American Rivers and EPA Award \$300,000 Grant to Frostburg

U.S. Sen. Benjamin Cardin joined with American Rivers and the Environmental Protection Agency to announce a multi-faced sustainability project in Frostburg will receive a \$300,000 grant as part of a comprehensive initiative to protect and restore rivers in the Potomac Highlands region. The grant will help the Western Maryland Resource Conservation and Development Council implement the "Frostburg Grows: Grow It Local Greenhouse Project."

The project will convert unused mined land into a five-acre greenhouse complex designed to train community members for high-quality jobs, while producing local food and tree seedlings to be used in restoration projects. The

environmental, social and economic benefits include reducing runoff that contributes to Potomac basin flooding and acid mine drainage, re-establishing natural forest habitat on strip-mined lands, creating two permanent, sustainable jobs and a training facility that will help create additional job opportunities and providing local healthy food to the residents of Western Maryland.

American Rivers is implementing the EPA grant program that awards local, innovative solutions to benefit clean water and local economies. A total of \$1,373,119 is being awarded to six projects to protect rivers and clean water in the Potomac Highlands region of Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia.

FSU to Offer Sessions on Sustainability at Focus Frostburg

Sustainability and living green will be the focus themes of Focus Frostburg, FSU's daylong teach-in, on **Wednesday, April 18**, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Lane Center. Featuring numerous 50-minute presentations to choose from each hour by FSU faculty and guest speakers, the event is free and open to the public.

Focus Frostburg is an informative day of educational activities for students, faculty, staff and members of the community. FSU also welcomes students from ecology and environmental clubs at area high schools.

Presentations include various topics, such as an FSU student energy audit, stewardship and sustainability from a spiritual standpoint, global meat consumption, the Western Maryland regional food system, biodegradable plastics, preserving outdoor recreation for future generations, Marcellus Shale gas development in Western Maryland, the role of deer hunting in sustainable management and conservation, salt pollution and contamination and many more. There will be a variety of environmental issues discussed, ranging from possible solutions to some of the major problems of sustainability to climate change. Presentation speakers include professors, staff, students and club members from several departments of

Some presentation topics include "Sustainable Energy Systems," including the surge of solar installations in the region; "The Quest for Sustainable Communities," involving the links between urban form, suburbanization and sustainable planning; and "Forever Green: Sustainable Burials," showing how

green burials are becoming increasingly popular. Other presentation titles include "Renewable Energy Projects at FSU," about the wind and solar energy projects that have been developed at FSU; "Climate Change Denial: The Case for and the Consequences," involving the three sides of climate change: deniers, skeptics and reasonably certain; and "Why Should I Be Green," exploring how one person impacts the world.

Various environmental displays will be on hand throughout the day in the first and second floor lobbies of the Lane Center.

Programs Advance FSU's Education Efforts in China

Thanks to the efforts of professors at FSU, the Center for International Education and FSU's partners overseas, the University's College of Business is expanding study abroad opportunities for students. Three new study abroad programs offered through FSU's College of Business will make it possible for students to experience and study the vibrant culture of China.

From May 20 through June 2, 12 FSU students will travel to Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou and Xi'an as part of their enrollment in two new courses: IDIS 350 China in the 21st Century and MGMT 490 Special Topics in Business Administration-Management. The two-week international trip is complemented by online coursework. Led by Dr. Yan Bao, an associate professor in FSU's Department of Accounting, and Dr. Lilly Ye, an assistant professor in the Department of Marketing and Finance, the program will give students insights into China's economy and business practices, with visits to factories, the Shanghai Stock Exchange and cultural destinations, as well as meetings with Chinese executives and Chinese college student peers at FSU's partner institutions.

Frostburg's MBA program is also kicking off an international experience in China on May 31 that runs through June 15, with six students traveling to Beijing and Changsha for two weeks and then completing 12 weeks of online coursework. MBA students may opt to enroll in two capstone courses, MGMT 680 Strategic Integration and MGMT 690 Strategic Change Management, or take MGMT 699 Individual Research in Management. *Dr. Thomas Sigerstad*, an associate professor in FSU's

Department of Management, is leading the trip.

The College of Business is also kicking off a semester-long study abroad program this fall at Hunan Normal University (HNU), FSU's partner institution in Changsha. Three faculty members from the College of Business will teach one course each, over three non-overlapping, five-week, accelerated sessions to span the 15-week semester. The semester also includes a three-credit Chinese Culture and Business Communication course taught by an HNU faculty member.

Financial aid is available to students interested in taking advantage of the College of Business' programs in China.
