## Frostburg State University to Screen Bridges to the World Int'l Film Series

FSU will host the Fourth Annual Bridges to the World International Film Festival featuring films from Uruguay, Israel, Taiwan, Australia and the Czech Republic, in conjunction with the Office of Student Activities and Greek Life, International Division of Maryland's Office of the Secretary of State and World Artists Experience. The event is free and open to the public. The following films will be shown with English subtitles on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. in Lane 111:

- **Feb 12:** "Journey to the Sea" (Uruguay)
- **Feb. 19:** "Eli and Ben" (Israel)
- **Feb. 26:** "Kung Fu Dunk" (Taiwan)
- **March 5:** "Red Dog" (Australia)
- **March 12:** "Citizen Havel" (Czech Republic)

### "Journey to the Sea"



"Journey to the Sea" ("El viaje hacia el mar") is a warm and sunny film about friendship and adventure, based on a short story by Juan José Morosoli, an important literary figure in Uruguay. On a Sunday morning in 1963, six men (and a dog) travel from the small, interior town of Minas to the Atlantic Ocean. Driving through Uruguay, the men talk, drink, sing and share their lives and philosophies. "El viaje hacia el mar" is one of Uruguay's best films, with a unique tone and flavor that captures personality of the country. The film runs 80 minutes.

### "Eli and Ben"



"Eli and Ben" offers a touching coming-of-age film by weaving together two complementary stories: Eli's recognition that his father (Ben)

is fallible and negotiating the daily politics of school. Both stories address themes of peer pressure, corruption, disillusionment, deceit, faith, justice, friendship, personal ethics and social responsibility. As Eli faces a series of crises, he discovers new strength in himself and learns that growing up and entering the real world requires sacrifice. The film won numerous international film festival awards, including Augsburg, Moscow, Bologna, and Boston. It runs 90 minutes. ### "Kung Fu Dunk"



Based on the popular manga (serialized comic) "Slam Dunk!" "Kung Fu Dunk" is a fine example of a popular Chinese cinema called hesuipian (typically family-oriented films released during the New Year season). In the film, an orphan abandoned near a basketball court is adopted and trained by five masters at a martial arts school, then discovered and promoted to help a university win a basketball championship against a corrupt rival team. Along the way, he falls in love, learns the importance of teamwork and discovers the true meaning of friendship and fatherhood. "Kung Fu Dunk" runs 100 minutes.

### "Red Dog"



"Red Dog" is one of Australia's most popular films. It won seven Inside Film Awards, as well as Best Feature Film and the Australian Film Institute's Members Choice Award at the 2011 Australian Academy of Cinema and Television Arts ceremony. The film is

based on the legendary true story of the red dog who united an isolated mining community while wandering the Australian outback in search of his master. Told in flashback by a number of eccentric characters, one learns about his hitchhiking technique, his matchmaking talent, his clever life-saving skills, his travels, his nemesis Red Cat, his sorrow and above all his loyalty. ### "Citizen Havel"



An excellent example of Direct Cinema, "Citizen Havel" ("Občan Havel") provides an intimate portrait of one of the most important political leaders in Europe. The film traces 12 years in the life of Václav Havel (1936-2011), a playwright and essayist, imprisoned Communist dissident, ninth (and last) president of Czechoslovakia and first president of the Czech Republic, and chairman of the Human Rights Foundation Board of Directors and International Council. The film builds a biographical sketch of a fascinating individual and suggests that politics is often comical, adolescent and dependent on deeply personal relationships. "Občan Havel" won the Czech Lion for Best Documentary. The film runs 120 minutes. You can watch the trailer at [www.youtube.com/watch?v=d9hziWsFGkg](http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=d9hziWsFGkg).

