Merlin Trio to Perform ‘Transfigured Night’



Presented as part of the Guest Artist Series, the FSU Department of Music, in coordination with the Allegany Arts Council, will host the Merlin Trio in a concert titled “Transfigured Night” on **Saturday, Feb. 2**, at 7:30 p.m. The program will include works by Zemlinsky, Schonberg and Schubert, as well as present pieces by the pianist Til Korber, a well-known composer in Europe.

The trio, from the renowned Merlin Ensemble of Vienna – often called the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, consists of violin, cello and piano. Founded in 1991, the trio presents chamber music at its highest level, and the group appears at great music festivals and concert houses throughout the world, including the Salzburg Festival. The trio has recorded numerous artistic

works, including Stravinsky’s “Soldier’s Tale.”

The program is being sponsored by World Artists Experiences, a nonprofit organization that bridges international understanding through cultural and citizen diplomacy using the arts as a universal language.

Classical Guitar Duo Sise and Edwards in Concert

As part of its Faculty/Guest Artist Series, the FSU Department of Music will present classical guitar duo **Patrick J. Sise** and Mark Edwards performing solos and duets in concert on **Saturday, Feb. 9**, at 8 p.m.

Sise, who teaches guitar at FSU, will perform “Prelude No. 1 in E Minor” by Heitor Villa-Lobos and “Serenata Espanola” by Joaquin Malats, and Edwards will perform selections from “Sonata, Op. 77 ‘Omaggio a Boccherini’” by Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco. The duo will next perform “Overture” to Gioachino Rossini’s “Il barbiere di Siviglia” by Mauro Giuliani; selections from “Drei Intermezzi, Op. 117” by Johannes Brahms and arranged by Sise; four “Keyboard Sonatas” by Domenico Scarlatti, arranged by Julian Gray and Ronald Pearl; “Mirage” by David Leisner; and “The Magic Circle” and “The Miller’s

Dance” by Manuel de Falla, also arranged by Gray and Pearl.

Sise is a recent graduate of the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University, where he received his bachelor’s degree in guitar performance, and is pursuing a master’s degree in guitar performance and performance pedagogy under the tutelage of Gray. He has performed at various venues throughout the Northeast. Sise site-coordinates for the Johns Hopkins Hospital and the Baltimore City Veterans Hospital where he performs monthly. He also teaches weekly in Bowie, Md., and is a teacher for the Face to Face Guitar program, an organization that gives free lessons to Baltimore’s inner-city elementary school students. Sise is an active member of the Creative Access, a student-run volunteer outreach performance program.

Edwards graduated magna cum laude from Columbus State University’s Honors Program, and recently graduated with a master’s in guitar performance and guitar pedagogy from the Peabody Institute of Music, studying with a full scholarship with Gray. He has been performing since the age of 14 and competing since he was 13. Edwards has performed throughout the U.S., Canada, Italy and Germany. He has earned 28 top prizes in the U.S. and Canada, and since spring 2000, he has been featured on six recordings. Edwards regularly participates in Creative Access.

V-Day Presents a Benefit Production of “Vagina Monologues”



V-Day@FSU will present benefit performances of Eve Ensler’s award-winning play, “The Vagina Monologues,” at FSU on **Feb. 22 and 23** at 7:30 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall.

Doors open at 6:30 p.m. for the Information Festival, which features the Clothesline Project, campus and

community groups who provide assistance, and V-Day merchandise. The Clothesline Project was designed to essentially “air out society’s dirty laundry.” Both women and men are invited to create their own T-shirts to be put on display as a visual representation of real stories of violence against women. Alongside the Clothesline Project is the scarf sale, otherwise known as the Scarf Project.

Tickets are \$12 for the general public and \$6 for students and may be purchased by phoning x7462 Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 to 4 p.m. For the 12th year in a row, V-Day@FSU will donate the proceeds from ticket and merchandise sales. The Dove Center and the Family Crisis Resource Center will benefit, as well as this year’s V-Day Spotlight, One Billion Rising, a campaign that has issued a call to one billion women and men to walk out, dance, rise up and demand an end to violence against women on **Feb. 14, 2013**, V-Day’s 15th anniversary.

