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FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance to Present Spring Dance Concert

FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance will present its annual spring Dance Concert, titled "Taking the Movement," on **Friday, May 10, and Saturday, May 11**, at 7:30 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre.

Filled with energy and striking dance moves, "Taking the Movement" explores various dance styles and weaves together nine pieces into a dialogue about embracing the positive in life.

Seniors **Caitlin Moore** and **Niki Newcomb** will present their final choreography at FSU before graduating in May. Known for her high-energy dance moves, Moore, in this performance, focuses on the dilemma of wanting to live the life you pictured while being pulled toward the "safe life others direct you to lead." In contrast, Newcomb's piece, titled "RINSE," is a lyrical illustration about the strength it takes to wash, or rinse, a negative relationship from one's life.

Riggio is the Henry R. Kravis Professor of Leadership and Organizational Psychology and former director of the Kravis Leadership Institute at Claremont McKenna College. Author of over 100 books, book chapters and research articles in the areas of leadership, assessment centers, organizational psychology and social psychology, his most recent books include “Leadership Studies,” “The Art of Followership,” “The Practice of Leadership,” “Applications of Nonverbal Behavior” and “Transformational Leadership.” Riggio is an associate editor of The Leadership Quarterly and was the originator of the Shoptalk column at the Los Angeles

Times, a Q&A column dealing with workplace problems and issues. FSU Sends Student Delegation to MOAS

FSU sent a delegation of students to the Model Organization of American States, an annual international simulation held at OAS headquarters in Washington, D.C., which is the culminating experience of POSC 435: Model Organization of American States.

The FSU delegation included **Delila Boone** of Clinton, Md., **Pamela Delgadillo** of St. Michael’s, Md., **Marisa DiCarlo** of Eldersburg, Md., **Aja Hope** of Odenton, Md., **Kerry Lindsay** of Landover, Md., **Travin Johnson** of Huntingtown, Md., **Matt Polissedjian** of Derwood, Md., and **Edwina Rogers** of Columbia, Md.

“The Frostburg Delegation to the Model OAS did an excellent job as representatives of the Bahamas this year,” said **Dr. Joan Andorfer**, professor in the Department of Political Science and president of the Institute for Diplomatic Dialogue in the Americas, a co-sponsor of the Model OAS with the OAS Office of the Assistant Secretary General.

The delegation met more than 300 students from countries around the Hemisphere, including Argentina, Guatemala, Canada, Colombia and Venezuela. In addition to committee sessions, the weeklong experience included a briefing by the second secretary of the Bahamian Embassy, an evening gala at the OAS and opening remarks by the leader of the OAS, Secretary General Jose Miguel Insulza.

MOAS is designed to promote democratic values among the youth of the Hemisphere by familiarizing students, faculty and academic institutions of the Americas with the work of OAS and its member states, as well as with the organization’s role as the premier political forum in the Hemisphere. MOAS is a simulation exercise where, through role-playing, the students represent the diplomats and political officials of the member states of OAS and follow parliamentary proceedings to debate and approve

resolutions dealing with current issues on the Inter-American agenda. The model fosters the development of leadership skills in youth such as negotiation, teamwork and problem solving.

The FSU delegation received support from the FSU President’s Experiential Learning Enhancement Fund and the Department of Political Science.

Beautify the ‘Burg, Community Dialogues Celebration Picnic



Two activities that exemplify the growing collaboration between year-round Frostburg residents and members of the FSU community, Beautify the ‘Burg and the celebration picnic for the Sustaining Campus and Community Dialogue Series, come together on **Saturday, May 4**. Both events are free and open to the public.

Beautify the 'Burg, formally called the Day of Caring and Sharing, is now in its 13th year. Volunteers will gather at 8 a.m. in the parking lot of Fat Boy's Pizza. From there, participants will fan out across town to plant flowers, paint light posts, sweep sidewalks and perform other tasks to spruce up Frostburg for spring.

The picnic, with lunch by B & B Meats and local leaders as "celebrity chefs," will begin around noon at City Place. The event will feature live music by guitarist and vocalist *Sheri Whalen* and '80s cover band, The Phoenix Band, a popular group from the 1980s that recently regrouped for a series of special performances. Performers include Bob Flanigan, Jeff Wilt, Jack Kenney, Gary Rigglesman and Mitch Cline. The final performance will be by Grand Ole' Ditch, a new homebrewed bluegrass band that got its name from one of the original nicknames of the C&O Canal. The joint events are hosted by the City of Frostburg with FSU, the Dialogue Series, Frostburg First and the Greek Council at FSU.

The community dialogue series gathers students, year-round residents, local officials and University leaders to discuss a variety of issues and create new opportunities for collaborative problem-solving and coalition-building in Frostburg. Four action groups created through the series are focusing on managing conflict and preventing violence; improving relationships and race relations; managing off-campus housing tensions; and discovering Western Maryland, Frostburg and FSU pride.

The project, funded in large part by Maryland Judiciary's Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office, focuses on community-based action plans to support improved campus-community communication and a non-violent culture in Frostburg.