The Bridges to the World International Film Series is a statewide initiative in recognition of the state's global reach and a reflection of those connections here in Maryland. ### Merlin Trio to Perform ‘Transfigured Night’



Presented as part of the Guest Artist Series, the FSU Department of Music, in coordination with the Allegany Arts

Council, will host the Merlin Trio in a concert titled “Transfigured Night” on **Saturday, Feb. 2**, at 7:30 p.m. The program will include works by Zemlinsky, Schonberg and Schubert, as well as present pieces by the pianist Til Korber, a well-known composer in Europe.

The trio, from the renowned Merlin Ensemble of Vienna – often called the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, consists of violin, cello and piano. Founded in 1991, the trio presents chamber music at its highest level, and the group appears at great music festivals and concert houses throughout the world, including the Salzburg Festival. The trio has recorded numerous artistic works, including Stravinsky’s “Soldier’s Tale.”

The program is being sponsored by World Artists Experiences, a nonprofit organization that bridges international understanding through cultural and citizen diplomacy using the arts as a universal language.

### Classical Guitar Duo Sise and Edwards in Concert

As part of its Faculty/Guest Artist Series, the FSU Department of Music will present classical guitar duo **Patrick J. Sise** and Mark Edwards performing solos and duets in concert on **Saturday, Feb. 9**, at 8 p.m.

Sise, who teaches guitar at FSU, will perform “Prelude No. 1 in E Minor” by Heitor Villa-Lobos and “Serenata Espanola” by Joaquin Malats, and Edwards will perform selections from “Sonata, Op. 77 ‘Omaggio a Boccherini’” by Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco. The duo will next perform “Overture” to Gioachino Rossini’s “Il barbiere di Siviglia” by Mauro Giuliani; selections from “Drei Intermezzi, Op. 117” by Johannes Brahms and arranged by Sise; four “Keyboard Sonatas” by Domenico Scarlatti, arranged by Julian Gray and Ronald Pearl; “Mirage” by David Leisner; and “The Magic Circle” and “The Miller’s Dance” by Manuel de Falla, also arranged by Gray and Pearl.

Sise is a recent graduate of the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University, where he received his bachelor’s degree in guitar performance, and is pursuing a master’s degree in guitar performance and performance pedagogy under the tutelage of Gray. He has performed at various venues throughout the Northeast. Sise site-coordinates for the Johns Hopkins Hospital and the Baltimore City Veterans Hospital where he performs monthly. He also teaches weekly in Bowie, Md., and is a teacher for the Face to Face Guitar program, an organization that gives free lessons to Baltimore’s inner-city elementary

school students. Sise is an active member of the Creative Access, a student-run volunteer outreach performance program.

Edwards graduated magna cum laude from Columbus State University’s Honors Program, and recently graduated with a master’s in guitar performance and guitar pedagogy from the Peabody Institute of Music, studying with a full scholarship with Gray. He has been performing since the age of 14 and competing since he was 13. Edwards has performed throughout the U.S., Canada, Italy and Germany. He has earned 28 top prizes in the U.S. and Canada, and since spring 2000, he has been featured on six recordings. Edwards regularly participates in Creative Access.

### V-Day Presents a Benefit Production of “Vagina Monologues”



V-Day@FSU will present benefit performances of Eve Ensler’s award-winning play, “The Vagina Monologues,” at FSU on **Feb. 22 and 23** at 7:30 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. This year’s student director is **Shelby Herbert**.

Doors open at 6:30 p.m. for the Information Festival, which features the Clothesline Project, campus and community groups who provide assistance, and V-Day merchandise. The Clothesline Project was designed to essentially “air out society’s dirty laundry.” Both women and men are invited to create their own T-shirts to be put on display as a visual representation of real stories of violence against women. Alongside the Clothesline Project is the scarf sale, otherwise known as the Scarf Project.

Tickets will be available **starting Feb. 4** and are \$12 for the general public and \$6 for students and may be purchased by phoning x7462 Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 to 4 p.m. For the 12th year in a row, V-Day@FSU will donate the proceeds from ticket and merchandise sales. The Dove Center and the Family Crisis Resource Center will benefit, as well as this year’s V-Day Spotlight, One Billion Rising, a campaign that has issued a call to one billion women and men to walk out, dance, rise up and demand an end to violence against women on **Feb. 14, 2013**, V-Day’s 15th anniversary.