Hailed by The New York Times as “funny” and “poignant” and by the Daily News as “intelligent” and “courageous,” “The Vagina Monologues,” which was first performed off-Broadway by Ensler, dives into the mystery, humor, pain, power, wisdom, outrage and excitement buried in women’s experiences. Ensler has performed the play to great acclaim all around the world. Villard Books/Random House first published “The Vagina Monologues,” which includes a foreword by Gloria Steinem, in February 1998. A special edition was released in hard cover and paperback in February 2008 in honor of V-Day’s 10-year anniversary.

V-Day is a global activist movement to end violence against women and girls, and is a catalyst that promotes creative events to increase awareness, raise money and revitalize the spirit of existing anti-violence organizations. V-Day generates broader attention for the fight to stop violence against women and girls, including rape, battery, incest, female genital mutilation and sex slavery. This movement strives to empower women to find their collective voices and demand an end to the violence that affects one in three women in the U.S. and around the world.

The V-Day movement is growing at a rapid pace throughout the world, in 140 countries from Europe to Asia, Africa and the Caribbean and all of North America. In 2001, V-Day was named one of Worth Magazine’s “100 Best Charities,” in 2006 one of Marie Claire Magazine’s Top Ten Charities and in 2010 was named as one of the top-rated organizations on GreatNonprofits. In 11 years, the V-Day movement has raised over \$85 million.


Center for Creative Writing’s Playwriting Competition

Frostburg Community Dialogue Series Continues

FSU continues its "Sustaining Campus and Community" dialogue series this spring with dialogue sessions in Frostburg on **Wednesday, Feb. 20**, and **Tuesday, March 26**, both at 5:30 p.m. in the Lyric Theater, 20 E. Main St., and a celebration picnic on **Saturday, May 4**, from noon to 3 p.m. at City Place on Water Street. These community meetings, initiated last spring, convene students, year-round residents, local officials and University leaders to discuss a variety of issues and create new opportunities for collaborative problem-solving and coalition-building. Everyone with an interest in the Frostburg community is invited to participate in any part of this process. The project, funded in large part by Maryland Judiciary's Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office, focuses on community-based action plans to support improved campus-community communication and a non-violent culture in Frostburg. This fall, a planning retreat, training sessions and two dialogues were held at FSU and in downtown Frostburg. Nationally known conflict resolution scholar-practitioners Dr. Frank Dukes, lecturer and director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, and Dr. Marvin Johnson, founder and executive director of the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution, will continue to offer their expertise for these events. Learn How to Write and Design Winning NSF Grants

"Writing Winning Grants for NSF," a one-day comprehensive workshop geared for those who wish to submit winning research proposals to the National Science Foundation, will be held **Thursday, Jan. 24**, from 8:30

a.m. to 5 p.m. at the University of Maryland at College Park. The workshop will be taught by experienced faculty who have received various NSF grants and serve as evaluators on NSF review panels and is sponsored by the Grant Training Center. Participants will understand how to navigate the FastLane, focus on the key sections of successful proposals and demonstrate that their projects exhibit the excellence and innovation that sets them apart from other submissions. All sessions will engage the attendees in interactive exercises, writing, lectures and discussions, so participants will leave the class understanding how to research, write and develop their specific projects. Areas to be covered include:

- Overall strategic plan of grant-writing
- Types of awards and NSF funding, including what to look for in a grant application
- Proposal preparation process and submission mechanisms
- Characteristics, content and function of the various pieces of the proposal, including hypothesis, methods, outcomes, broader implications, evaluation, timelines and budgets
- Secret to organizing and writing "Merit Review Criteria"
- Participants will learn how to:
 - Compose the pieces of an NSF Research Grant Proposal
 - Understand the inner workings of NSF's Peer Review System and the rating scores
 - Develop and write the approach and "Broader Impacts" section
 - Package superior proposal submissions
 - Avoid the fatal flaws of a grant
 - Effectively write and approach resubmissions


