning Collaborative methodology was developed by the Institute for Healthcare Improvement in Cambridge, Mass., and is aimed at spreading and adapting knowledge to different settings to address a given problem or health concern. This model has already been used successfully hundreds of times in medicine and public health. Using this system, participants are able to implement changes quickly and determine which methods are most effective in their institutions. These experiences then inform the process and progress of the group as a whole.

A centerpiece of the methodology is its focus on measurement. Various measures will be developed to track the progress of the effort, in consultation with experts from across the country. Data will be shared and compared among participant institutions with the goal of lowering the rate of binge drinking and reducing the incidence of the harm associated with this behavior.

New FSU Scholarship



The performing arts have always made *Sandi* Saville's heart race. The love affair began when Saville, a Cumberland native and graduate of Fort Hill High School, joined the school's Ushers Committee, which gave her an opportunity to meet the visiting artists who performed

"The Vienna Boys Choir performed each year and some of the members stayed at our house," Saville said. "From then on I was smitten with live performance."

Her passion for the arts continued into college.

"I roomed with a ballet dancer at WVU who dragged me to Pittsburgh to wait in line at four in the morning to get tickets for Margot Fontaine and Rudolph Nureyev – I was totally hooked," she said.

Saville eventually moved to Alaska, where she practiced law for 28 years and continued her arts advocacy by serving on the State Council for the Arts, including a few years as chair. Her creativity also led her to New York, where she studied at the International Center for Photography.

Today, Saville is interested in supporting the arts through higher education - both as an instructor and as a dedicated and generous advocate. She teaches "Legal Issues in the Arts" in FSU's Department of Music and serves on the Board of Directors for the FSU Foundation, Inc. Saville is also a leadership donor to FSU's Annual Fund and supporter of other campus initiatives, including the Friends of Music and the Center for Creative

Saville recently recognized an opportunity to combine her experience and knowledge of the arts and arts advocacy with her leadership in FSU's fundraising efforts by creating the Sandra K. Saville Presidential Merit Scholarship for the Arts with a \$25,000 commitment, part of the \$34,000 she has generously given to Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg. The Sandra K. Saville Presidential Merit Scholarship for the Arts supports FSU students majoring in the performing or visual arts who have an overall grade point average of at least 3.5. It is the first scholarship created as part of the Presidential Merit Scholarships program, a fundraising effort led by **President Jonathan Gibralter** and the FSU Foundation to secure \$2.5 million in merit-based scholarships for highacademic achievers over the next five