Hailed by The New York Times as “funny” and “poignant” and by the Daily News as “intelligent” and “courageous,” “The Vagina Monologues,” which was first



performed off-Broadway by Ensler, dives into the mystery, humor, pain, power, wisdom, outrage and excitement buried in women’s experiences. Ensler has performed the play to great acclaim all around the world. Villard Books/Random House first published “The Vagina Monologues,” which includes a foreword by Gloria Steinem, in February 1998. A special edition was released in hard cover and paperback in February 2008 in honor of V-Day’s 10-year anniversary.

V-Day is a global activist movement to end violence against women and girls, and is a catalyst that promotes creative events to increase awareness, raise money and revitalize the spirit of existing anti-violence organizations. V-Day generates broader attention for the fight to stop violence against women and girls, including rape, battery, incest, female genital mutilation and sex slavery. This movement strives to empower women to find their collective voices and demand an end to the violence that affects one in three women in the U.S. and around the world.

The V-Day movement is growing at a rapid pace throughout the world, in 140 countries from Europe to Asia, Africa and the Caribbean and all of North America. In 2001, V-Day was named one of Worth Magazine’s “100 Best Charities,” in 2006 one of Marie Claire Magazine’s Top Ten Charities and in 2010 was named as one of the top-rated organizations on GreatNonprofits. In 11 years, the V-Day movement has raised over \$85 million.

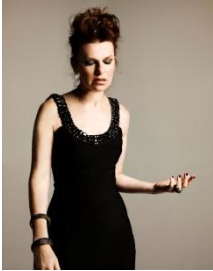

Brady Health is one of only five college or university health centers in the state of Maryland that has achieved this status. This is the sixth accreditation that Brady Health has received – they have been continuously accredited since 1997.

“Accreditation is a testimony of our efforts to provide the best care possible for the students we serve,” stated Mary Tola, director and nurse practitioner. “We believe our patients deserve the best.”

Brady Health Center is an outpatient facility that serves more than 5,000 students on the FSU campus. Harjit Sidhu, M.D., is the participating physician.

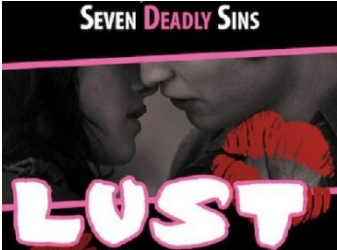

## Frostburg Community Dialogue Series Continues

FSU continues its "Sustaining Campus and Community" dialogue series this spring with dialogue sessions in Frostburg on **Wednesday, Feb. 20**, and **Tuesday, March 26**, both at 5:30 p.m. in the Lyric Theater, 20 E. Main St., and a celebration picnic on **Saturday, May 4**, from noon to 3 p.m. at City Place on Water Street.

These community meetings, initiated last spring, convene students, year-round residents, local officials and University leaders to discuss a variety of issues and create new opportunities for collaborative problem-solving and coalition-building. Everyone with an interest in the Frostburg community is invited to participate in any part of this process.

The project, funded in large part by Maryland Judiciary's Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office, focuses on community-based action plans to support improved campus-community communication and a non-violent culture in Frostburg. This fall, a planning retreat, training sessions and two dialogues were held at FSU and in downtown Frostburg.

Nationally known conflict resolution scholar-practitioners Dr. Frank Dukes, lecturer and director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, and Dr. Marvin Johnson, founder and executive director of the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution, will continue to offer their expertise for these events.

His work includes watercolor and mixed media, while the subject matter explores the real and imagined world, focusing especially on technique and misuse of artistic materials.

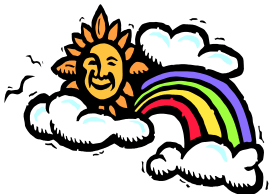