The presenter, Dr. Henry L. Bart, has been a professor of ecology and evolutionary biology for Tulane University since 1996. He received a B.S. and M.S. (biology) from the University of New Orleans, and his Ph.D. in zoology from the University of Oklahoma. Bart is a director of Tulane's Museum of Natural History, is involved in numerous professional steering committees, has several funded research grants and is a panel member for many NSF programs. Among the various grants that he has received from NSF is a grant to increase the number of minorities who ultimately pursue careers in academia. Bart has published over 50 articles and books nationally and internationally, including his most recent publications on phylogenetic relationships of the North American cyprinid subgenus *Hydrophlox*, molecular phylogenetics and evolution. Some of his research interests include the relationship between mitochondrial genomics and the basal divergence of cypriniform fish, and evolutionary divergence of duplicate

copies of the growth hormone gene in suckers.

The workshop fee is \$375, including tuition, materials, certificate of completion and continental breakfast and lunch.

Youth Swimming Lessons

Youth swimming lessons for children ages 4 to 13 will be offered on **Mondays and Wednesdays from Feb. 4 through 20**. The classes will be from 6 to 6:50 p.m. in the FSU Pool in the Cordts PE Center. Youth swimming instruction is separated into skill levels based on the child's swimming ability coming into class.

Water Aerobics

Water aerobics will be offered on **Tuesdays and Thursdays, Feb. 5 through March 7**, from 5:30 to 6:20 p.m., in the FSU pool in the Cordts PE Center. Participants may register for the Tuesday or Thursday class, or both nights for a discounted price.

This class is geared toward those who want to increase cardiovascular fitness, flexibility and body strength. It is the perfect activity for those with painful joints or other movement limitations. Water aerobics creates good muscle balance, making the muscles limber and strong. The instructor for this class is Mandy Lehmann.

Creative Movement Classes

A Creative Movement class for children ages 3 to 5 years, as well as a Creative Movement II class for children ages 6 to 8 years, will be offered on **Wednesdays, Feb. 6 through March 13**. A second session of classes

will be offered **March 27 through May 1**. Classes will be held in Cordts 106.

The Creative Movement class for ages 3 to 5 will be from 5:15 to 6 p.m. and will introduce children to dance and movement. The class for ages 6 to 8 will follow from 6:15 to 7 p.m. and will emphasize the use of rhythm, space and awareness of movement. All students will learn fundamental skills and musicality and experience the use of props to enhance their movement learning. Dance attire, such as leotards, tights and ballet slippers or socks, is preferred. However, leggings, tight-fitting sweatpants and T-shirts are acceptable. Space is limited to 12 students for each class. Nicole Frost will be the instructor for these classes.

Tumbling Classes for All Ages

Preschool, beginner's and intermediate tumbling classes will be

offered in Cordts 106 on **Mondays, beginning on Feb. 11**. The preschool class will run **through April 22** (no class on **March 18**), and the beginner's and intermediate classes will continue **through March 11**.


The preschool tumbling class will meet from 5:30 to 6 p.m., and is for children ages 3 and 4. The class is limited to 12 students, with little to no formal tumbling training, and will include activities such as cartwheels, rolls and other simple movements. It will teach flexibility, strength, muscle control and coordination. All parents are required to participate with their child during all class times.

The beginner's class will meet from 6 to 7 p.m. and is for children between the ages of 5 and 12. The class will include basic floor tumbling exercises and some work on the low balance

beam. Space is limited to 15 participants, with a minimum of seven.

The intermediate class will meet from 7 to 8 p.m., and although there is no age requirement, there are certain activities that the child must be able to perform to attend. He or she must be able to do a solid cartwheel, working toward a solid round off. Participants in this class will work on skills toward a back handspring, such as handstand holds, forward rolls, snap down, jump-back on a cheese mat, right-/left-side cartwheels, one-armed cartwheels, aerials with spot, backbend kick over with spot and front handspring over a barrel. This class is limited to 15 students, with a minimum of seven.

The instructors are Eugene Younger, Emily Murray and Cat Ardoin. The registration deadline is **Friday, Feb. 8**.
